Lillian, AL 36549 July 1, 2020 LVFD donates outdated gear

Early in 2019, Lillian Fire and Rescue began replacing their turnout gear. Turnout gear is the clothing and equipment that firefighters wear when responding to fires and motor vehicle accidents. The cost of outfitting one firefighter in turnout gear, from helmets and boots, to air tanks and breathing equipment, is approximately \$10,000 per firefighter. Of that, the protective clothing itself costs approximately \$2,500. This clothing is rated for a period of 10 years; at which time, it expires and is no longer able to be utilized in the field during the


LVFD needed to replace all of their turnout gear clothing pieces, as the entire inventory expired by March 2020. We are very fortunate at LVFD to have the support of our county government. Through the use of tax funding, and generous donations from considerate community members, we are in a position to replace all of our expired turnout gear clothing pieces and provide each of our firefighters with up-to-date and in-code equipment to perform critical duties.

Much of the expired gear, while worn, was still in good condition. However, due to legal guidelines and insurance regulations, LVFD could not utilize any of the clothing pieces in response to an emergency. We began researching ways that we could utilize the gear and wanted to be able to extend its use by making it available to other organizations that may not

We learned about an organization called AMEDICA USA (amedicausa.org). This group is a non-profit organization headed by retired Oregon firefighter and paramedic Neale Brown that operates in Guatemala. Their mission is to train and educate the firefighters of Guatemala in medical, firefighting and disaster relief. Guatemala is the most heavily hit nation in the world by natural disasters. Their need is great, but their resources are scarce. The firefighters in Guatemala are very limited in what they receive to outfit and train their departments. They depend heavily upon donations from organ-


LVFD had about 20 full sets of turnout gear clothing that were passed along to firefighters in Guatemala. This included everything from helmets and gloves, to boots, jackets and pants. Guatemala firefighters are utilizing Vietnam-era jackets and pants and even World War II era helmets. Receiving this gear from 2009 and 2010 is very much appreciated.

LVFD, and we're sure, the entire Lillian community is humbled and grateful to help others. Not only did we find a way to extend the financial resources of our tax and donation dollars by donating the equipment, we shared the blessings of community and family that we at LVFD have been abundantly

Primary Run-Off Election Slated for July 14

Governor Kay Ivey announced the Primary Runoff Election would be held on July 14, due to the concerns surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Exercising my extraordinary powers under the Emergency Management Act, I am setting Alabama's Primary Runoff Election for July 14, 2020," said Ivey in March. "The ability to hold free and fair elections is an inherent right as citizens of the United States and the great state of Alabama, but the safety and wellbeing of Alabama citizens is paramount.

The Secretary of State is encouraging anyone who is concerned about contracting the virus or spreading the illness to vote absentee. For information regarding voter registration, locating a polling place, or how to obtain an absentee ballot, please contact the Secretary of State's website.

The Democratic primary run off ballot for

Baldwin County is between James Averhart and Kiani A. Gardner for United States Representative, 1st Congressional District.

The Republican primary run off ballot includes races between Jeff Sessions and Tommy Tuberville for United States Senator, Jerry Carl and Bill Hightower for U.S. Representative, 1st Congressional District, and Beth Kellum and Will Smith for Court of Criminal Appeals Judge, Place No. 2.

The last day to register to vote is June 29. Due to temporary closures at Baldwin County courthouses, you can register to vote online at www.alabamavotes.gov.

The last day to request an absentee voting application is July 9. For more information on absentee voting, call 251-937-0379.

Precinct 28 includes Lillian, with voters going to the Lillian Community Club at 34148 Widell Ave.

Take the Time to Submit Census Information

Starting in August, the US Census Bureau census takers will begin interviewing those who have not returned their census information either by mail or on the website.

It is important that every person living in the United States answer the few questions so that funds may be dis-

> persed to the proper areas and Congressional redistricting will be done appropriately.

> The Census Bureau takes all the information and compiles it for use by lawmakers, business owners, teachers and others to make critical decisions.

The information across the nation for hospitals,

helps determine where we need new schools, new clinics, new roads and other services for families, older adults and children.

The census figures will help decide where federal funding is needed, including Medicaid, Head Start, block grants for community mental health services and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

The results help in adjusting and redrawing electoral districts, based on population increases and decreases.

The 2020 Census will help officials make informed decisions about allocating billions of dollars of federal funding to communities across the nation for hospitals.

Advent Thrift Shop Set to Reopen

With an abundance of caution, Advent Thrift Shop will reopen Thursday, July 2, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Business days and hours will initially be limited to Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday with a limit of six customers in the shop at a time.

A different system for donations has been implemented, with donations accepted only during business hours to a new area behind the building. Other thrift shops in the area have adopted this policy.

Masks will be required for customers and staff. The store will not provide masks, so customers and staff must bring their own. Like other businesses, the shop wants healthy customers and wants everyone to feel safe when at the store.

Over in Pensacola you might want to visit Fort Pickens on Pensacola Beach. The fort was completed

in 1834 and was one of the few forts in the South that remained in Union hands throughout the American Civil War.

