

PROJECTS FUNDED UNDER UW/MOFFAT FUNDING - 2018

1. ALZHEIMER SOCIETY OF SASK – MINDS IN MOTION Granted- \$ 10,000.00

EXISTING program - a community-based program designed for persons in early to mid-stages of dementia and their care partners. Has 45-60 min exercise component, 45-60 min social component, mentally stimulating games, social interaction and refreshments. There is also a period to separate to give the person with dementia a feeling of independence and the care giver time to focus on their own physical well-being.

Numbers To be Served – maximum of 23 participants in blocks of 8 weeks

Specific Use of PAACF Funding
Programming

Benefits to Community

- Improve physical fitness, social and emotional connectedness for the person living with dementia and their care partner
- Achieve a higher level of connection with the community so they feel supported and empowered to live well with dementia
- Aid in the work of the Alzheimer Society of Sask toward Dementia Friendly Communities within Saskatchewan to reduce stigma and barriers associated with dementia

**2. CATHOLIC FAMILY SERVICES OF PRINCE ALBERT – COPING WITH GRIEF PROGRAM
Granted- \$ 4,855.00**

NEW Program – A Group program to focus specifically on helping children deal with grief and loss. Will offer sessions for 2 separate groups, 6-9 yrs. of age and 10-13 yrs. Of age, with 8-10 participants in each group. Also includes 2 parent sessions – one at the beginning and one at the end.

Specific Use of Funding

Salaries of 5 program facilitators, costs of consumable items, security and facility rental, transportation

Benefits to Community

Build community capacity, resources recruited from other agencies with in-service team building, a proactive approach to issues re: grief and loss.

3 FAMILY FUTURES, INC - MILK COUPON PROGRAM Recommendations - \$ 10,000.00

EXISTING Program - More than 300 women Use the program annually. Each pregnant woman receives 4 litres of milk per week for up to 2-3 months post-natal.

Specific Use of Funding

- To purchase milk coupons, thus meeting the shortfall in the program

Benefits to Community

Assist women and their families, who are often living in poverty, to provide good nutrition and assist with their grocery budget.

4. JUBILATION RESIDENTIAL CENTRES INC. – *OTA TA YA YIN* Granted- \$ 5,150.00

NEW Program – Needs analysis show that First Nations/Metis Elder have difficulty reaching out to available, needed services set up for them. It is believed that a dedicated, in-house counsellor might provide part of a solution to the problems. This program plans to reach out with the goal of encouraging them to reach out and reverse the statistical trends.

Specific Use of PAACF Funding

- Salary cost, travel, counselling office space

Benefits to Community

- Capacity building -to encourage Seniors to take control of their own life, their own health, solve their own problems and strengthen these individuals.

5. MANN ART GALLERY- *SENIORS ART OUTREACH* Granted- \$ 3,000.00

EXISTING Program -To support outreach programming in Prince Albert and region public long-term care homes (4) in Prince Albert (3) and Shellbrook (1). This will be an inter-generational program with elementary and high school students involved.

Specific Use of PAACF

Cover costs of tour fees, materials, and mileage for travelling to and from care homes

Benefits to Community

- Promote and advance mental well-being of individuals
- Enhance quality and accessibility of lifelong learning and educational opportunities
- Create caring, safe and supportive environments for healthy development of special needs groups
- Foster and support the growth and preservation of arts and cultural activities

6. PRINCE ALBERT COMMUNITY NETWORKING COALITION – sponsored by Catholic Family Services Granted-\$ 9,000.00

NEW Program - To move towards our vision by eliminating needless duplication, increase efficiencies, promote collaboration and increase morale through support and services provided by the Coalition

Specific Use of Funding

- contract with a Co-ordinator

Benefits to Community

- 1) More effectively deliver and share community resources and opportunities to those they serve
- 2) Assist in the development of the City of P.A. Social Development Policy and Plan
- 3) Capacity building – Prince Albert is the only community in Saskatchewan to Use this method of information sharing collaboration among groups/organizations/agencies that serve the most vulnerable populations within our community.

7. PRINCE ALBERT MOBILE CRISIS UNIT COOPERATIVE – DOMESTIC VIOLENCE INTERVENTION/THE SEXUAL ASSAULT PROGRAM

Granted- \$ 13,295.00 Moffat

Granted- \$ 11,000.00 United Way

EXISTING Program

24/7 crisis intervention, sexual assault counseling. Major areas – emergency client protection, emergency financial services, suicide intervention, domestic violence intervention, emergency addiction services, problem gambling services, emergency mental health services, elderly and many others. Need to expand services in Education and prevention, Half-time counsellor, Training

Specific Use of Grant

- Domestic Violence Emergency Intervention Program – staff, education, community awareness
- Sexual Assault Program – staff, education & awareness, facilitate on-going support groups

Benefits to Community

- 24 hr intervention and Sexual Assault Counseling and Education, Diffusion of volatile situations, safety of victims, buffering for victims from additional stress, prevent long-term effects of cases, assist victims to a healthy level of functionality.

8. PRINCE ALBERT BRANCH, SASKATCHEWAN ASSOCIATION FOR COMMUNITY LIVING, Prince Albert SK – INTEREC SUMMER CAMP 2018 **Granted- \$ 10,000.00**

EXISTING Program - To help communities welcome people with intellectual disabilities. Through community building, we work to create a community where all people with intellectual disabilities are full citizens, valued and welcomed.

Specific Use of PAACF Funding

Level of funding received determines number of support workers hired

Benefits to Community

Health/supporting families under stress- children included in all events, provide respite for parents
 Education – staff hired are high school and post-secondary students
 Social Development – fosters active citizenship, social inclusion, improve physical and mental health, increase self-esteem, provides a foundation for the quality-of-life that we experience
 Build Community’s Capacity to Care – builds an inclusive community and prevents “family burnout”.

9. TEEN/INFANT ACCESSIBILITY PROGRAM – ST. MARY DAYCARE INC **Granted - \$ 2,000.00**

EXISTING Program-Provide transportation for students & their babies to & from school in cold weather
