WHAT DO GROWING CHURCHES DO?

I will admit it right up front- I am a geek. I geek out about ALL sorts of things. But one of the things I geek out about is church growth. I am passionate about it. AND...I read a lot about it. And I recently read an article on church growth I want to share with you. Written by Brian K. Dodd, the article focuses on what growing churches do. Dodd has a list-

- 1. Growing churches focus on church health more than church growth.
- 2. Growing churches demand excellence.
- 3. Growing churches are vigilant about their mission, vision and core values.
- 4. Growing churches are willing to stop unproductive ministries.
- 5. Growing churches not only embrace but also foster change.
- 6. Growing churches celebrate.

For my money, that is a fascinating and powerful list. Notice #1- if you want your church to grow, don't focus on growth! Focus on health! That makes good sense to me. And I see us doing that in so many ways. We are not about excluding people. We are not about different "factions" jockeying for position and power. We ARE about welcoming everyone and recognizing that we are all radically equal in the eyes of God.

Then there's #2. Again, I feel we are working really hard on that one. It's important that we refuse to settle for less than excellent- it's what God deserves. No less. We want to always try to make everything we do as good as it can possibly be.

#3 says we have to be vigilant about our mission. Can you name the mission of your church? If you have been coming here more than a few months...I'm nearly positive you can! "We exist to connect people to Jesus Christ". WE measure everything we do with that yardstick.

The hardest one of the bunch might be #4. Why? Because that means if we have a ministry that is beloved...but is unproductive and doesn't support our mission...we need to be willing to put that that one to bed. It's HARD to shut down ministries. But it's sometimes essential. And I see us more and more willing to evaluate and re-evaluate, measuring what's working and what's not.

#5 probably SEEMS like the hardest...because it has the word "change" in it! (Gasp!) Let's recognize the 400 pound gorilla in the room- change can be hard. But healthy things grow. And when they grow...they change. And if they CAN'T...or WON'T change...they don't grow. And if they don't grow...they eventually die. (continued on page 8)

New Sermon Series(s)!

On January 10, we started a 7-week journey that will not only lead us partway into Lent- the season leading up to Easter- but also cause us to ask some challenging questions and look at some challenging guidelines for life as we walk through <u>3 Simple Questions</u>, <u>3 Simple Rules</u>. The remaining weeks of that series are:

• Sunday, February 7- <u>Do Good</u> (Colossians 3:12-17)

What's the MOST you do? (3John 1:11, Luke 6:27-31)

• Sunday, February 14- Stay In Love With God (Psalm 31:21-24)

What does "in love" actually mean? (Deuteronomy 6:5-9, John 3:16-17)

• Sunday, February 21- Praying It, Living It (Philippians 4:4-8)

How do we wrap this all up together? (Psalm 40:1-2, 4a, Isaiah 41:9-10)

Then, On February 28th, we begin a new morning series that will take us to Easter morning- <u>In the Shadow of the Cross</u>. We will look at the events that immediately precede the events of Easter week and how they impact that week. The weeks of that series look like this:

Sunday, February 28- Before Death...Life (John 11:17-44)

Just before Jesus willing heads to His death, He restores life to someone else.

Sunday, March 6- The Plot (John 11:45-54)

Selfishness and insecurity lead to drastic decisions.

Sunday, March 13- Extravagant Worship (John 12:1-8)

Mary puts things in perspective.

Sunday, March 20 (Palm Sunday)- Riding on a Donkey (John 12:12-19)

Jesus even uses His mode of transportation as a teachable moment.

Sunday, March 27 (Easter Sunday)- Why Are You Crying? (John 20:1-18)

Jesus' story is cause for joyous celebration.

At The Point, our 6PM Sunday worship service, we have spent some time looking at plans for the New Year that can actually make a difference as we navigate **Resolutions**. The last week of this series is:

February 7- Enjoy the Ride (Matthew 11:27-30)

A lot of people don't appreciate the moment...until it's passed.