In 1992 "Wall South," a permanent replica of the National Vietnam Memorial, was unveiled at what is now Pensacola Veterans Memorial Park. It is located at 200 S. 10th Avenue in Pensacola.

Have you been to OWA yet? Located at CR20 and the Beach Expressway, OWA offers a 23-ride amusement park, a variety of eating establishments and of course, souvenir shops. When the kids come to visit, don't worry about spending a lot of money for you to go in the park. There is a non-rider fee of \$5. Regular entrance fee is \$22.99 for the adventuresome this summer. They are also planning a special three-day Independence Day event with fireworks.

Pillar II: National security such as supporting Junior ROTC Cadets by recognizing their achievements and providing certificates and medals to acknowledge them.


Pillar III: Americanism such as sponsoring students from Robertsdale High School to attend the Alabama Boys State Program and


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


The group also utilized Zoom to continue online meetings that have been held since April.

Baldwin County. The COVID-19 impact has been severe with a 22% decrease in revenues.

He said the economy is showing signs of improving with restaurants opening and recreation returning to the area. He felt a benefit was people flocking to our area to get out of the house and to take advantage of our beautiful state.

The current meeting format is similar to pre-pandemic meetings with the Pledge of Allegiance, invocation and Optimist Creed being recited. Without breakfast being served, the group has opted to meet in the Fellowship Hall of the Lillian United Methodist Church at 9 a.m. on Saturdays. This is a very different spaghetti sauce.

I have no idea where my parents got the recipe, but it was always a treat to have it for dinner.

It is still a treat in our house today. Gallo brand salami is difficult to get locally so I buy it online, but any good dry, hard salami should do just as well.

As it freezes well, I usually make multiple batches and freeze the extra, which is good for an easy meal on another day.

Spaghetti Sauce

1/3 lb. dry hard salami diced fine (Gallo brand)

- 4 T extra virgin olive oil
- 1 large onion, diced fine
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 T celery leaves
- 1 tsp. minced parsley
- 1/2 tsp. each rosemary and thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 can tomato sauce (15 oz.)

Fry salami in olive oil until just starting to get crisp. Do not overcook. In the interest of healthy eating, drain off most of the excess oil at this point. Add all other ingredients and simmer 3 to 5 hours, stirring occasionally. Remove bay leaves prior to serving.

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
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Lillian Volunteer Fire Department

Keeping Pets Calm During Fireworks Season

During the Independence Day holiday, famous for fireworks, you should keep a close eye on your pet. Animals are more sensitive to flashing lights and sounds than we are, and this can cause fear, anxiety and stress for them.

If you plan on going to an outside event where there will be fireworks, you should leave your pets at home, or if you must bring them with you, then keep them on a leash.

When pets are fearful, they will do almost anything to escape what is frightening them. We all want our pets to stay safe, but what can you do?

There are some medications and techniques available to help relieve anxiety. If they will be staying at home, background noise such as a radio or TV can help drown out the noise from fireworks.

You should also try giving them a safe place to hide if they do get frightened.

Medications can help to calm



their anxiety for a short period of time. If you think your pet will require medication, then you should ask your veterinarian.

Veterinarians are the only ones qualified and licensed to dispense medications for your pet. You should not give your pet any over the counter or prescription medications without first consulting your veterinarian. Our pets do not respond to medications the same way we do. Medications that are safe for humans can be deadly for pets.

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"closed system". It didn't happen. The paper mill has never complied with state laws. For the past 30 years, the paper mill has been operating on a promise to clean up. IP's effluent has been continuously toxic since 2012, but Florida's DEP does nothing. After IP's explosion in January, 2017 we saw how beautiful Perdido Bay could be. It was full of baby crabs, shrimp and fish. Today IP is allowed to dump 8,000 pounds per day of their sludges into the bay. These sludges are toxic and contain PCB's and heavy metals. IP has messed up the pH of the bay by dumping sodium hydroxide. Life in the bay has all but disappeared. Let your politicians know that this is unacceptable. Perdido Bay is not a dump. We must save our bay for future generations.

There is a partnership parts some close-up in between the training provided and those willing to use that training. No one knows if or when they may become a victim in need of CPR.



Patriotic feelings come easily and naturally. We say the pledge to the flag with conviction. We fly the flag and sing patriotic songs with enthusiasm. But patriotic feelings are not enough. Loving your country is not enough.

It takes more than that to be a good citizen. Love of country is good or less than good depending upon the other things we also love and value. And we love our nation best when we hold it to the highest values we know.

Proverbs 14:35 proclaims, "Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." In other words, the greatest nation will be one that serves the demands of righteousness, the nation that reaches for the highest values.

That's how our nation came into being. The founders of our republic did not organize a government and then try to decide what kind of government it would be and what it would try to do. The government did not come first. Values, ideals and principles came first.

After deciding upon those, they set up a government which would serve those ideals. to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness."

Our founders began with certain ideals and values, and the government was established for the purpose of serving these ideals and values. They believed the source of all our highest values is God. He made us free people and placed in our hearts a longing to be free.

All our highest ideals and all our noblest intentions have come to us from God. When we are faithful to those ideals, we are exalted. When we falter, we are brought down.

