INTRODUCTION

GOD'S INDESTRUCTIBLE PLAN FOR MARRIAGE

Discover the secret to experiencing fulfillment and passion.

No matter how distant you feel. No matter how much pain you've endured. No matter how dysfunctional your marriage seems, today you can change the course from frustration to fulfillment.

The same God who supernaturally bound you together in the covenant of marriage is longing to help turn your relationship into the love affair He wants it to be. The first step requires embracing the important truth that your marriage is not an accident.

Many couples are so focused on their own pain, their own needs and their own selfish desires that it's impossible for them to see God's bigger picture.

The institution of marriage still works. God created marriage and the Bible is the instruction manual for having a successful relationship.

There is an indestructible plan for your marriage.

Related Scriptures: Ephesians 5:22-33, 1 Peter 3:1-6, Genesis 2:18, 1 Corinthians 11:7b, Proverbs 31

God's Perfect Plan

- A) God never creates anything to fail or hurt us. The reason that people fail in relationships is because they are not following God's design.
- B) God's perfect plan for marriage is in Ephesians 5:21-33. When you follow this plan, your marriage will be successful.
- B) Most Christians love what Ephesians 5 says their spouse should do, but they fear doing their part first.

Our Roles Attract Us to Our Spouse

- A) How a wife attracts her husband:
 - 1) The number one need of every man is honor. A man is attracted to a respectful and encouraging woman.
 - 2) A wife can change her husband without a word as he observes her respectful behavior. (I Peter 3:1-6)
 - 3) Being submissive means, "I don't have to disrespect or nag you. I believe God can change your heart."
- B) How a husband attracts his wife:
 - 1) The number one need of every woman is security. A woman is attracted to a selfless, sacrificial man.
 - 2) A husband can change his wife as he sacrifices and loves her. A woman wants to know that a man cares and will give up anything for her.
 - 3) A woman is sexually attracted to her husband when he is a servant, especially when he is doing housework.

Our Roles Release the Potential in Our Spouse

- A) How a husband releases his wife's potential:
 - 1) Husbands should nourish and cherish their wives. Nourish means to feed to maturity and cherish means to protect.
 - 2) Godly character is essential. Men reflect the nature of their God while women reflect the nature of their husband. (1 Corinthians 11:7b)
- B) How a wife releases her husband's potential:
 - 1) A wife should be a cheerleader and encourager looking for reasons to praise her husband. Men gravitate to where they receive honor.
 - 2) A wife can say anything she wants to say, but the way she says it is critical.

Our Roles Make Us Sensitive to Our Spouse's Needs

- A) A man will naturally meet his wife's needs when he speaks security. For example, "I am sorry for the way I have treated you. To my hurt I will meet your needs. You will not have to nag or say it twice. I am completely committed to you."
- B) A woman will naturally meet her husband's needs when she speaks honor to him. For example, "I am sorry for the way I have disrespected you. I did not understand how my words and tone hurt you. God put you in my life for a reason and I need you."

Additional Notes	from Today's '	Teaching		

TALK IT OUT - GROUP DISCUSSION

Jimmy says that a man's most important need is for honor and respect. Men, how do you need your wife to honor you? When your wife is honoring, how does that help you throughout your day?

1 Peter 3:1-2 says that a wife can change her husband without a word as he observes her respectful behavior. The challenge for a wife is trusting God to change a man's heart instead of her forcing the issue. Ladies, how do you feel about this approach?

A woman's most important need is for security and love. Men, what are the challenges of making your wife feel secure? For example, discuss why it is sometimes hard to love your wife more than yourself.

Ladies, how do you need your husband to show security and love to you? When you feel secure, how does that heal and make you whole?

Men reflect the nature of their God while women reflect the nature of their husband. Men, what were your first thoughts when you heard this statement? What are you reflecting in your relationship? The Indestructible Marriage Small Group Workbook

Share with the small group an area of your marriage that you would like to see improve over the next few weeks as you go through this workbook together. For example, you might like to communicate more or desire to overcome a specific issue in your relationship.

Group Prayer: God, thank you for your perfect plan for marriage. Begin to open the lines of communication as we focus on meeting the needs of each other in our relationship. Help each wife give her husband the honor and respect that he needs most. Teach every husband how to be a loving servant to his wife and meet her need for security and love. Amen.

Session 2 INDESTRUCTIBLE COMMUNICATION

Communication is essential in every great relationship.

