Concert at Lawrence Chapel

“A Musical Afternoon at the Lawrence Chapel” will be held on Sunday, September 14th at 2pm. Musicians Roxanne Ziegler and Mitzie Collins will play a selection of American standards, old hymns, and Celtic music on the harp and hammered dulcimer in the beautiful setting of the Lawrence Chapel, which overlooks Cayuta Lake on Route 228 between Odessa and Mecklenburg.

The Chapel is rarely open to the public so be sure to reserve the date on your calendar. The chapel was built in 1880 as a memorial to the children of Samuel and Elizabeth Lawrence. Nine of their ten children are buried in the nearby cemetery.

Today the Lawrence Chapel is mostly open for weddings, the first one being held there in 1882.

Mrs. Adelaide Willett, heir of the Lawrence estate, deeded the chapel to the Chemung County Historical Society in 1972.

This project, as well as the stitching course described below, is made possible, in part, with public funds from the New York State Council on the Arts' Decentralization Program adminis-

The Historical Society at Work

The Historical Society is often asked for help locating relatives or ancestors for genealogical purposes. A recent request to Board member and volunteer Marian Boyce bears repeating here.

In October 2007 Marian received a request from a woman in Norwalk, CT for information on a relative. A baby boy, born in 1919 in Bridgeport, CT, was brought to Watkins Glen when 2 weeks old and left with relatives. The immediate family never had contact with him again. The woman and her family wanted to know what ever happened to the boy.

Marian searched and searched and in reading one of the Schuyler County Red Cross monthly leaflets sent to servicemen and their families in World War II, noted he had tragically been killed in action in the Europe Theater in April 1945. On checking with Phil Smith of the local veterans office, he found the young soldier had been returned home for burial in a cemetery in Poughkeepsie, NY.

The search was still on, however, for a picture of the long-lost relative. In March 2008, on looking at newspaper clippings recently donated to the Museum, Marian found him as a young lad in the Schuyler

County Boys Band. The following week a friend of Marian's called to say she had her father's 1938 Watkins Glen High School yearbook with the person's photo in it. A member of the class also gave permission to have the family contact them for added information.

The family now had two photos of their relative, one as a boy, and one at high school graduation. Recently a third photo of him in uniform turned up. Marian received a tearful telephone "thank you" from the woman and her family and a great sense of accomplishment at being able to help bring closure to their search. Thank you Marian!

Freeman Family Foundation Grant Competition Watkins Glen Middle Schoolers complete Regional History Projects

The Society recently partnered with the Freeman Family Foundation to offer the first annual New York State Regional History Competition for the Watkins Glen Middle School.

Foundation president Peter Freeman of New York City (originally from Watkins Glen) wanted to target middle schoolers as he felt they

are often overlooked and keeping that age group interested in history was very important.

Judging was completed in May by a mix of teachers and Society volunteers and winners were given a certificate, free membership, and a check by the Freeman Family Foundation during the June 24-25 middle school awards assembly.

Winners for the 5th and 6th Grade: 1st Place Madison Gates, 2nd Place Emily Doppel, Honorable Mention Natasha Patel.

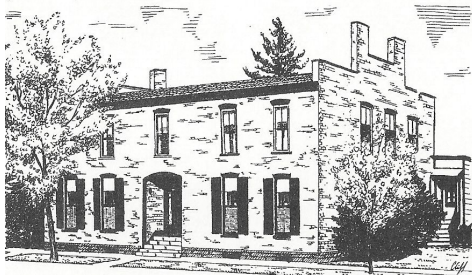
