encampment, storytelling, and a bigger better program of clogging, freestyle and square dancing. And a special program on Saturday evening where you can learn to square dance and participate yourself.


There will be food and drink, educational programs for young and old (like me), and one of the main events is the great vendors all in line to show you, teach you and fascinate you with their talent and art.

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James Dee Crowe (August 27, 1937-December 24, 2021) was an American banjo player and bluegrass band leader. More than that, he was a true legend among the bluegrass performers mentoring and inspiring legions of artists and fans around the world. If Scruggs was the father of the 3-finger style on the banjo, Crowe was the bridge to today's players such as Bela Fleck, Tony Trischka and Noam Pikelny who, while taking the 3-finger style in new directions, readily acknowledge Crowe as a major influence and unmistakable stylist. Few have the touch, tone and timing that J. D. had. His playing was fun, light-hearted and even frivolous at times, all coming from his inimitable personality.

Crowe's career started in 1956 when he joined the legendary Jimmy Martin's band. In 1961, he formed the Kentucky Mountain Boys which included Doyle Lawson and Larry Rice. In 1971, the group's name changed to J.D. Crowe and the New South and soon became one of the key bands in the history of bluegrass.


Accolades for Crowe include a Grammy in 1983, the Bluegrass Star Award in 2011, an honorary doctorate from the University of Kentucky in 2012 and lifetime

Bill Emerson Dies at 83 - Emerson, an acclaimed banjoist who co-founded The Country Gentlemen, a venerable band that helped bridge the gap between bluegrass music and urban folk music, and who established the U.S. Navy Band's Country-Bluegrass Ensemble, died August 21st at a hospital in Fairfax County, Virginia. The cause was pneumonia.

When several members of Buzz Busby and the Bayou Boys were seriously injured in a car wreck, surviving members Busby and Emerson put together a pickup band to cover the subsequent engagements for several months. The new group included Charlie Waller and John Duffey and took its name from the Chet Atkins instrumental, 'Country Gentleman' and performed for 47 years. The band's repertoire embraced the music of Bob Dylan, The Beatles and Gordon Lightfoot, greatly broadening the audience for bluegrass music. Some credit the group with more bluegrass converts in the 60's than Bill Monroe himself. Emerson is credited for pushing the group at the peak of its popularity to add pop classics such as 'Yesterday' and 'Proud Mary' to set lists.

Emerson worked with groups including the Stoneman Family and the Yates Brothers as well. He toured with Jimmy Martin and the Sunny Mountain Boys performing on the Grand Ole Opry with them.

achievement award from the Lexington Music Awards in 2016. The J. D. Crowe Bluegrass Festival in Kentucky is named in his honor.




If showered with praise, the man often met you with deferrals and he was often embarrassed. His affable, fun-loving and humble personality made Crowe everyone's friend. This is one legendary banjo player that will be truly missed.

While Emerson could play blazingly fast, he was also a sensitive accompanist on slower tempos. He learned how to support a singer by filling holes and taking the melody to the next chord. His songwriting including the popular tunes '*Theme Time*' and '*Sweet Dixie*'.

In 1967, Emerson teamed with Cliff Waldron and they converted the British rock band Manford Mann's song 'Fox on the Run' into bluegrass style making it a standard for today's bluegrass crowd.

In 1973, he was recruited by the Navy to organize the



band Country C u r r e n t making it the first military band devoted to country and bluegrass music. After 20 years he retired with rank Master Chief Petty Officer and a pension!





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The Station Inn opened in 1974 and moved to its present location in Nashville's Gulch district in 1978. The modest stone-walled club has stood since then as an emblem of the old Nashville even as skyscrapers have gone up around it, holding firm with a mixture of locally and nationally know pickers holding court in the club seven nights a week.



It has been a mecca for bluegrass and roots music enthusiasts in Nashville since then with owner and

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Molly Malone's Irish Pub and Bluegrass

Music-by Artie Werner From the outside you would never know, but venture into Molly Malone's Irish Pub on a Monday or Thursday evening and you will hear the familiar sound of Bluegrass music ringing in the air.