When a couple begins dating, they usually have long conversations about their lives and their future. They want to understand each other and affirm what the other person has to say. It's no wonder they fall in love.

Fast forward into the marriage when communication often begins to break down and you'll find a different story. The lack of meaningful time together, combined with sarcasm and negative responses will soon devastate a relationship.

When you and your spouse were dating, communication happened naturally. When you are married, successful communication becomes intentional. It requires work.

If your marriage is going to thrive, your spouse needs to feel safe enough to share their thoughts and feelings with you. That will only take place if you learn to have indestructible communication...

"INDESTRUCTIBLE COMMUNICATION"

Related Scriptures: Amos 3:3, Ephesians 4:15, John 1:14, Proverbs 18:20-21, James 3:1-12

The Right Tone

- A) Tone communicates that you care. It is impossible to communicate with a person who does not care.
- B) Your tone is either going to upset your spouse or comfort your spouse.

Enough Time

- A) Three types of communication:
 - 1) Proactive Communication Talking before a fight so you do not have disagreements. Dedicate 3-5 days a year to go on a Vision Retreat.
 - 2) Personal Communication Daily discussing relationships and the issues in your life. Dedicate at least 30-60 minutes a day without interruption.
 - 3) Intimate Communication Verbally and physically show affection. Dedicate at least 5-10 minutes a day giving encouragement and affection.
- B) How to overcome challenges:
 - 1) Train your children to respect your relationship.
 - 2) Change your priorities. Give something up if needed.
 - 3) Eliminate distractions and plan communication.

An Atmosphere of Trust

A) You have to give your spouse the freedom to complain. Your spouse will not trust you unless they know they can complain without paying a price.

B) Confidentiality means personal information stays in this marriage and is not used against each other in conflict.

An Atmosphere of Truth

- A) Relationships without conflict are not as satisfying as relationships that have learned to overcome conflict.
- B) Much of the truth that must be spoken in marriage isn't absolute truth. Often we need to express how we feel and what is real to us.
- C) All trust has to be proceeded by grace. The first three minutes of a conversation will determine the outcome.

A Team Spirit

- A) A team spirit is created by valuing your spouse's differences and admitting your need for each other.
- B) There is an old saying, "If both of you are the same, then one of you is unnecessary."

TALK IT OUT - GROUP DISCUSSION

Being honest and giving your spouse the freedom to complain is critical for resolving conflict. Describe the negative effects when a spouse rejects the complaints of their mate. If this

happens repeatedly in the marriage over months and years, what damage will it do to the relationship?

Jimmy says relationships without conflict are not as satisfying as relationships that have learned to overcome conflict. What conflicts have you resolved in your relationship? (If you need ideas, think about the challenges when you were first married or when you went through a season of transition.)

Communication is the essential element to every great marriage. Getting to know another human being requires talking. It's how we fall in love. It's how we understand another person's heart. It's how we resolve problems and discuss needs. It's so important.

Whether you are a man or a woman, communication is central to a good marriage. Speak kindness and positive words to each other and watch how God will draw you closer than ever before.

Your tone, giving your spouse the freedom to complain and a commitment to speaking the truth in love will create indestructible communication.

Session 3 INDESTRUCTIBLE LOVE

Lasting love is more than your feelings for one another.

Marriage can be mutually fulfilling as long as the husband and wife are pouring their energy into the relationship. But many of us believe love happens effortlessly because of compatibility and chemistry.

For example, there is a misconception that if we marry the right person, loving emotions will always occur easily throughout our marriage. Another misconception is that once we've fallen out of love, we can't get the love back.

Regardless of your emotions, you can experience an indestructible love for one another.

"INDESTRUCTIBLE LOVE"

Related Scriptures: John 3:16, 1 Corinthians 13:7, Hebrews 13:5b, 1 Peter 2:21-3:7

The Definition of God's Love

- A) Agape love is "unconditional love; love by choice and by an act of the will. The word denotes unconquerable benevolence and undefeatable goodwill. It will never seek anything but the highest good for another person. It does not need a chemistry, an affinity, or a feeling. It is a love that endures through any circumstance or difficulty. Agape is a love that exclusively belongs to God and God's people."
- B) People marry because they love each other. However, for many their love will not endure. Their definition of "love" is not stable enough to last a lifetime.