Then, on February 14, we begin a new Sunday evening series that will bring us to Palm Sunday- **Emo-tions.** We will consider a WIDE variety of human emotions and how they impact our relationships with each and with God. The weeks of that series look like this:

February 14- Love (1Corinthians 13:1-13)

Love isn't something you find- it's something that finds you.

February 21- Hate (1John 4:16b-21)

It's as easy to hate as it is difficult to love.

February 28- Curiosity (Proverbs 25:2-3)

Curiosity can conquer fear even more than bravery can.

March 6- Fear (1John 4:18)

To him who is in fear, everything rustles.

March 13- Hopelessness (Matthew 11:25-30)

The secret is to never give up hope.

March 20 (Palm Sunday)- Satisfaction (Proverbs 19:20-24)

Success is finding satisfaction in giving more than you take.

Come each week expecting God to speak to you in powerful ways!

VALENTINE'S DAY

Love is an amazing thing. It breaks all the rules. It has a mind of its own. And it cannot be stopped. Think about it- there are people you love, and you can't even begin to explain why...you just do. Likewise, there are people who love you, and sometimes you can't imagine for the life of you why they do. Another truth about love is that it is so much more than simply an emotion. Love is a conscious choice that takes dedication, perseverance, and some good, old-fashioned hard work.

We all know that February 14th is Valentine's Day- the day we send cards, flowers, and candy to loved ones. (Hallmark and Hershey's have made several fortunes based on that fact.) 

The kids have fun while they learn more about the great stories of the Bible...AND how those stories impact their lives! We are SO excited about the positive impact this ministry has on our children! If you have children or grandchildren, please consider helping them be a part of this exciting new program. If you have friends or neighbors who have kids, please invite them. Let them know that they are welcome to come for dinner at 5:15PM, stay for an adult Bible study while their kids are ministered to from 6PM to 7PM and be home, working on homework and getting everybody ready for bed, by 7:15PM!

CONNECTION COINS FOR FEBRUARY

The Connection Coins (or as Rev. Mark calls them, the "thinly-veiled Pringles cans"!) are doing great things in the life of the Aledo UMC! On the 2nd Sunday of each month, during the Children's Moment, the ushers pass around those cans. You are encouraged to drop your change in- although we WILL accept "folding money"! And that change goes toward helping fund a ministry within the church.

This month (February 8th), the Connection Coin offering will go toward another important ministry. Every Saturday, a van pulls up at the church- FULL of bakery goods from HyVee. A rotating group of people are there to unload the van, transport the bakery goods into the church, sort them based on need and then putting them where they need to go. It is a powerful ministry that reaches LOTS of people.

As a way of saying "thank you" to the gentleman who delivers the baked goods, we give him \$10 every week for gas. We recently used that last of the money we collected several months ago for that purpose. Therefore, 100% of the money that is collected in the cans on the 8th of February will be used to help replenish the funds needed to cover the costs of this powerful ministry. What a GREAT way to help connect people to Jesus Christ. So bring your change on February 8th!

And then there's #6. We like to celebrate, don't we? We celebrate the big things, to be sure. But we also celebrate the small things. (We sing "happy birthday nearly every Sunday!) We have a lot to celebrate and we should be ready and willing to regularly do just that!

At the end of the article, Dodd says, "While your church may have grown numerically, is Jesus happy with the church that has been built?" That's a VERY good thing to consider...always. And when I'm honest in regard to that question...I think that the answer is "Yes!" I am confident that Jesus is happy with who we are and where we're headed. I also am convinced that He has a LOT more for us to do!

CANDLE...WHAT?

On February 2nd, we recognize a little-noticed day in the church calendar- Candlemas. Described in the Gospel of Luke (2:22–40), it's the day Mary and Joseph took Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem forty days after his birth to both complete Mary's required post-childbirth purification and perform the redemption of the firstborn.

When they arrived at the temple, they met Simeon, who had been promised by God that "he should not see death before he had seen the Messiah of the Lord." He took Jesus in his arms and prayed the prayer that would become known as the Canticle of Simeon, which prophesied the redemption of the world by Jesus. This was baby Jesus' introduction to God's house, as well as the church's 1st "formal" meeting with the Messiah.