If you like to participate in or watch a good jam session, stop by on a Monday evening between 7 and 9:30 pm. This downtown Covington, KY establishment has been hosting one of the longest running open jams in the area since late 2007, with musicians of all skill levels welcome. Plenty of comfortable stools are provided, so there's no need for standing. An average evening will bring 8 to 10 players, and a busy night could find as many as fifteen musicians sitting in the circle. The jam is hosted by four area musicians: Jeff Roberts, Brad Meinerding, Missy Werner and myself. Each person is encouraged to participate by singing a song or two and take an instrumental break if they wish, making some songs quite lengthy! Musicians of all ages have attended, the youngest being a six-year-old who really turned some heads with her talent. You may also learn something with great discussions between songs about music history and songwriters, who recorded this song or that one, and also questions like "How did you play that lick" or "Where did you find that instrument" along with the most popular "What kind of picks or strings do you use?" Folks from out of town who happen to stop in and are not familiar with a jam session are amazed to see that many people playing together. Our resident ambassador, Roger Denny, is always happy to tell visitors about the jam and local area attractions. There is one jam session rule at Molly's: Have a great time!

On Thursday evening from 6:30 to 9:30 pm, live music is provided by The Missy Werner Band, now in their sixth year there. I call Molly's "My Old Kentucky Home." Seriously though, they have always taken great care of us and their patrons. When Covid-19 shut everything down in 2020, they were the first to contact us about returning when things began opening back up. We normally play indoors, but restrictions permitted very few patrons inside, let alone live music. Molly's provided an outdoor space for us to play and added extra properly spaced tables for their customers. This was a blessing for us. We not only felt great about getting to perform together again, but were also gratified when someone who was there watching would walk up with a huge smile or tears in their eyes and tell us how much they missed watching and listening to live music. Both musicians and spectators learned how important live music was to them during a time when there was none to be found.



Paul Shanley is the proprietor of Molly Malone's. He is a true Irish gentleman and loves Bluegrass Music. The staff is pleasant and capable in this family friendly venue and the food is excellent. They offer traditional Irish fare and other dining favorites on their menu, including excellent pizza and burgers. If you are really hungry, the full order of fish and chips will not disappoint. Paul tells us that this is one of their best-selling items and, after sampling them, you will understand why. During the shutdown, they chose to stay closed for a few months, using the time to give the building some care by refinishing nearly all of the interior wood surfaces (bar area, floors, and tables) and to apply a coat of fresh wall paint, keeping Paul and some of their employees busy when no work was available. Should you need a room for a private event, Molly's has two upper floors specifically designed for this purpose. The rooms are cozy and fully equipped, with elevator access available. 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Interview with The Old D-28 - by Brian Buckley

"Good Morning, folks! I'm Boone Picker, your host for the Bluegrass Radio Moment. Now, I've been listening to the CD by the Forest Hills Bluegrass Band called *Mighty Fine to Pick with You*. I was trying to decide who I wanted to have on the show and thought, dagnabbit - that's what I thought - I want to talk to that geetar! So without further ado, here's the Old D-28. How you been?" "I'm doing well," said D-28.

"So, you're the guitar of Brian Buckley. How long has that relationship been going on?"

"Well, I found him working in a bar in 1977. We both instantly knew it was a good match."

"Is that where your career started?"

"Oh, no. I was bought new in 1971 by a local country musician named Johnny Roy. His band was Johnny Roy and the Roy Boys. They worked in the country bars."

"And did Johnny introduce you to Brian?"

"No. I was sold off to a fellow named Pee Wee who worked in a paper mill in Lockland, Ohio."

"Then Pee Wee brought you in to the bar to meet Brian?" "No. Pee Wee was in a card game with Mike L. He was losing bad and he had no money. Mike was a pretty hot tempered guy and Pee Wee handed me over to him as payment in full."

