An interview with Carolyn Bryant

Briefly describe the work of the congregation's Social Ministry Committee.

The Social Ministry committee has the opportunity to bring social awareness such as world hunger, human trafficking, drug abuse, injustices and any items we think are important for the congregation to know. We try to be aware of needs both locally, country and worldwide.

What are some of the local projects and ministries that the **Committee has been overseeing?**

Local areas or agencies that the congregation has helped include: Stuff the Bus, Coats for Christmas, Clothe-A-Child, Habitat Build, Lutheran Social Services, Food Boxes for distribution at Community Dinner, Komen Race, Glow Run, Bake Sale, distribution of meat from Chipotle to agencies in Findlay and Riehm Farm produce for community dinner guests or members of congregation, City Mission, CHOPIN Hall, Open Arms, Salvation Army and the Learning Center near the high school. We have helped Lincoln School in their school lunch program, collected Box Tops for them to use. We determine distribution of the Opal Thompson Fund from the Community Foundation. [We also support global ministries including Baby, School and Fabric kits to send to Lutheran World Relief; we have offered Fair Trade coffee and chocolate for sale and have delivered food supplies to areas affected by hurricane disasters.]

Why do you devote your time to this Committee's work?

I serve on this committee because I like to be a helper. I refer to myself as a "Martha" which may not always be good but I still try to be involved in the congregation. This congregation is a part of my "family" and I learned from my parents who were involved in their church. It is not hard to do a little to help - music, food, gardening, being with young people as an example or teacher, prayer groups, women's circles, a driver for someone, and just being a friend.

How can the members of First Lutheran aid in this work?

My hope is that all members consider the church as an extension of their family. The congregation has helped the committee in so many ways of donations, helping at the community dinners, being willing to share their gifts/talents when needed.

The Evangelism/Stewardship Committee of our congregation is proposing that we install an outdoor electronic chime system that will ring the time on the hour automatically and will play a customized chime concert at noon and the end of the day for most of the downtown to enjoy.

The chime set will be placed in honor of our church's Saints both past and present. The cost will be \$20,000 for the equipment and installation and we are proposing that anyone who would like to honor a loved one consider contributing to the fund.

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
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The Year of Scripture....A Marathon not a Sprint!

In the bishop's study for the Sermon on the Mount, he includes a Discipleship Challenge Project with each of the last few lessons (Feel to join us for the last 2 classes in Pr. Bob's classroom on June 2 and 9.). For week 2, he suggests a 90 day Bible reading plan (for those not already involved in the year long read). This might include:

- Readings from June 1 through August 31 (Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations
- Reading all 150 Psalms (you could divide into 1-2 per day, but remember 119 is EXTRA long!)
- Start with one or all of the Gospels and proceed through the rest of the New Testament

Lots of ways to read and find God's word an enrichment for your life. The summer when many of our schedules relax (STUDENTS! THIS MEANS YOU!!!), provides a great time to sit outside and enjoy maybe 10 minutes of time with God in His word. Can you not carve out 10 minutes of your day for God?! Well, hope you can and do....perhaps you will want to read the rest of the Bible once you begin with just this 90 days.



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It is summer in my book! How beautiful the flowers, the greening of the trees, the smell of mud, the sound of a thunderstorm. It is all evidence of God in our lives. I can't wait to start planting the vegetables.

This month I am turning to other writers: the first to explain the various dates on food which have often been a topic of discussion in our household. I thought I would share this information from an article in <u>Time</u> Magazine, March 11, 2019, page 57.

Learning What Labels Mean Makes Your Food Last Longer

Most Americans are needlessly tossing out packaged food – not because it's gone bad, but because they take the date stamped on it far too literally. That's according to a recent study published in the journal <u>Waste Management</u>, which surveyed more than 1000 people about the phrases and dates on food packages.

Many Americans wrongly believed that food product dates – often prefaced by "best by" or "sell by" – are federally regulated and indicate the point after which the food is no longer safe to eat. (Neither is true: labeling decisions are made voluntarily by food companies and are meant to help consumers determine how fresh a food is, according to the USDA.) As a result, 84% of people throw out food when it's close to the package date at least occasionally, the researchers found.

"These are all dates of quality and freshness, not of safety," says Janell Goodwin, a technical-information specialist with the USDA who wasn't involved in the study. "Best by" refers to when a food is at peak flavor or quality, she says. "Sell by" indicates how long a store should sell or display a product for inventory-management reasons. And the "use by" date is the last recommended day that a product can be eaten at peak quality, Goodwin says.

There's no reason to trash something just because its date has come and gone, she says. Instead, use your senses: Spoilage bacteria will typically produce a noticeable change in odor, flavor or texture. If none of these have developed, it's probably safe to keep your food. (You can help protect yourself from bacteria that cause food-borne illnesses, like *E. coli* and salmonella, by cooking or reheating foods to USDA-recommended temperatures.) The only product with a firm "use-by" date is infant formula, Goodwin says. Otherwise, you can usually trust your gut over the package date. -Jamie Ducharme

I would also like to share a few words from something else that I am reading: Neil Gaimon's <u>The View from the Cheap Seats: Selected Nonfiction</u>. He begins the collection with an essay entitled "Credo." In part, it reads,

"I believe that it is difficult to kill an idea because ideas are invisible and contagious, and they move fast...I believe that repressing ideas spreads ideas.

"I believe that people and books and newspapers are containers for ideas, but that burning the people who hold the ideas will be as unsuccessful as firebombing the newspaper archives. It is already too late. It is always too late. The ideas are already out, hiding behind people's eyes, waiting in their thoughts. They can be whispered. They can be written on walls in the dead of night. They can be drawn.

"I believe that ideas do not have to be correct to exist.

"I believe that in the battle between guns and ideas, ideas will, eventually, win. Because the ideas are invisible, and they linger, and, sometimes, they can even be true. "*Eppur si muove*: and yet it moves."

I highly recommend this text full of thought-provoking essays that often left me thinking, "Hey, I never looked at it that way."




