

"Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were wise. The foolish ones, when taking their lamps, brought no oil with them, but the wise brought flasks of oil with their lamps. Since the bridegroom was long delayed, they all became drowsy and fell asleep. At midnight, there was a cry, 'Behold, the bridegroom! Come out to meet him!' Then all those virgins got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish ones said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise ones replied, 'No, for there may not be enough for us and you. Go instead to the merchants and buy some for yourselves.' While they went off to buy it, the bridegroom came and those who were ready went into the wedding feast with him. Then the door was locked. Afterwards the other virgins came and said, 'Lord, Lord, open the door for us!' But he said in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, I do not know you.' Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

32nd Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

Matthew 25:1-13

Locked out! Have you ever been locked out? Right after I was ordained, my first assignment was with a new pastor who was also brand new to the parish we went to serve. Not long before we moved into the rectory, it had been broken into by burglars, so all of the locks were changed and there was only one deadbolt key, and guess who got it? Not me! And since the pastor would lock the deadbolt as he was going to bed, one night as I had gone on a quick 'cookie and milk run' to Kroger (really!), he deadbolted the door on me. With surprise then, I unlocked the bottom tab and pushed in, just smashing myself against the door that didn't budge. What? Locked out! I assure you, it wasn't even ten o'clock or so? The rest of the story can come another time, and a lot more of them, but the bottom line was that since the rectory had just been broken into, I was hesitant to try my 'entry skills' slipping through the basement windows! So, I had to make the call, waking him to come down and open up for me. But it was a 'distressing feeling' being locked out! (Yes, that experience lit a fire to have a key made/given to me!)

We hear about five wise virgins, and five foolish ones in our gospel parable today, who are awaiting a groom to arrive and wedding to begin! Since it is at night, the maidens need to keep their lamps handy and lit with some back-up oil for refills. We can wonder whether the virgins are potential brides for the groom (like an ancient episode of bachelor), or if they are attendants serving as bridesmaids for the wedding. Either way, they need to be ready when the groom arrives, and obviously five of them weren't prepared. They had their personal lamp with them, (good!), but they were only half-ready with no extra oil on hand (bad!) I don't; know how many weddings they had ever attended before, but did they expect the wedding to 'start on time'? Does that ever happen? So, they are caught off guard and need to refill their lamps with oil before going off with the wedding party. They ask for help (good), but maybe the wise virgins have already poured oil from flasks into their lamps and it is too dangerous trying to fill a lamp with oil from another lamp while they are both lit! So at this point, sharing oil is not possible (bad). But the wise virgins help by encouraging them to go buy some from merchants in town (maybe it's a contact friend with a deal of best priced oil). Yet, while they are out catching up, the festivities begin. For security (& prevent party-crashing), the door is locked. And they miss out.

Especially as we near the final chapters of Matthew's gospel, we hear such cautionary parables calling us to be alert and prepared for Christ's coming again because the time will always be unknown (similar to Matthew 24:45-51's parable that tells about servants *surprised* by their Master's return). So if we do not know when Christ is coming back, we need to be prepared and ready all the time, assuming that any moment will be His actual return. Almost like having a constant contingency plan for hosting unexpected guests, or a 'bug-out bag' packed for surprise but necessary departures, we need to always be ready to receive Christ and welcome Him at His second coming (whenever that is-NOW)!

A final little note about the virgins' lamps: Some people interpret the refusal of sharing oil among the virgins to be the result of the how individual the lamps would be for each virgin. That the oil and the lamp of each one is non-transferable. Like a personal ID, the lamp comes to identify each of the individual virgins and so any one of them could not have given away such a personal mark (it wouldn't be genuine-like worn in shoes that fit just so). Certainly in that time of history (without electricity and no type of public lighting), a person's own light lamp was a lifeline – to see and walk the path and to show one's face for recognition by others. What might they say but that without a light, you are in the dark (Thank you Fr Obvious!) But seriously, a person's customized, individual lamp was how one got around, not to mention how one might use it to light a fire for warmth or cook for food. But a personal light could also symbolize one's own God-given 'inner lamp' or 'inner spark' like Proverbs 20:27 says, "A lamp from the LORD is human life-breath; it searches through the *inmost being*." Might our 'inner lamp' or internal flame of faith, be our God-given soul, also called conscience? If so, we must be alert to keep it lit! Jesus Himself says in Luke 11:35-36, "Take care, then, that *the light in you* does not become darkness. If your whole body is full of light, and no part of it is in darkness, then it will be as full of light *as a lamp illuminating you with its brightness*." Peace and Prayers, Fr Brian

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
