Heard in the Herd

Is it real or is it Memorex?

While I was in Mexico on a business trip I came upon this little Mustang II at a car show and after seeing it I have always wondered "Is it real or..."?



Shelby was never one to pass up the chance to make a buck so when Mexican businessman Eduardo Velasquez approached him about becoming a Shelby parts distributer in Mexico and Carroll said yes. That deal turned into Shelby de Mexico. The idea was to sell "Mexican Shellbys" based on notchback Mustang GTs made in Mexico and sold through Mexican Ford dealerships. In the beginning Velasquez sold Shelby parts to local Ford dealers out of the back of his VW bus to get the business started. He had already purchased a 1965 coupe intending to race it and had sent it to California to have it modified by adding practically all of the parts Shelby offered. This is what led to his meeting with Carroll.

Production started in 1967 and has been documented until 1973. Numbers were never very large, 169 in 1967, 203 in 1968, and 306 in 1969. These cars did not receive a Shelby VIN tag and since they were modified by Shelby de Mexico. They are very hard to verify without a strong paper trail. The cars received the typical Shelby add-ons such as the fiberglass body parts, sequential tail lights, Shelby 10 spoke wheels, and heavy duty Mexican suspension parts. Engines were equipped with tri-y headers, dual point distributers, a Cobra intake manifold with 750 cfm carburetor, and the Shelby engine dress-up package. continued on pg4

The 1969 cars were a mixed bag due to changes in sales policies. Customers were now able to pick and choose what they wanted. With that being said these Mexican Shelbys are all different and therefore even harder to document. There were 3 hood styles and the choice to have stock tail lights or the sequential ones. All had roof extensions and vinyl roofs.

There were no 1970 models but in 1971 Shelby de Mexico produced a GT351 powered by a 351 Windsor and a Shelby Maverick powered by a 302 There were no performance modifications made to the cars. Again production numbers were small approximately 300 Mavericks and 200 GT351's. Both notchback and sport roof Mustangs were modified. The cars were equipped with the typical Shelby emblems, wheels, and engine pieces and the Mavericks were equipped with a hood mounted tach and Boss 429 style scoop.





Shelby de Mexico also raced their cars. In the beginning a

and '67 both built by Shelby America and they received technical help from America as well. The racing branch was very successful in Mexico and in 1969 they created their own car with a 377 cubic inch engine with 450 hp @ 7000 rpm with the help from the man himself!



When Shelby sold the Cobra name to Ford he could no longer sell parts labeled "Cobra" in the US but he could through Shelby de Mexico and he sold a great deal this way. This no doubt helped him in his "retirement".

In 1974 when the Mustang II was introduced there was no V-8 but that was not the case in Mexico. When it came time to put the 302 into the Mustang II Mexico helped get the project up and running in the US. Just to add insult to injury '74 Mustang IIs had available 302s with toploader 4 speeds while US Mustangs when they got the V8 in '75 could only be had with a C4 automatic! So with that plus the lax documentation of Shelby de Mexico I wonder... "Is it real or is it Memorex?!" You decide.



Editorials - Found on the Trail

Why you should join The Mustang Club of America.

This is the opening line on the MCA website. The club was started in 1976 by four enthusiasts in Stone Mountain Park, Georgia on March 9th. They wanted to form a club for other Mustang enthusiasts so they placed an ad in the local paper. A few weeks later, ten people showed up for the first organizational meeting. On April 11th (why not on the 17th) the first official meeting was held. By the second meeting, in May, more than 100 people showed up. In August they held their first car show with more than 100 entries from 20 states. By this time membership was over 250 members.

MCA then goes on to tell you the benefits of being a member. It also lists the price to be a member. For \$50 you get one year, with a small savings for multiple years purchased at one time, up to \$50 for a five-year membership.

The benefits...well... you do get a twelve-month subscription to the Mustang Times, the "official club publication" and, two windshield decals. There are a lot more benefits for members, but I was able to find the same "benefits" on-line just by searching. I also found old copies of the Mustang Times.

The Mustang Club of America does have an estimated 12,000 members from over 170 clubs. These clubs total more than 40,000 members. That's more than 250 members *PER CLUB*. MCA has these clubs organize car shows in different areas and puts their name on the headlines. It appears MCA's main goal is to get the glory while they recruit members.

Please keep in mind that I am not against MCA but, I am not really for it either. In the early 1980's I was a member of the Mustang Club of California (local Visalia club) and one of the requirements was to join MCA. I was a young college student working full time with my first Mustang, a 1979 coupe. I joined, went to two meetings and realized I was an outsider. I didn't have a classic, I was very young and I knew no one there. My taste for both clubs was soured and I never went back. I was not in a club, until 2003, when I started the Countryside Mustang Club in Fountain. A few years later, with no more members in the club, I joined the Mustangers.

The talk of we Mustangers joining MCA was brought up at a recent meeting. A few members belong to both clubs and there seemed to be mixed emotions from those members. It appears there is nothing to gain from joining MCA as a club. If there were real benefits, such as MCA sponsoring ANY part of a car show, or providing great daily insurance or while at shows for our babies then maybe I could see joining. Yea, at this time...not so much.
