

SSS<u>AD</u>MIN

In recommending personnel for promotion, E-4 and above, all DA Forms 2166 (EER's) Enlisted Efficiency Report should be received as soon as possible to Admin, AFVN HQ.

A newly constructed mail room has been built in HQ AFVN in accordance with AR 65-75 for proper safeguarding of U.S. mail.

All personnel are reminded that they are required to call a military taxi upon arrival in country (8th Aerial Port for transportation to downtown Saigon.) However, if you arrive after 1800 hours then you may call AFVN HQ for transportation. Military taxi numbers are: 923-2720/2646.

People are also reminded it is their responsibility to safeguard their assigned weapon. Carelessness is the major cause for lost weapons. KEEP YOUR WEAPON IN A LOCKED CONTAINER WHEN NOT HAVING IT ON YOUR PERSON.

Personnel authorized MPC will not have in their possession an amount of MPC greater than is consistent with their legitimate requirements for such currency. In no case shall an individual have in his possession an amount of cash MPC in excess of \$1,000, in which case he may possess no more than the amount he drew.

Any amount of MPC possessed, delivered, or used in violation of this section will be confiscated, administratively determined to be contraband, and turned into a U.S. Government disbursing office for credit to the U.S. Treasury in accordance with Chapter 12, AR 37-103.

A reminder --- no ration items will be given to VN Nationals as bona-fide gifts.

The Network News Service has expanded somewhat, with the addition of one new man and a much greater workload. Marine SSgt Norm Garrett's idea to send



And, speaking of Chief Antoine, while he was gone, his crew did some remodeling in the dark room. It is said that he banged into the new wall six times his first day back on the job.







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AFVN NEWSLETTER EDITORIAL POLICY

The AFVN Newsletter is an informal communications medium published monthly as a means of exchanging views and ideas between Headquarters AFVN and detachments. News items from detachments should be included as attachments to weekly operation reports. Items not received prior to the 15th of the month will be included in the Newsletter for the following month. All items must be typed, double spaced, on 8 X 102 bond paper.
