#### The Secret of Prayer



Some reflection on the gospel background (Luke 18:1-8) might help us to appreciate the lesson Jesus is teaching us today.

First, in the previous passage, Luke 17:22-37, Jesus had just spoken about the day of the Son of Man and

how his listeners needed to be prepared. They asked him for details of this Day. In answer, he told them of the need to persevere in prayers. They were to pray over a long period of time and not give in or be discouraged. He also emphasized two other things about this prayer. First, he said they "should" pray. This has the idea of necessity. It is absolutely necessary that we persevere in prayer.

Secondly, he used the word, "always". This means that we must pray at all times; we need to develop a constant spirit of prayer. We are to maintain an unbroken consciousness of God's presence. Finally, Jesus used the words "not to give up" meaning we are not to lose heart, nor turn coward. We are not to give in to evil.

"Look to the Lord and His strength; seek His face always (1 Chronicles

"You will seek Me and find Me when you seek Me with all your heart" (Jeremiah 29:13).

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. Or everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened (Matthew 7:7-8).

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your request to God" (Philemon 4:6). "Pray continually (1 Timothy 5:17).

"Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is wiling, but the body is weak." (Matthew 26:41).

"And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the saints" (Ephesians 6:18).

To situate this teaching and make it more real to them, Jesus told them the story about the persistent widow and the judge who feared neither God nor man. A closer look at the story reveals some important details about the widow.

She was poor, without money to bribe the judge. Maybe not here in the US, but back home judges could be bribed. Actually, the president just fired some judges because they took bribes from their clients and delivered unjust judgment. She was also a widow. A woman all alone in a man's world, with no man and no money to secure legal counsel to plead her case. She had no position or authority, no rights to commend her to the judge. Finally, she was persecuted. She was taken advantage of and abused by her adversary.

She must have been one heck of a powerless but strong woman, for she did not let any of these stop her from pestering this mighty judge until he did what she was asking for - to get her adversary off her back so she could enjoy her peace of mind in her poverty. And she got what she wanted.

Once again, the lesson for us today is about steadfastness in prayer. Jesus was strong and forceful in stressing the duty we have to persevere in our prayers. It's not really a matter of whether we want to or not. In a healthy relationship, communication is not a matter of whether one party wants it or not. It is a must. And it has to be always.

So it is with God and us. May we continue to nurture our ability to communicate with our Maker. Amen.

# Luke—Evangelist October 18th

Luke wrote one of the major portions of the New



Testament, a two-volume work comprising the third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. In the two books he shows the parallel between the life of Christ and that of the church. He is the only Gentile Christian among the Gospel writers. Tradition holds him to be a native of Antioch, and Paul calls him "the beloved"

physician" (Colossians 4:14). His Gospel was probably written between A.D. 70 and 85.

Luke appears in Acts during Paul's second journey, he remains at Philippi for several years until Paul returns from his third journey, accompanies Paul to Jerusalem and remains near him when he is imprisoned in Caesarea. During these two years, Luke had time to seek information and interview persons who had known Jesus. He accompanied Paul on the dangerous journey to Rome where he was a faithful companion. "Luke is the only one with me," Paul writes (2 Timothy 4:11).

Luke wrote as a Gentile for Gentile COMMENT: Christians. This Gospel reveals Luke's expertise in classic Greek style as well as his knowledge of Jewish sources. The character of Luke may best be seen by the emphases of his Gospel, which has been given a number of subtitles: (1) The Gospel of Mercy: Luke emphasized Jesus' compassion and patience with the sinners and suffering. He has a broadminded openness to all, showing concern for Samaritans, lepers, publicans, soldiers, public sinners, unlettered shepherds, and the poor. Luke alone records the stories of the sinful women, the lost sheep and coin, the prodigal son, and the good thief. (2) The Gospel of Universal Salvation: Jesus dies for all. He is the son of Adam, not just of David, and Gentiles are his friends too. "Little people" are (3) The Gospel of the Poor: prominent—Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary and Joseph, shepherds, Simeon and the elderly widow, Anna. He is also concerned with what we now call "evangelical poverty." (4) The Gospel of Absolute Renunciation: he stresses the need for total dedication to Christ. (5) The Gospel of Prayer and the Holy Spirit: He shows Jesus at prayer before every important step of his ministry. The Spirit is bringing the Church to its final perfection. (6) The Gospel of Joy: Luke succeeds in portraying the joy of salvation that permeated the primitive church.

QUOTE: Luke's Gospel ends: "Then [Jesus] led them [out] as far as Bethany, raised His hands, and blessed them. As He blessed them He parted from them and was taken up to heaven. They did Him homage and then returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and they were continually in the temple praising God" (Luke 24: 50-53).
