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Trenton – EMT / Criminal Justice

Credits, Articulations & Prerequisites

Credits:

Program Description

This program is combined with the Criminal Justice program making it a two-hour block class. This is an introductory course to the Emergency Medical Services. This program covers the minimal knowledge and skills necessary to provide lifesaving emergency care to the sick and injured. This includes a certification in CPR for the Healthcare Provider. The Criminal Justice program overviews the criminal justice system in the United States. Topics surveyed are the history of law enforcement, the political, sociological and philosophical background of police functions, and the criminal courts. Constitutional problems as they relate to the police function are surveyed and the use of recent technology in criminal justice is discussed. Students meeting HFC requirements will earn college credit as well as high school credit. These credits can be applied toward an associate degree in Paramedic, Risk Managements, Fire Science, or Criminal Justice.

The advanced level combines with the Criminal Justice program to make it a two-hour block. This program offers a continuance of the program from HFC. The EMT program contains a laboratory component, which provides the technical knowledge and skills necessary for certification as a Basic Emergency Medical Technician (EMT-Basic). Students will complete ambulance and hospital emergency department rotations at the end of this program (all students must be 18 before attending the clinical experience).

Special Features
