#### WHAT SACRIFICES CAN WE MAKE?

As Jesus entered Jerusalem, the whole multitude of disciples proclaimed words of praise for the Lord. Their words, "Peace in



heaven and glory in the highest" (Luke 19:38), echo the words of the multitude of the heavenly host on the night Jesus was born. It would appear, however that the Lord brought as much discord as peace. The religious and civil authorities saw Him as a threat to their well-being and were determined to rid themselves of Him and His following. Even His followers were divided, one betraying Him, one denying Him, and others abandoning Him out of fear. But the

Prince of Peace continued to show us the way. Even when facing death, He reached out with love and mercy to both those who hated Him and those who let Him down. Only by doing so ourselves can we bring the peace and harmony to our lives and our world that Jesus promised.

Isaiah and Paul get at the paradoxical nature of God's power in the first two readings we hear today. Isaiah has been blessed to deliver God's word to rouse the weary,

but all it appears to rouse them to do is to mistreat him. Yet Isaiah trusts he will not be put to shame. He is the stereotypical scapegoat, hanging his head in shame. The "suffering servant" witnesses to the power of God's word in the way he stands up to his



abusers. Paul testifies that Jesus, through God, became a servant, humbling Himself for the sake of humankind In submitting to God's will to His death, willing and resolute, He has now become the object of worship for all.

Scripture scholars tell us that two verses of today's Gospel were probably not part of the original text. The graphic description of Jesus' suffering in the Garden of Gethsemane may have been added later. Luke may not have been the one to write that "an angel from heaven appeared to Him," when "he prayed so fervently that His sweat became like drops of blood falling on the ground" (Luke 22:43-44), but the words He did use are extreme as well. First, Jesus knelt when He prayed. Remarkably, this is the only time in the Gospels Jesus kneels to pray. Kneeling was not the normal posture in this era when praying. People knelt in supplication to a superior, as believers occasionally did when asking Jesus for help, not to pray to God. But here Jesus kneels to plead with His Father in an effort to avoid the cross. Agonizing over the suffering He faces, and agonizing over His acceptance of that suffering, His sweat could well have become like drops of blood.

Jesus had taught His disciples that when they pray to the Father they should pray that "Your will be done" (Matthew 6:10). Now that promise is put to the test, as Jesus faces His death on the cross. As he prays to His Father, twice in one sentence He references His Father's will, "Father, if You are willing, take this cup away from Me; still, not my will but Yours be done" (Luke22:42). He would rather not have to die at this time in this way, but He asks His Father to be spared only if His Father is willing. He reaffirms that it is not His own will but His Father's that He will follow. It is not easy to surrender one's own will to someone else's at any time, let alone when facing death, but it is the sacrifice within the sacrifice that Jesus makes on this night. It is the kind of sacrifice that we too can be called to make when we are called to act for the benefit of someone else.
