Holy Conversations in Daily Life -----With Pastor Eric and Friends!

In the Smalcald Articles Martin Luther discusses the multiple ways we receive the Gospel: first, he says, we receive the Gospel when the forgiveness of sins is preached; second, in baptism; third, in Holy Communion; fourth, through the power of the keys (confession and absolution); and "also through the mutual conversation and consolation of the brethren, Matthew 18:20: Where two or three are gathered together, etc." Remarkably even though Luther indicates that this practice is a way we receive the Gospel – the church and Lutheran tradition has not paid it much attention. So this is our opportunity to explore together how mutual conversation and consolation might bring meaning and new life into our lives today.

Here are some thoughts to get us started:

- 1.) When mutual conversation and consolation is affirmed as a sacramental act it gives common daily and mundane experiences a transformative gleam. We highlight the importance of fellowship in our families, work places, schools and communities.
- 2.) By claiming conversation and consolation as a means of grace we are saying something about the way God becomes en-fleshed in our everyday lives. In Luther's "Freedom of a Christian" he describes how we become "little Christs" to one another.
- 3.) Declared grace has had a tendency to slide toward individualism. It focuses our attention primarily on the relationship between me and God. The community and our place within the body of Christ can be overlooked. From Christ all things came and all things will be gathered back into his body once more.
- 4.) Communicating grace to one another requires neither authority nor sacred places set apart. Mutual conversation and consolation happens between friends, fellow travelers and fellow members of the body of Christ. This practice becomes a means of grace when it transforms office cubicles, sidewalks, soup kitchens, locker rooms, fellowship halls, parking lots, and cell phones into sacred spaces. It allows mutuality, reciprocation, and community-building to be transformed past the normal boundaries (or growth).

Mutual conversations and consolation invites us into having stimulating discussions without fear because the goal is to listen to one another and learn from our listening where Jesus is and how God's love is abiding in the other. We become "little Christs" by meeting people as they are and allowing them to be "known" by someone else. We value our fellowship time at Palestine, and I hope that we can exercise this practice in ways that enable us to talk about many things in small groups and forums including tough social issues and personal trials and challenges from within the community. Please sign-up for small groups and come to forums with hearts open to growth.





The First session **SABBATH KEEPING** (found in the September Gather magazine) has as its focus verse – Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy. (Exodus 20:8)

Overview: O snail

Climb Mount Fuji But slowly, slowly!

-Japanese poet Issa (1763-1828)

The scripture teaches a rhythm and pace for life. The Bible contains no poem like this haiku instructing us to be like snails and "take it slow." But there is an overarching theme in the Bible that time is in God's hands. A life redeemed by God moves at the speed of redemption: day by day, moment by moment. From the gift of Sabbath to manna in the desert, through the psalms, then in the parables of Jesus, we hear God telling us that all time is holy and that human beings are meant to live in sacred sync with God's rhythms.

In our present day of instant-everything, God's rhythms get drowned out. As we are pulled and pressured by increasing demands on our time, living in any kind of rhythm can seem like an elusive dream. Wages do not stretch to cover the cost of food so we add a second job. We search for work and cannot find any, so our days drag on in despair. Technology meant to help us save time invades our every moment, while offering greater connection with loved ones as well as with our work email account. Even life in the church, set aside to be restorative and healing, can become burdensome. We just don't have enough time.

The theme for the September *Gather* magazine is **SLOW FAITH.** All time is holy and human beings are meant to live in sacred sync with God's rhythms.

- Practice and seek forgiveness.
- 10. Pray daily.
