DANCE Like Miriam!

The sixth Biblical woman on the cover of our booklet is Dance Like Miriam! Miriam seems to be mostly remembered for watching out for Moses on the river Nile; she was his older sister, and that's what older sisters do.

She is mentioned in seven books of the Bible, more than any other woman. But Miriam also accompanied both her brothers, Moses and Aaron on the exodus from Egypt. When the Israelites were led to freedom Miriam took a tambourine in her hands and all the women followed her with dancing and singing, praising God. She not only was a supportive woman but one of that was joyful and filled with music.

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So, let's talk about the best books of 2022. I chose to go with the "Goodreads Most Read Books of 2022." The words "Most Read" tells me more than "top selling"..."most read" means someone actually cracked open the book.

The most common name on the list is Colleen Hoover who writes romance and young adult fiction. The teen girls must love her writing. She is best known for her 2016 romance novel It Ends With Us. Apparently it is still very popular as it tops Goodreads list and I also bought, by request, the book for one of my granddaughters, along with its companion It Begins with Us. She has sold more than 20 million books. When it is time, I shall borrow Cece's books and let you know.

Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens, a coming of age murder mystery, is also on the list. The story follows two timelines that begin to intertwine. The first is a very young girl who grows up alone in the marshes of North Carolina. She meets and falls for a star quarterback and her heart is eventually broken. What happens next is almost more than I can realistically work with but the book is very popular as is the movie of the same name.

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig explores that space between life and death. As long as the library clock stays at midnight, Nora has the option to try out all the lives she might choose to live. Doing so helps her to eradicate all the regrets that she has. Nora jumps in and out of these alternate realities and begins a journey of self discovery. The book was a pleasant surprise.

The Invisible Life of Addie LaRue by V.E. Schwab follows a young French Woman in 1714 who makes a bargain with the devil that makes her immortal, but curses her to be forgotten by everyone she meets. Based on the original Faustian bargain to live forever, the story plays out over centuries and then, what?...... she meets someone who remembers her name. It bears reading.

For those of you with library e-readers, I loaded a book not on the book club reading list. Everyone in the readers' circle with whom I talk have put Remarkably Bright Creatures at the top of their 2022 reading titles. A novel by Shelby Van Pelt, the story centers around Tova Sullivan, who works the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium. Marcellus forms a remarkable friendship with Tova and together Marcellus and Tova work to unearth the truth of what happened to Tova's son. Oh yes, Marcellus is an octopus.

Now let's talk about my current book read... Howl's Moving Castle by Diana Wynne Jones. Sophie, the eldest of three sisters, is under the spell of the Witch of the Waste. Transformed into an old lady, she moves into the Wizard Howl's castle which is, by the way, ever moving and the four doors open onto four different scenes. Okay, so there's magic involved. At the castle, she tries to break her enchantment AND gets involved with Calcifer and Howl's enchantments. It is cute, it is well-written and it is a children's rather involved chapter book. Paul's daughter gave it to me to read. I'm into it.

Endowment

- 1. The <u>Endowment General Scholarship</u> is available for voting members and their dependents attending a Christian Theological Seminary, a Lutheran affiliated college or university regardless of major, or any Christian college or university if majoring in areas of Christian ministry.
- 2. <u>The Jeffrey Allan DeMoss Scholarship</u> was established for members of First Lutheran Church by Rev. Dr. Paul and Sue DeMoss in memory of their son, Jeff. This scholarship will be awarded to a student who is an active member of First Lutheran between the ages

of 18 and 25, attending a nationally accredited college or university with a declared major in health, religion, and/or social work professions. Examples of professions include but are not limited to social work, counseling, psychology, nursing, medicine, youth work, ministry, and mental health. Applicants must also be of good Christian character and be making use of their talents in a manner that is pleasing to God. No one person may receive the scholarship award more that twice.

Deadline for submitting applications and letters of recommendation is March 31st. The recipient(s) will be selected and notified on or before June 1st. A total of \$7,149.41 for the General Scholarship and \$829.82 for the DeMoss Scholarship is available to be awarded. 