"Oh, my. He must have been about \$1000 in the hole." "No, \$100."

"A hundred dollars?"

"Yeah, he sold me cheap. He didn't know better. Pee Wee had me strung up wrong. There was a D string where the low E should be and a B string where the D should be. My bridge was pulling up."

"You were neglected,"

"I tried to manage."

"And did Mike L treat you better?"

"Mike only saw me as a pay day. He knew I was worth more, because of my Martin heritage. So, he was the one that introduced me to Brian"

"You must have felt used, abused, and made to feel cheap. When you saw Brian, what was different?"

"Right away, he recognized that I needed to be taken care of. I was a little worried at first, because he asked why Mike brought me there. It was shocking to me, because I know Martin guitar people and I knew he wanted a Martin for a long time, but he started acting coy."

"How so?", asked Boone Picker.

"He asked Mike how much he wanted for me and Mike hesitated a bit and said, 'Well, I have to get \$350'."

"Oh, my. That must've made you feel undervalued. Brian probably jumped right on that price."

"No. He said he'd give him \$200."

"That must've been humiliating."

"At first, I thought so, but I noticed something Mike didn't. You see, when Mike said '\$350', I could've sworn I saw Brian choke back a laugh."

"So he tried to make Mike believe his offer was too high." "Exactly. Brian made a phone call to local flatpicking legend, Dave Pinson, who told Brian if he didn't buy me right now, he'd come down and buy me."

"So he paid him and you went home with him that night!"
"No, Brian had to wait until payday. And he still wouldn't have enough. So he borrowed \$150 from his Mom. He picked me up on the following Sunday morning. The following day, he took me to the Famous Old Time Music Store and Rich fixed me up. When Brian asked how much the repair was, Rich said, '\$60, but I'll give you \$650 for the guitar right now'. At first I was scared. I didn't want to be sold again. But Brian knew that if Rich was offering \$650, I must be worth double. So, he paid the \$60 and took me to work with him."

"How did that go?", asked Boone Picker.

"Well, nobody was in the bar, so Brian got me out and started playing me. Then Mike L came in with his brother and a friend."

"Really! And?"

"Yes. After a few minutes Mike said, 'How you like the Martin?' Brian said, 'I love it.' Then Mike started laughing and said, 'I took you, boy! I won that from Pee Wee in a card game for \$100!"

"Oh no...."

"But Brian waited until they quit laughing and said, 'That's interesting. I just had it fixed up and the dealer offered me \$650 for it.' Then Mike's face turned bright red. His brother and friend started laughing at Him. Mike roared angrily, 'YOU KNEW!' But Brian stayed calm and said, 'Yeah, Mike, I knew. But we both won. You got \$250 more than you expected and I got a Martin.'"

"What did Mike say?"

"He said, 'I'll give you \$350 for it right now.' But that wasn't going to happen."

"So how would you describe being with Brian for these last 40 odd years?"

"Well, he was young and didn't know how to treat me. He'd leave me out in the car in all kinds of weather. I knew he loved me, but he just didn't understand. After awhile, my braces started getting (continued on next page)





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loose and my neck started getting out of joint. He found me to be unplayable, so he started exploring other guitars, something he still does."

"What became of you through all that?"

"One day, in 1993, Brian decided he wanted to get me fixed, so he contacted Martin and spoke to a repairman who told him to ship me back to them, which he did. A week or so later, they told him I needed a neck reset, braces re-glued, and my intonation fixed. It ended up costing him \$750, but when I came back about 6 months later, he couldn't believe how easily I played. It rekindled the flame."

"So you're his exclusive once again?"

"Well, no. He still runs around with other guitars. But, I am his exclusive for the Forest Hills Bluegrass Band. And he's recorded with me several times over the years."

"Well, I like to end on a positive note. So, D-28, thank you for being my guest today on Boone Picker's Bluegrass Radio Moment!"
