FROM THE PASTOR...

So in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. – Romans 12:5

It seems to me this is fellowship. We are one, although we are individuals with different opinions, needs and desires.

This all came to mind this week in some conversations I've had with members of the congregation. I realize that we do not do the best job of sharing all that goes on within the walls of St. Paul's on a daily and weekly basis. Those of us that spend most of our time doing the work of the congregation know the inner workings of the church and the day to day activity seems routine and mundane.

So, I thought that I'd share some things that happen or have happened recently that could give everyone a little taste of the activity that occurs. In the midst of preparation for Florence, the Tuesday Crew (many of you may not know that up to a dozen men of the church come in each Tuesday morning for worship and service) took down all the outside tents, signs, playground shade, cleaned the roof drains and air conditioner drain lines, secured anything outside that was loose and could blow about in the storm. The staff (mostly Susan) worked on how to notify every one of the impending storm schedule. The staff met to discuss plans for worship, Susan completed Sunday's bulletin on Tuesday. Council President, George Seiz, met with pastor to discuss the upcoming council executive committee meeting and council agenda for September. The finance committee met to review the previous month's finances and Larry Grovenstein prepared the monthly financial statement. Jayne Baum got payroll for all the staff including the preschool ready to deliver. Pastor Ali and Vicar Megan prepared for worship, with practice and sermon prep. Pastor Scott held a Bible Study on the Gospel according to John. Time was spent in visitation and prayer for members. New copier arrived (old lease ended, new one started) and staff needed to coordinate all computers and learn some new particulars. Worship was held at Croasdaile Village. Potential new members were contacted and notes were out to visitors and absent members. Work was begun on a new committee called the Nurturing Committee which we hope will support one another in our life together, through contact, support and prayer. This committee plans to phone members that have been absent, touch base with our homebound regularly and connect new members to the fellowship. Flowers were purchased for worship on Sunday as our regular delivery was interrupted due to the storm.

Post storm, the Tuesday crew put everything back in place. Pastor met with his Mutual Ministry Committee (Jeff Anderson, Bill Dahl, and Bee Ellertson) to discuss our mutual life together and talk about the past month at St. Paul's. Many of you may not know that the Mutual Ministry Committee is a support committee for the pastor and also shares congregational concerns and joys with the pastor on a regular basis. Susan Esposito began planning for the next Wednesday night meal. Wednesday night meals are important to our connections with one another, but we cannot continue to rely on staff for the meal preparation and clean up. Many have helped and know the amount of work it takes to serve these meals. Special thanks to all who have served. We need more people to step forward to help with this effort.

In the midst of this activity, we handled the usual requests for assistance, people inquiring about our fellowship, finance counted the receipts, paid the bills, preparation by the Stewardship Committee for Consecration Sunday continued, the Arts Committee met, our new librarian Katie Benjamin began working in the library, Curtis Chi replaced the Pastor's computer and installed a computer in the reception office, preparation for the upcoming internship retreat took place, rehearsals, Duke Lutheran activities, members worked at the reception desk, Growing thru Grief met, the altar guild prepared for worship, counseling and conversation and most nights of the week every room in the church is filled with outside groups – from scouts to 12 step programs.

All in all, a pretty normal week. I'm sure I've left someone and too many activities out, but I wanted to give you a taste of how life in the church happens.

FROM THE VICAR...

Psalm 148 begins with "Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise him in the heights! Praise him, all his angels; praise him, all his host!" The psalmist goes on to invite the heavenly bodies, the



sea monsters, the trees and animals, and even the weather, to this great, cosmic song of praise. The psalmist makes sure that the chorus is sung by every age: "young men and women alike; old and young together!"

The vicar at St. Paul's is tasked with leading chapel for the 3-year olds and 4-year olds at the preschool. I look at this as less of a task and more of delight. I spent three years in Seoul, South Korea teaching to kindergartners before seminary, and I have missed little children tremendously. Praising the Lord with little ones – it feels like two disparate parts of my life coming together in a happy, Spirit-filled union!

And how do we praise the Lord in St. Paul's Preschool? We use a simple liturgy passed down from Vicar Sue. We sing "Jesus Loves Me" and a song of the day. We read a story from the Bible and ponder what it means about God and us. We pray for booboos and big sisters and little brothers, and we thank God for new shoes and teachers and mommies and daddies. We end with a benediction that I've gratefully borrowed from another previous vicar: "God bless you and keep you wherever you go!"

I've put together a kind of lectionary for the school year. Until December, we'll be going through stories from the Old Testament, learning about God's promises to God's people and ways that people have responded. In December we'll await the coming of Christ with stories of Elizabeth, Zechariah, and Mary. In the new year we'll follow Jesus' ministry — especially his parables and the ways he loved everyone — until Easter, which comes just one month before the preschool year is over. I'll leave some room for the Holy Spirit to guide the texts for that last month, and we'll see what surprises are in store.

On Rally Day last month, we blessed the murals and the playground downstairs, and I invite you to keep on blessing the little children who learn and grow among the artwork and the jungle gym. We can praise the Lord, young and old, together. And may God bless you and keep you wherever you go!

Featured Congregation



Did you know that our congregation is a member of the Triangle Conference, one of the sixteen conferences that make up the North Carolina Synod of the ELCA? The Conference brings together the fourteen ELCA congregations and

four Lutheran Campus Ministries in the Triangle for mutual support and cooperation and to work together as the face of Lutheranism in our area. The congregations included in the Triangle Conference are: in Cary – Christ the King; in Chapel Hill – Holy Trinity; in Durham – Arbol de Vida, Christus Victor, Church of the Abiding Savior, Our Savior, and St. Paul's; in Fuquay Varina – Abiding Presence; in Garner – Lord of Life; and in Raleigh – Good Shepherd, Grace, Holy Trinity, Joy of Discovery, and St. Philip. Lutheran Campus Ministries in the Triangle serve UNC (Holy Trinity Chapel Hill), Duke (St. Paul), NC State (Holy Trinity Raleigh) and NC Central (Church of the Abiding Savior).

Rostered leaders in the Triangle Area get together regularly to share how the Spirit is moving in their communities and to discern how local congregations can work together and support each other. Being part of the Triangle Conference gives us all the opportunity to get to know and be part of this larger Lutheran community.

This month, we are highlighting the ministries of one of our Triangle congregation: Our Saviour Lutheran Church, Southern Pines.

For over 50 years, Our Saviour Lutheran Church has been a beacon in the Sandhills region. Our congregation includes long-time residents of the area, many others who have recently retired to this location so well-known for golf and other amenities, as well as families associated with the several military installations in the area. The variety and transiency of people served means that the congregation is always seeking to define itself and its ministries. At OSLC, we are a family that uses a blended worship form, sponsors an attractive pre-school program, and offers the usual Bible study programs and youth ministry activities. Of special note, each week, using food donated by local grocery stores, the congregation's Matthew 25 program prepares over 150 meals and then shares them with people in need in nearby Robbins, NC.

Lord God, in all our coming and going, in all our seeking and finding, in all our giving and receiving, remind us that you are with your people always. Remind us that your love is full and constant and all

encompassing. Bless the people of Our Saviour Lutheran Church that their witness may continue to shine brightly.
