Holy Shepherd, you know your sheep by name and lead us to safety through the valleys of death. Guide us by your voice, that we may walk in certainty and security to the joyous feast prepared in your house, where we celebrate with you forever. Amen.

FROM THE PASTOR

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

1 Peter 2:9-10 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)



This Old Testament passage may sound familiar. It is the passage appointed in the daily lectionary for Thursday, April 30, 2020. But, I think it bears repeating, because it defines who we are.

This passage comes from I Peter, and its intended audience is Gentile Christians. Gentile Christians are those who came to believe in Jesus based on his words and actions. They did not have a Jewish background. They were not aware of the prophesies about the coming of a Messiah. They had no corporate identity. They heard Jesus, followed him and believed he was who he said he was. The Son of God.

Once these Christians accepted and believed in Jesus, I Peter says they received an identity. They went from not having a spiritual identity to receiving one: they were now God's people. By leaving behind their darkness, and entering into God's marvelous light, they were given this identity that they would carry with them all the days of their lives. They were claimed by God as God's people, and they received God's mercy. This was a cause for celebration!

We would like to have a cause for celebration. We would like to be able leave the confines of our homes and venture back into society. For some of us, we would like to get back to work! We would like to resume our normal lives. The truth here is that these things will happen, but what was will remain in the past. Even when we begin to get out again, there will still be restrictions. We may have to wear masks for some time yet. We may not be able to go out to dinner until restaurants rearrange their spaces to reflect the required social distancing space of 6 feet. This may also apply to returning to our church building. We will have to wait and see how these things play out. We will be living in a new time, and we will need to adjust to those realities.

But, as we look back at the passage from I Peter, we realize we already have cause for celebration. We have been claimed by God. We are God's people! No virus can tamper with that reality. It defines us. We are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy people. As such, we have responsibilities. We are to live out the example of Jesus. We

are to love one another. We are to care for the poor and the needy (please see the note of thanks for our donation to the school's backpack program on the bulletin board when we return to our building.) We are to leave our darkness behind and live into God's marvelous light.

Whatever happens, these are our truths. They will not change...not ever. Let us celebrate!




Church News:

* Worship Services: The biggest news is that our worship services haven't been held in the sanctuary since March 16 when the COVID-19 virus forced us (and the rest of the country) to temporarily suspend in-person worship.

Fortunately, Pastor Sue, with the help of her husband, Joe, has been able to conduct live services via streaming on our Facebook page. Sue continues to conduct **live** services every Sunday at 10:00 AM on our Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/First-Congregational-Church-Bloomfield-NY-357770224341588/). All the videos are saved in the page's Video section and can be accessed at any time.

These live services are well attended, as evidenced by this graphic:



We are so pleased with this attendance that the church is exploring ways to continue to stream the service after we open up the sanctuary for in-person worship. This will help our community shut-ins or those who don't feel comfortable attending in-person events at this time. Stay tuned for more!

* Parsonage Remodel: The trustees are continuing work on the parsonage. All the updates, repairs and paining have been done. All that remains are the install of the kitchen cabinets and bath vanities. Once the cabinet ships re-open, they'll be installed. In addition to the interior work, the exterior trim and porch were painted, the deck was cleaned and stained, the front of the foundation was repaired and the gutters were power-washed. Nick Glamack and Judd Rockcastle donated many hours cleaning and preparing the yard for mowing.

As a side note, the trustees had the lower west wall of the clock tower repaired after a storm blew off some siding that allowed in water. The same crew that is working on the parsonage did theses repairs.

* Church Fundraiser: We are hosting a BBQ from Gale-Wyn Catering on May 31. It will be set up at Shivers, Shakes & Cones (6570 Rt. 5, Bloomfield; at the intersection of routes 5 & 20 and 64).

The BBQ will start at 11:00 AM and is scheduled to end at 4:00 PM (unless sold out beforehand). We will run a bake sale at the same time/place and will also have water available for sale.

Our worship service will begin an hour earlier on this day so members can be ready to sell chicken at 11:00. Therefore, please add a reminder to your calendar that worship service will begin at **9:00 AM** on May 31st.

Goodreads synopsis: Stephanie Land's memoir about working as a maid; a beautiful and gritty exploration of poverty in America. Includes a foreword by Barbara Ehrenreich.

"My daughter learned to walk in a homeless shelter."

While the gap between upper middle-class Americans and the working poor widens, grueling low-wage domestic and service work--primarily done by women--fuels the economic success of the wealthy. Stephanie Land worked for years as a maid, pulling long hours while struggling as a single mom to keep a roof over her daughter's head. In Maid, she reveals the dark truth of what it takes to survive and thrive in today's inequitable society.

While she worked hard to scratch her way out of poverty as a single parent, scrubbing the toilets of the wealthy, navigating domestic labor jobs, higher education, assisted housing, and a tangled web of government assistance, Stephanie wrote. She wrote the true stories that weren't being told. The stories of overworked and underpaid Americans.

Written in honest, heart-rending prose and with great insight, Maid explores the underbelly of upper-middle class America and the reality of what it's like to be in service to them. "I'd become a nameless ghost," Stephanie writes. With this book, she

gives voice to the "servant" worker, those who fight daily to scramble and scrape by for their own lives and the lives of their children.