Arnold Toynbee said, "Nations, cultures, and empires are never destroyed from the outside, but destroy themselves. Their self-destruction is always due to defects of character." That is a word we need to hear.

He is suggesting that the future of this or any nation is utterly dependent upon a national character. It is dependent upon the values we decide to pursue together.

In our Pledge of Allegiance we





Rear Admiral (Retired) Edward Anderson (Andy) Wilkinson Jr., 86, passed away May 23, 2020, at his home in Perdido Beach with his wife, Sondra, and her daughter, Monica, by his side.

The son of a dentist and a school teacher (Dr. Edward A. Wilkinson Sr. and Mrs. Alice Moorer Wilkinson) from Selma, Andy grew up with two uncles in the Navy. Following in their footsteps, he graduated from the Naval Academy in 1955 and attended flight training in Pensacola. He had a distinguished career as a naval aviator and was an icon in the field of patrol aviation antisubmarine warfare. He possessed superb intellect, and his exceptional people skills and leadership abilities were acknowledged through command of two patrol squadrons and two major commands: Patrol Wing Five and Commander Patrol Wings Atlantic. Andy loved to teach and after receiving his master's degree in mechanical engineering from George Washington University, he spent two years as a professor at the Naval Academy teaching fluid mechanics and thermodynamics.

His last assignment was as Director of the Defense Mapping Agency, an organization of over 10,000 personnel where he directed the \$2 billion modernization program. Retired as a flag officer after 30 years, he was most proud of the strong friendships formed within the Navy community. Following his military retirement, he was hired by Intergraph Corp of Huntsville, where he worked for 20 years and retired as an executive vice president of their federal program in Reston, Va.

After graduation from USNA, Andy and Barbara Parker were married and moved to Pensacola, where he attended flight school and received his Wings of Gold in 1956. He and Barbara had four sons. Daryl, their oldest, passed away in 1980. Barbara passed away in 1991 after 36 years of marriage. In 1993 Andy was introduced to Sondra Brown of Tampa and life began again.

He is survived by his wife of almost 26 years, Sondra; her two children, Rex and Monica; his sons, Dan (Kate), Andy III (Sherry) and David (Sue); a sister, Martha Reeves (Mallory); a sister-in-law, Sandi Bro (Rob); a granddaughter, Morgan; and seven grandsons, Daryl, Drew, Nick, Trevor, Travis, Mason and Evan.



■ Ant, continued from Page 13 long, reddish-brown ant which is covered in tiny hairs.

Why is it called a crazy ant? Most types of ants, you recall, search for food or forage along chemical trails laid down by other ants. It is the world's longest game of follow the leader. Crazy ants also forage, but they tend to move in quick, erratic, unpredictable patterns. They are still following the trail; it's just more of a break dance than a line dance. Their unusual stride gained them the nickname crazy ants.

What makes tawnies more powerful than fire ants? Is it because the sting is worse? The answer is no. The tawny's sting is not as painful as a fire ant's. Tawnies do not have stingers. In place of a stinger, worker ants possess an acidopore on the end of the abdomen, which can excrete chemicals for defense or attack. They are capable of biting. If you are bitten, they cause a minor pain that quickly fades, unless you are allergic to ant stings.

What makes a tawny the most powerful ant is that it produces its own formic acid and then bathes in its homemade goodness. People use formic acid to preserve food, since it has antibacterial properties. Formic acid is the antidote to the fire ant's venom. Tawnies also can spray the chemical at their foes. Science thinks this is the first example of an insect being able to neutralize another insect's venom, and that's why the

tawny crazy ant is at the top of the ant foodchain.

Tawnies' numbers are increasing exponentially. They are overtaking fire ants, who are their primary competitors in many locations. Tawnies are also known for swarming into any available opening to nest. Unlike other ants, they do not build centralized nests or mounds and do not emerge from the nest through a single, central opening. They can nest outdoors or indoors, under a variety of objects like soil, flowerpots, pavement or even electrical devices.

Tawny crazy ants are attracted to electrical wires and can do a lot of damage, swarming devices in such numbers that they can cause short circuits. They have ruined computers, pumps at sewage pumping stations, traffic lights, and have caused fire alarms to go off all over Texas.

They are social insects. Their colonies have been known to develop huge, super colonies consisting of hundreds to thousands of workers and numerous queens. Ant colonies with multiple queens are called polygyne colonies.

Tawnies eat almost anything; they are omnivorous. Worker ants consume other insects and other small vertebrates for protein. Tawny workers are attracted to nectar bearing plants including damaged or over-ripe fruits. Tawnies have also been known to "farm" certain types

of insects like aphids or mealybugs. When these farm bugs are stimulated by tawnies, the bugs secrete a sugary liquid called honeydew. The insects that the tawnies "farm" need lots of moisture, so an area infested with tawnies may have lots and lots of wilted vegetation as the sap is harvested.

Tawnies aggressively protect their homes. Since their numbers can reach the thousands, imagine how you would feel if you stepped outside to be swarmed by hundreds of the long-legged, tiny, brown ants who will sting you and it will hurt.

What do you call an ant from overseas?

Import-ant!


