Love

They will know we are Christians by our love. I would like to be known by my love, but love is not an easy enterprise. I may be more known for my failings in the life long school of love. But I keep trying.

So, I have a confession to make: I really enjoy Hallmark movies. They are a great, stress-free way to unwind at the end of some stress-filled and long days. These movies are all about love, my favorite passion. First, there is the meet cute. Then there is the relationship tension that keeps them apart, or by chance some contrived contention that breaks them apart. In the end, we know they will get together and then this moment is full of happiness, rejoicing and most of all, love. Then the Hollywood assumption is that they will live happily ever after.

Some would say that this is all too saccharin, that it does not reflect true-tolife experience. Then someone like me will say, "Love is hard work." This makes the whole enterprise sound arduous. Why would anyone want to get mixed up in a loving relationship? Better yet, why would anyone want to think about loving others in this world, when it is tough enough to love the one you're with, as the Sixties Rock song by Crosby, Stills and Nash used to say:

"Love The One You're With"

When I hear these words in the song, I often think, I am the one I am with. Better yet, how hard is it to even love yourself sometimes? We are often are our own harshest judges and find little redeeming to think about ourselves. Who would love me, when I feel so unlovable?