The Difference Between God's Love and Other Kinds of Love

- A) Important questions: Do you love your spouse? If yes, what do you mean by that? If the answer is no, what do you mean by that?
- B) In English, we have one word to define all kinds of love. However, when the New Testament was written in Greek, five different words were used to describe various types of love.
- C) Five Kinds of Love:
 - 1) Epithumia A passionate love
 - 2) Eros A sexual love
 - 3) Phileo A brotherly love
 - 4) Storge A family love
 - 5) Agape Unconditional love
- D) Agape love is the only kind of love that doesn't require an emotion.

E) More important questions: Are you measuring your love primarily by an emotion or a decision? With what type of love do you want to be loved?

The Difference Agape Love Makes in Marriage

- A) Agape love is consistent. Emotions are inconsistent.
- B) You are one hundred percent in control of your will. You can decide at any time regardless of your emotions to love your spouse.
- C) If the thermostat of your love is based on agape which is a decision, then your love will be set on high and last for the rest of your life. If the thermostat of your love is based on emotion, then it will be high and low based on your feelings. Your love is unpredictable.
- D) For He Himself has said, I will never leave you nor forsake you.'- Hebrews 13:5b, NKJV
- E) The greatest marriages are built when you go through hard times and stay together. Agape love produces the deepest intimacy and the deepest bond.

Additional Notes	from Today's	Teaching		

TALK IT OUT - GROUP DISCUSSION

What does society tell us about emotions and being in love? Likewise, what does society tell us our about emotions and being out of love?

God created us to love one another with agape love. The Greek word agape means to make an unconditional decision to love even above your feelings or emotions. Why can this be so difficult to do?

There will be times in your marriage that you don't feel passionately in love. Men, when you are going through a challenging time in your marriage what do you need to hear from your wife? Ladies, likewise what do you need to hear from your husband?

In Hebrews 13:5, what promises does God make to us? When you married your spouse and said your wedding vows, what promises did you make to each other? Is an emotion involved in either of these commitments?

Session 4 REAL SEXUAL INTIMACY AND FULFILLMENT

Realistic sexual expectations will lead to success and fulfillment.

In marriage, sex is the only experience that we have together that we do not share with anyone else. We talk and socialize with other people, we make financial decisions with other people, but sex is the only unique feature of marriage.

Soon after getting married, many couples realize their sexual desires are not quite in sync. The majority of men find that they are more sexual than their wives. While many women discover they are more emotional than their husbands.

In spite of your differences, you will discover a greater level of freedom and satisfaction when sex is an open subject between you, your spouse and God.

You can experience real sexual intimacy and fulfillment in marriage.

Real Inhibitions and Misconceptions about God

- A) God created sex and said it is very good.

- 2) The Lie Female pornography under sexualizes and hyper-emotionalizes men. Women think, "I wish my husband talked to me like that."
- 3) The Truth He becomes emotional through sex. A man can be emotional, but he is the exact opposite of a woman. Meet his sexual needs and then talk to him about his emotions.

Real Expectations about Sex in Marriage

- A) Every couple is unique and has their own sexual style.
- B) If your expectations are wrong concerning sex, then you're set up for sexual dysfunction.
- C) Reasonable Expectations for Sex in Marriage:
 - 1) The average couple has sex six times a month. Of those encounters: one will be great, three times will be good, one will be fair and one will be bad.
 - 2) You and your spouse will rarely have the same desire at the same time. To have great sex in marriage you need to have a servant spirit.
 - 3) Plan special sexual encounters on a regular basis when you have the most energy and time. Schedule sex, so that you both know what to expect. Have "his" or "her" nights.

Soon after getting married, many couples find out their sexual desires are not quite in sync. Rarely are you both going to experience fireworks at the same time. Approaching sex with a servant spirit means you choose to meet your spouse's sexual and emotional needs, regardless of whether they line up with your own.

Your spouse's needs are important. Listen to your spouse and validate what they are telling you. Work hard to meet their needs even if you don't have the same need or understand it completely.

God is concerned about the overall health of the relationship. He designed sexual intimacy to reach its full potential only when genuine care and sensitivity are present.

Session 5 **RUST-PROOFING YOUR MARRIAGE**

Romance is meeting a need before it's even spoken.

You have probably seen many well-intentioned, Bible-believing, couples that have lost their fire. It's like they're covered with rust. They've lost that loving feeling.

The moment you forsake your first love, it is like trading pure gold for a rusty piece of scrap metal. The secret to rust-proofing your marriage is one word, romance.

Many couples don't take romance seriously. They give up on it or think it is only for young lovers. But think about it. If you celebrated your marriage every month instead of just Valentine's Day, wouldn't your relationship improve?

