The Changing Rio Bosque Landscape John Sproul, Park Manager

The landscape at Rio Bosque Wetlands Park in El Paso has seen dramatic changes over the years: the loss of an old bend of the Rio Grande due to channelization; the rise of saltcedar; extensive clearing and grading in 1997 to prepare the site for a wetland project; and recovery of the vegetation since then, especially the native tree tornillo. But one element of the prechannelization landscape was still largely missing. Lack of water throughout the growing season in most years stymied efforts to establish wetland habitat.

Now, the next big change at Rio Bosque is underway. For the past two years, water has flowed to the park in spring and summer. Park Manager John Sproul will explore the many past changes at Rio Bosque and share the difference water during the growing season is now making at the park.


AT FEATHER LAKE

Finally, after 10 largely or completely dry months, Feather Lake received substantial inflows of water in September. The key event was the September 6-7 storm associated with Hurricane Newton. The water depth at the lake peaked at 3.58 feet on September 8. By late September, though, the basin was again down to isolated puddles.

Of the three Eagle Scout service projects slated for this year at Feather Lake, two are now in the books. The third is planned for October, when scouts from Troop 4, led by Eagle candidate Jeremiah Trussell, will remove saltcedars from the lake's largest island. Between 1996 and 2000, scouts cleared this island of saltcedars as part of three previous Eagle projects. In their honor, we dubbed it Boy Scout Island. Since then, saltcedars have regained a foothold, so we're returning to the island.

Our next workday at Feather Lake will be **Sun.**, **October 9**, starting at **8 a.m.** We'll help with the work on Boy Scout Island.

Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

For the past 2 years, Rio Bosque's wetland cells have received water in



spring and summer, with dramatic results for wetland habitat and wildlife.

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Stick House Sanctuary

Stick House Sanctuary was established in 2008 in an effort to address the needs of wildlife in El Paso and surrounding areas. They have rescued, rehabilitated and released up to 1000 birds & mammals to date in 2016. The species rehabilitated include songbirds, migratory birds, and waterfowl/shore birds, cotton tails, jack rabbits, rock and ground squirrels, raccoons, chipmunks and mice.

In 2010, an additional service to the community included domestic waterfowl and fowl from fighting rings in the surrounding areas. Domestic waterfowl are often mistaken for wildlife. The sanctuary has provided care to over 200 abused, abandoned or injured domestic waterfowl in 2016. By rescuing domestic waterfowl from community ponds, giving them the veterinary care they need, and finding forever homes, we are helping the wildlife regain their natural habitat and protecting them from disease.

Stick House Sanctuary is reaching out to the community through educational presentations with county and city officials in hopes of creating a better community for both wildlife and domestic feathered animals. They also provide educational presentations, pertaining to domestic and wildlife waterfowl, for children in schools.

The sanctuary is operated by volunteers year round. Funding is obtained from donations. They are in the process of obtaining their 501(c)(3) nonprofit status which will enable them to pursue grant funding to benefit the wildlife and their operation costs. Texas Pollinator BioBlitz is a statewide effort to observe and identify as many pollinators as possible between **October 7th and October 16th**. Participants will also be looking for pollinator habitat.

- This BioBlitz is designed for fun for all ages and levels of experience.
- Participants select an observation area—an area designated by host organizations like yours, or a location of their own choosing.
- Participants will look for pollinators and nectar-producing plants and share their observations by posting photos or videos online.
- Anyone can share their discoveries through Instagram using the hashtag #SaveThePollinators. Pollinators can be difficult to identify, so observers are encouraged to post what they know, which may be a simple description of the species or its behavior.
- More experienced naturalists can record their observations through iNaturalist, which records the date and location of the observation and allows other naturalists to help with identification.
- No experience needed! The website will have tips and identification resources.
- The BioBlitz is suitable for individuals, families, groups or classes.
- We will issue a daily observation challenge to add to the fun.
- All will be encouraged to plant pollinator gardens.
- There is no cost to participate. The only tools needed are a camera (smart phones are great) and access to the web.

SowGrowReapEat

The El Paso Public Libraries are now seed libraries! Seed libraries are places that share or lend seeds. Each library has a collection of non-genetically modified fruit, vegetable, and herb seeds available

for patrons to start their own edible gardens. "Check-out" up to 5 seed packets per season with your library card. The seeds are yours to keep (no late or lost fees!), but once you are a successful gardener, let some of your healthiest plants "go to seed." Harvest the seed, save some for yourself, and donate some to the public library to keep our collections stocked.

The purpose of the Sow.Grow.ReapEat program is to provide an alternative to genetically modified seeds, increase biodiversity and plant resilience, and reconnect local people with their food systems.