God chose to come down in the form of a newborn- that fact never ceases to amaze! Churches often talk about "Christmas and Easter People" (those who only come to church on special holidays), but we ARE Christmas and Easter people. We worship a God who chose to do the miraculous- a birth in a manger and a death on a cross- FOR us, so that we might be redeemed. We should keep the miracle of those seasons in our hearts all year long.

WORSHIP TECH OPPORTUNITIES

Do you like electronics? Then your church needs YOU! We need people to help operate the sound system and computer during Sunday morning worship services. What do you need in order to run these things? The list is LONG- a willingness to serve, and...that would be about it! The systems, designed specifically for churches, are quite simple to operate. Lenten Invitation

The season leading up to Easter- a time for reflection, preparation, sacrifice...Lent. We receive the ashes of Ash Wednesday on our foreheads, representing our need and desire for repentance. And then we begin a long and challenging journey that will lead us all the way to Easter Sunday.

Easter is, without a doubt, one of the best, easiest, least threatening days of the entire year to invite someone to church. Do you like what's happening at your church? Are you being fed spiritually here? If so, share that fact with someone! Chose a relative, neighbor, co-worker...whoever...and tell them what God is doing in your life. Then...invite them to come with you to church on Easter and see what it's all about!

NEED A BANDAID?

Where are <u>standard</u> first aid kits located in the church? Answer: One on the education wing shelf, one in the nursery, one in the kitchen and one by the dining room serving window.

• NEED MORE EXTENSIVE FIRST AID?

Did you know that there are <u>expanded deluxe</u> First Aid kits located on the coat racks in the Fellowship Room and the Dining Room?

Were you aware that these expanded First Aid Kits could assist you in all of these situations?

In case of an accidental burn? We have skin wipes, antiseptic ointment/burn cream packets, gauze pads, cold packs.

Help stop a nosebleed? Yes, a quick seal nosebleed kit!

Treat a larger cut? Use the vinyl gloves, skin wipes, multi-antibiotic cream, large non-stick bandages, trauma pads or stretch gauze, paper tape, scissors, and hand sanitizer.

Aid a diabetic with these supplies? Glucose Monitor Meter, Glucose Test Strips, Lancets, Glucose Tablets, Glucose Gel.

What two other items are in the expanded First Aid kits? Blood Pressure kits and flashlights. Have you noticed the <u>blankets</u> located by the deluxe First Aid kits to use in emergency? And what is in the green "sport bag looking" cases on top of the coat racks? A folding cot to use when needed.

• NEED THE AED (AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR) FOR A CARDIAC ARREST?

Do you know where the AED is located? On the wall in the Fellowship Room by the TV. What is the flipchart located on the AED? Guidelines for first aid in emergency situations.

Do you know who to contact in a medical emergency? Be familiar with those in congregation with medical training. There is a list in the church office.

WHERE WE FINISHED 2015 AND WHERE WE GO IN 2016

2015 was an exciting financial year for the Aledo United Methodist Church. We finished the year with a small cash flow surplus of around \$150.00 and we paid all our bills. In addition to that, we successfully completely financed a brand new bus for the church, which cost over \$58,000.00, and also helped raise funds (over \$19,000.00) for the purchase of a dog for Noah. We were fortunate that our budgeted expenditures were under budget by over \$14,000.00. Last year's budget was \$303,325.00 and for 2016 we are budgeting ministry programs at \$316,244.00, for an increase of 4.2 per cent. This is a doable increase as we all work to connect others with Jesus Christ. Last year we had 90 pledge commitments and for 2016 we are hoping and praying that over 125 giving units will make a pledge commitment to God through the Aledo United Methodist Church. When we consider that we have approximately 223 identifiable giving units connected to our church, this should be an easy increase to meet. Out of love, God gave each of us His only Son and all that we have, so it is reasonable for us to give back to Him a portion of our time, talents and material blessings. If you were unable to make a pledge commitment on January 17th, you can still drop your commitment letter in the offering plate or send it to the church office. Only the church treasurer and office administrator will see your pledge commitment. It is never too late to commit to the Lord.