The passion can return if you rust-proof your marriage.

WRAP IT UP

Our different definitions of romance set us up for high expectations and likely disappointment. To succeed, we have to step outside of our world and come into our spouse's world.

He may not need long romantic dinners, but she does. She may not need a surprise sexual escapade, but he does. Romance is meeting your spouse's needs without them having to ask or beg repeatedly. Romance always happens on purpose.

The more you romance your spouse, the more passionate and healthy your marriage will become. Romance doesn't have to fade over time. It can get better year after year.

Session 6 DIVORCE-PROOFING YOUR MARRIAGE

Look for the warning signs and get a "tune up" for your marriage.

Divorce is devastating. Regardless of how frequently it occurs or how common it may be, divorce is mentally, emotionally and financially devastating.

Many ask, "Can marriage really work today?" and "Is it really possible to insure success and divorce-proof a relationship?" The answer is yes. In fact, more than 85% of divorces are for non-severe circumstances. Divorce can usually be prevented.

When the "warning light" in your car alerts you to a problem, you fix it if you want to drive anywhere. Likewise, we have to learn the warning signs of divorce and how to deal with them when an issue presents itself in our marriage.

You can divorce-proof your relationship.

Warning #1 - A Lack of Pre-Marriage Preparation

- A) Pre-marriage counseling helps you understand what to expect.
- B) It helps you understand the inherent differences in your spouse.

Warning #2 - Coming from a Broken Home or Divorce

- A) Children of divorce have more anxiety related to conflict.
- B) Every time you divorce your chances of divorce increase 10%.

Warning #3 - Living Together before Marriage

- A) The divorce rate for first-time marriages is between 40%-50%. The divorce rate for people who live together before marriage is 70%.
- B) A woman lives with a man to secure him and then marry. A man lives with a woman to get all the benefits of marriage without a commitment.

Warning #4 - Weak Spiritual Foundations

- A) Only God can meet our deepest needs for acceptance, identity, security and purpose.
- B) When we do not trust God to meet our deepest needs, we transfer the expectation to the people closest around us, especially our spouse.

Warning #5 - Poor Relational Support

- A) Do not be deceived: "Evil company corrupts good habits." I Corinthians 15:33, NKJV
- B) Adultery and divorce run in groups. Be careful of unhealthy relationships.

Warning #6 - Chronic Criticism and Negativity

- A) Complaining vs. Criticizing Complaining is about my feelings, criticism is about you.
- B) Follow the 10 to 1 rule. For every complaint that you offer your spouse, you ought to offer ten compliments.

Warning #7 - Chronic Anger and Unresolved Conflict

- A) The number one predictor of divorce is chronic anger and unresolved conflict.
- B) "Be angry, and do not sin": do not let the sun go down on your wrath, nor give place to the devil. Ephesians 4:26-27, NKJV

Warning #8 - Blame Transfer and Defensiveness

- A) Very rarely is your spouse the entire problem. Even if you're only 15% of the problem, accept responsibility.
- B) If you love your spouse when they're doing wrong, God will change their heart as you become His partner in redemptive love. (1 Peter 3:1-6)

Warning #9 - A Non-Committed, Shopper's Mentality

- A) A shopper's mentality says, "If you don't please me, then I'll keep shopping and find someone better."
- B) A covenant commitment says, "You are my final choice and it will be death that separates us."

Warning #10 - A Secular Worldview of Marriage and Divorce

- A) There are three severe circumstances when a person can consider divorce: adultery, abandonment and abuse. (Matthew 19:8-9, I Corinthians 7:10-15)
- B) Marriage is sacred. Marriage is not just a piece of paper. It is an act of the spirit of God.

TALK IT OUT - GROUP DISCUSSION

Everyone struggles in marriage. The goal of this session is to make you more aware of the warning signs of potential heartache and how it can be prevented.

Which of these warning signs are issues that you have experienced either in the past or the present?

Children of divorce have more anxiety and stress related to conflict because of the fear that conflict could lead to another casualty. There can be higher expectations and less trust. If you or your family has a history of divorce, how have you found this to be true?

Without realizing it, do you find yourself relying on your spouse to meet your deepest needs for acceptance, identity, security and purpose? How has that affected your relationship?

Long term criticism is the number one predictor of divorce. Criticism is really the absence of praise and honor. For so many marriages, why is it so easy to criticize each other but so hard to regularly praise one another?

The key to dealing with your anger is to create an atmosphere of daily communication. What are some techniques or steps you can take each day to improve your communication so that anger in the marriage does not get out of hand?

