Where is Jesus? Who left who? Maybe we have read the bumper sticker that says, "Missing Jesus? Guess who moved". Today's gospel tells the story of Jesus remaining behind in Jerusalem to continue studying and teaching with the rabbis in the Temple. I call it the real 'Visit of the Wise Men', but in this case it is Jesus who is visiting the 'wise' Temple teachers (God's visit to the Wise men). Jesus is enlightening them on the new Kingdom ethics that His ministry is inaugurating. True to His prophetic form, Jesus is challenging the teachers to keep their words in line with their actions. Jesus' major critique of the Jewish teachers-the Pharisees-later on is that while they know the right answers, they do not implement or reflect the truths they speak in their actual lives. In Matthew 23:3, Jesus says, "Do and observe all things whatsoever, they tell you, but do not follow their example. For they preach but they do not practice." The Pharisees know what to say, but nothing they say has an effect upon their own behavior. And so, it also doesn't have any impact upon anyone listening to them, either. In order for one's teaching words to have weight, a person must be good at illustrating them in their own life's practices too. That is their witness, and the Pharisees failed at being good witnesses. So, I imagine that many of Jesus' questions that day were a call to faithfulness, transparency and honesty from the Temple Teachers themselves. Were they good witnesses who illustrated their teaching by the example of their own lives? Did their teaching come across in the personal interactions that people could pick up on? Were they not only righteous in religion, yet also humane in their interactions with others? Were the teachers good at religion in the Temple, but also religion in the Marketplace and in the Workshop? I like one of the examples that Jesus gives later in the gospel of such 'bad faith' from the Pharisees. He pointed out to them that they were good at exacting the *precise amounts* of tithes for the feathery herbs/spices (mint, dill & cumin), yet they couldn't measure the more important and weighty matters such as 'justice, mercy or fidelity' (Matthew 23:23). The Pharisees were masters at determining the value of grassy herbs, but they couldn't assess 'fair justice' or 'merciful judgements' toward human beings. The Pharisees were scrupulously particular about calculating the exact tithe due from 'ground herbs', yet they couldn't figure any compassionate understanding for the exploited worker denied wages from a greedy employer or a consumer cheated by unscrupulous merchants rigging their scales/rulers. The Pharisees had a 'compassion deficit' when it came to the merciful and just treatment of needy neighbors, widows, orphans or the street poor. I imagine the young Jesus here presented some tough 'real-life' questions to the teachers testing if they were aware of the 'disconnect' between Temple practices and the daily decisions of faith demanded of believers in their homes and workplaces. Were they only conveniently comfortable 'armchair' teachers like a 'sage on the stage' or were they a true 'guide by the side' to help people navigate keeping faithful amid the many obstacles thrown up daily in the 'mix' of society. I bet Jesus could present some real moral dilemmas of faith based on his 'workshop experience' building and trading all around Galilee and Judea. I wonder what investigative stories Jesus could have revealed about even the 'Temple's Construction' (Its Material and Work Practices)!

So often, Jesus calls for reform of religious customs that make good shows but do nothing to help any neighbor in need, and may actually put further economic burdens upon struggling people. One area of frequent attack the Pharisees waged upon Jesus involved the Jewish handwashing rituals. Repeatedly Jesus is 'written up' by the Pharisees for not scrupulously conducting 'handwashing ablutions' in homes or in public (Luke 11:38, Matt 15:2-3). To summarize Jesus' response to them each time, He basically says, "What is more important? That my hands are washed or that the sick are healed and the hungry are given food-that water is poured over my hands and onto the round or that someone has even fresh water to drink (or their village a fresh well)". Jesus wishes that His followers apply the same scrupulous care that the Pharisees did toward Temple rituals, to use the same attention to detail which interacting fairly with neighbors. Am I as equally sensitive to how I treat/talk to my neighbor, as I am toward whether I meet my Church obligation and religious rituals? Do I worry over whether I am being just and fair in dealing with my brother or sister with the same concern I show, over giving God what is God's due? This is what is meant in the reading today when it says, that Jesus left the Temple and went down to Nazareth (Lk 2:51), obeying mother and father ('Jesus is taking the Temple Home', equally concerned to obey His familial obligations just as he observed His Temple obligations). Jesus wanted to implement such religious 'temple concern' into His daily interactions in the Nazareth economy of home, work and neighborhood).

Again, Jesus wants the same concern for detail that applies to Temple actions also to be applied to neighborly interactions. This is why He charged back against the Pharisees when they claimed he was lax about Temple Rituals, saying to them, "There is something greater than the temple here" (Matthew 12:6)/ He means that our religion is expressed in how we interact with other people. Every fellow human being is a walking Temple of the Holy Spirit, because of God's Spirit and the image of the Living God imprinted upon their souls (Gen1:27). We serve our obligation to God by keeping faithful about religious rituals, yet also by tending to the needs of our brothers and sisters in need. We are called to give to God, in the Temple of the Lord that is standing in Jerusalem (any holy site) but also in the 'Temple of the Lord' that is walking around me right now. That 'Living Temple' standing beside me is called my brother or sister in Christ! Peace, Fr Brian

Gracious Lord, Child of Bethlehem, through the cradle of our hearts, be born into our world. Amen
