Probably over 100 volunteers will help prepare and serve the food, set up, take down and clean-up. We are preparing for 350 guests.

CHILD CARE CENTER



The First Presbyterian Church established the Child Care Center as a mission to the community in 1994. It was founded to utilize the church's blessing of abundant space and resources in the service of infants and toddlers, especially those of low-income and at risk situations. The CCC is a "mission" in the sense of embodying the love of God rather than explicitly teaching children the faith and practices of this church.

The Child Care Center is a wonderful, happy place for the children attending. Soon, however, there will be a fundraising drive for the children's outdoor classroom. Take a look as you come into church from the east side. The kind of playground equipment needed for this new venture is very expensive. Perhaps you noticed the amounts of some pieces if you attended our very successful Open House in September. The sort of items to be purchased have a very long

PASTOR'S MESSAGE...

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, **give thanks** in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

This month we will celebrate the holiday of Thanksgiving. All of us have our own unique styles, traditions, and preferences for how we celebrate this classic holiday. And yet, we also have certain commonalities—usually including: food, football, and family, all in some combination or variation.



What memories come to mind for you as some of your most memorable Thanksgivings? Of course, "memorable" can be true because of being wonderful, or unfortunate, or just quirky. In my memory:

Quirky—was the year our three young (at the time) children and I took Brenda to the airport for a necessary trip to her home in South Carolina, and on the drive home we hoped to stop for some thanksgiving food, only to find absolutely nothing open! Later that night I "carved" the "Thanksgiving Pizza" that we made at home.

Unfortunate—have been those Thanksgivings immediately following the loss of a family member or loved one, whose life had ended since the last Thanksgiving celebration. Such absence, of course, is especially felt by us all at holidays.

Wonderful—have been about 99% of Thanksgiving celebrations! For no matter what combination of friends or family have gathered, the opportunity to pause and be *thankful* is a completely positive and blessed experience by its nature. To be *thankful* is healthy in every way—mentally and emotionally, physically, and spiritually.

I'm convinced that that is exactly what Paul the apostle had in mind when he wrote the sentence above in his letter to the Christian church in Thessalonica. "Rejoice...pray...give thanks..." is Paul's advice and exhortation to them.

That—he says, is nothing less than "God's will."

That—he writes, is what Christ Jesus makes possible for us, in a world otherwise filled with challenge, and sadness, and quirkiness.

That—Paul declares, is what God intends for us personally—for each of us as individuals, and for us as families and in groups of folks who are important to us.

Sure, there are those times when it is not easy or natural to feel *joy*, but when instead sadness or anger or just feeling blah is our reality. And, yes, sometimes there may be, let's say "gaps" in our *praying*—when we feel we're too busy, we're "doing," we're distracted. And there also are those times when *thanks* may be the last thing we feel—due to life not going too well at the moment, or I'm feeling sorry for myself, or we're just resentful, whether justifiably so, or not.

And yet, "giving thanks in all circumstances" just may turn out to be the pathway and the energy needed to regain our health, and focus, and spirit.

Here's an idea: Why not start now at the beginning of this Thanksgiving-month by creating a "List of Thanks" on which you will list every day one additional reason (person, circumstance, happening) for which you are thankful. Add something new every day (more than one entry per day is acceptable, and may be frequent!)...and then when you get to Thanksgiving Day, try: 1) Sharing your list with another person (if they have done this also, share with each other); or 2) Offering your list to God in a time of personal prayer; or 3) Do both!

Yet another direction to go with this—is creating a list of all of the reasons you are thankful for...this church and its people. Then, share that list with another person, and offer it in prayer. You can see that "giving thanks in all circumstances" literally has no limits to its possibilities, its energy, and its blessings.

Have a glorious experience of Giving Thanks!

Thanks for helping to build a strong church

Working to wrap up the 2017 Stewardship Drive

Thank you to all who helped build a strong First Presbyterian Church by completing their 2017 estimates of giving during our recent Stewardship Drive. If you have not completed your 2017 pledge, please do so as soon as possible and turn it into the church office.

Pledge amounts so far have increased by \$12,854 over last year. Many others have made a pledge for the first time. We have also seen a few decreased pledges.

As of publication date of this newsletter, we had 135 pledges turned in for a total of \$275,229. The committee is still hoping to meet the church's goal of \$333,000. Last year, 167 "giving units" turned in pledges of \$324,216.

ST. ANDREW'S DAY CELEBRATION



We are planning our second annual St. Andrew's Day celebration. The feast day of Saint Andrew, patron saint of Scotland, is a national holiday in Scotland where Scots culture is celebrated with traditional food, music and dance.

