Building the Kingdom Together

In woodworking there is a joint called a dovetail joint. This interlocking trapezoidal joint is most often found in drawers. A dovetail joint has two parts: the pins and the tails. When you cut these by hand (with a saw and a chisel) you have to pick whether you cut the pins or the tails first. I'm a "tails first" guy and find it by far the best way to go. I have a friend who is a "pins first" guy, and he assures me I will work through my shortcomings and come to find his way is the "right" way. That's ironic because I have the same thought about him.

Most folks reading this article will probably agree that they couldn't care less about how to cut a dovetail joint or even what a dovetail joint is (but you should). Our denomination, however, has recently made a decision at our National Conference to recommend to the First Presidency to extend the sacrament of marriage to people in same sex relationships as well as provide for the ordination of those in the LGBTQ community who are in committed relationships.² While a clear majority of delegates voted for this change, not everyone is of the same mind. Some folks in the majority are hoping folks in the minority will come over to the "right" side and folks in the minority are hoping the same thing. It's a "pins first" or "tails first" dilemma.

Frankly, I spent a lot of time debating about whether or not to include any comments about the World and National Conference in this edition of the Inland Stream. Both the Mission Center and the World Church have done fairly extensive communications regarding the process and outcomes of the USA National Conference. I am also not eager for our church to get tagged as the church that just talks about sex and money, because I believe the mission of Christ encompasses more than just those two issues.



In the places where I have been traveling I've appealed for breathing space for folks to work through these issues. I get the sense though that when I say "work through" what folks hear is "change their minds and come around to the prevailing side." The Community of Christ has always been a big tent people—we've always had diverse beliefs and adherence to a belief is not a test of faith. Communities of faith can agree to disagree and still work together to build the kingdom. We must all agree, however, that we will love each other, treat each other with respect, and always welcome others to the table.

The thing about a dovetail joint that makes it so useful is that even when the glue fails and the joint is stressed, it still doesn't pull apart. I believe that community is the same. In the midst of stress and tension, we don't give up on each other.

I was privileged to participate in the baptism and confirmation of Jordan Kersey this spring in Salt Lake City, Utah. Twenty-year-old Jordan has been attending our monthly LDS Seekers gatherings at Salt Lake City since December.

Jordan's journey to the Community of Christ has been fraught with personal challenges. Life-threatening illnesses, abusive relationships, and low self esteem, caused Jordan to search for a "home" where he would be accepted and loved. Jordan found a "physical home" with Robb and Mark Dexheimer Trujillo. Through Mark, he was introduced to his new "spiritual home" with the Community of Christ.

Since I have known Jordan I have come to appreciate and respect his enthusiasm, honesty and his courage. He has a strong testimony of God and the power of love in his life. Over the past few months I have witnessed tremendous introspection and growth.

In fact, he referred to his baptism and confirmation as his "butterfly experience." Jordan went on to explain that butterflies begin their lives as caterpillars but through the amazing process of metamorphosis, they enter the chrysalis phase and eventually emerge as butterflies.

What We Talk About When We Talk About God By Rob Bell