A profound way to begin divorce-proofing your marriage is to make a commitment to simply remove the word "divorce" or other threats of leaving from your vocabulary. Even saying "This marriage was a mistake!" in the heat of battle can be incredibly damaging. Would you be willing to remove the word "divorce" from your relationship?

Group Prayer: God, you desire that every marriage is successful. You hate divorce and the pain and destruction it causes for generations. May each spouse continue to evaluate their relationship and make improvements where needed. Help us remove the word "divorce" and other harsh accusations from our vocabulary. Forgive us of our mistakes and strengthen every marriage. Amen.

Many people convince themselves that as long as there's no sex, it's not an affair. But it is. An affair really has to do with secrecy and deception.

Women seldom have affairs because of sex. They have affairs because they find a man who will communicate with them in a sensitive, open manner, making them feel special.

Understanding Adultery

- A) Between one-third and one-half of all marriages will be affected by infidelity.
- B) In marriage, jealousy is a protective warning when someone or something else becomes more important than your relationship.
- C) Marriage is designed to operate as the top priority, except for your personal relationship with God. If marriage is not your top priority, it does not work.
- D) An affair is taking the most sacred expressions of intimacy and giving them to someone other than your spouse. Affairs begin on an emotional level.

Building a Strong Emotional Foundation

- A) Secret #1 Make a covenant decision to never turn your heart away from your spouse.
 - 1) Marriage is honorable among all, and the bed undefiled; but fornicators and adulterers God will judge. Let your conduct be without covetousness; be content with such things as you have. For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you.' Hebrews 13:4-5, NKJV
 - 2) Forsake means turn your heart away. It is possible to turn your heart away from someone right beside you.
 - 3) Just like God has a covenant relationship with us, we have a covenant with our spouse. Regardless of any reasons we may find, a covenant says we will never leave or forsake our spouse.

- B) How to recognize an emotional affair:
 - 1) Most meetings and conversations are kept secret from your partner.
 - 2) You say and do things with someone you never would in front of your spouse.
 - 3) You arrange private talk time with them.
 - 4) You share things with them that you don't with your partner. ("Walls and Windows")
- C) How to end an emotional affair:
 - 1) Stop flirting.
 - 2) Stay out of high risk places when you'll be alone.
 - 3) Break off the relationship.
 - 4) Turn your heart back to your spouse.
- D) Secret #2 Be sensitive to your spouse's emotional needs and meet them.
 - 1) Remember the major needs of men and women:
 - a) Men primarily need: honor, sex, friendship and support at home.
 - b) Women primarily need: security, communication, non-sexual affection and leadership.
 - 2) How do affairs happen?
 - a) A selfish man and a dishonoring woman offend each other and hurt each other. They do not meet each other's needs.
 - b) Because the couple is now wounded, they turn their hearts away and are vulnerable to someone else meeting their unmet needs.
 - 3) How do you keep affairs from happening?
 - a) Love your spouse and meet their emotional needs.
 - b) Do not turn your heart away even if you're going through difficult times.

TALK IT OUT - GROUP DISCUSSION

Jimmy says that the door for a potential affair is wide open whenever you neglect meeting your spouse's needs over a prolonged period of time. How can you keep this from happening in your marriage?

Regardless of how we feel, help us never turn our heart away from you or our spouse. If we are being tempted to forsake our marriage, give us the strength to bring the issue to the light. In this message, Jimmy shared how he became exposed to pornography. It was only through biblical meditation that he learned to overcome this temptation. Even if it's not in the area of sex, can you relate with Jimmy's struggle of wanting to change but not being able to do so?

Related to sexual bondage, many people think the issue is primarily physical or hormonal, but sexual sin can take the best people down. Jimmy said the real problem is the way you think. Do you agree or disagree with this statement?

To understand sexual freedom or any other kind of freedom, the truth of the matter is until our minds are set free, we're not free. Meditation is just simply reflecting on God and helpful scriptures. The most important times to do this are to start your day or when you are being tempted. What are some practical ways you've focused on scripture in your daily life?

Concerning building a strong physical foundation, Jimmy said that marriage is work. Your dedication to complete this workbook shows that you are committed to working on your relationship. Even though this small group is ending, how will you continue working on your marriage?

Affairs don't simply occur in the physical which is most obvious. They occur on four different and important levels. By addressing these areas and building strong foundations, not only do we prevent affairs, we build a strong and satisfying marriage.