Once a year, with a special Sunday worship service, many Presbyterian churches observe St. Andrew's Day as a means of celebrating their Scottish roots. This year we are celebrating November 13th.

Following a form of worship ceremony that dates back to 1564, various traditions are observed, most notably the "Kirkin' of the Tartan" - Kirk being the Scottish word for church. Kirkin' is a "symbol of freedom" that dates back to the defeat of Scottish highlanders by the British in 1746. English penal laws banned all thing Scottish, including wearing clan plaids, speaking and singing in their native Gaelic tongue and the playing of bagpipes. Although unlawful kirkin' was punishable by death, Scots would sneak a bit of their tartan under their clothing on St. Andrew's Day and when the minister said a certain phrase, they would clutch their cloth and silently say a blessing in Gaelic.

Nowadays members, guest, and visitors are invited to present pieces of their heritage/tartan for blessing during the service. The blessing is open to everyone, whether of Scots heritage or other.

Music will be Celtic in flavor. Our service will include traditional clarsach (Gaelic wire strung harp), Highland bagpipes, Celtic hymns and songs sung in Gaelic.

In keeping with the spirit of the occasion, all are encouraged to wear plaid and bring a fabric of your heritage for the special "Kirkin' of the Tartan" blessing.



2015 FINE ARTS FESTIVAL

CLERK'S REPORT

Session approved the request for membership transfer of Kate and Ferdinand Addo to the Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church in Kensington, MD.

Session approved the request from Maren and Josh Stokka to have Canyon Paul Stokka baptized on December 4, 2016.

An email was read from Marco Grimaldo from Bread for the World thanking Pastor Reiter and church members for the warm welcome during his visit to worship service October 16.

The clerk reported that the Session Records were read on Oct. 1 at Casselton Presbyterian Church.

DEACONS' REPORT

Co-chair Lynne Bigwood thanked Worship and Music Committee for putting a microphone near the choir so that the music may be recorded on the CDs that are provided to church members unable to attend. Deacons will be purchasing a CD duplicating machine and gift cards for the Child Care Center.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES (from minutes and actions taken)

Business and Finance- Session accepted a check for \$810.92 from a Presbytery grant to help defray the increased pastor medical insurance. This is the last year of that grant. The budget will be presented to Session at the November meeting.

Administration and Personnel- Session recommended a new contract for Pastor Reiter for the last 6 weeks of the year (his contract expires Nov. 12) and discussed the pastor's 2017 contract. The terms of the new contract will be sent to Business and Finance for the 2017 Budget.

Evaluations for all staff will be done in November.

Work on the Church Operations Manual and Procurement Task Force continues.

Stewardship- October 30 is the Celebration dinner for the end of the campaign. \$560 was received for the Peacemaking Offering.

Property and Equipment- The committee will review a proposal to install new laminate countertop in the parlor kitchen. Lloyd Fisher will be hired to work as custodian two hours a day, \$12.00 per hour, when Les takes vacation. Installing new parlor carpet and small kitchen tiles will begin November 9.

Membership-The committee is discussing its role in the church's mission and is looking for new members to join the committee.

Worship and Music- Ads for a new organist have been placed in the paper. Repair was done on an amplifier.

Christian Education- Confirmation will begin in January, meeting twice a month. Presbytery sponsored a Badlands Retreat for teens Oct 20-22. Alisha Wohl will be joining the committee.

Outreach-Volunteers have agreed to help with Ministry on the Margins Thanksgiving dinner. A Food Pantry food drive will be held in November. \$200 worth of food was donated to Bismarck High School Food Bank.

Nominating—The following have agreed to serve on the 2017 Nominating Committee: Vic Sonneman, Dick Weber, Ron Carlisle and Paul Ronningen. One more member is being contacted.

REPORTS OF RELATED GROUPS

Child Care Center Board- There will be a \$10 increase in 2017 in the supply fee for families of infants and toddlers. There was a drop in enrollment of 4-5yr. olds.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Rev. Reiter stated that he has met with all staff members to update their position descriptions. Annual staff performance reviews will be done in November. Pastor Reiter attended the Presbytery meeting in Rolla on October 14. He will be taking MN time: Oct 26-28; Nov. 9-11 and Nov 23-26. Church visitors included Rev. Roger Grussing, a form FPC pastor, and Marco Grimaldo from Bread for the World.

Elders have finished their discussion of the Designated Pastor Call and Covenant question: "To help the congregation examine their journey together and work through whatever feelings may have been generated by recent events." Elders will craft a statement to share with the congregation during a worship service.


