Jocalyn Raymond, of the Institute of Child Study, explored this problem in a newspaper article recently.

"During their leisure time these children learn something about choosing their own goal and working toward them; they have the opportunity to decide how they will spend this time; they learn to use a variety of materials such as clay, paint, wood; they indluge in a variety of activities such as sports, cooking, collecting, music, dancing. Those children whose leisure time is spend chiefly in music leasons or dancing lessons which are adult-directed activities, are not going to have the same opportunity for learning self-direction.

"Children of this age (10 to 13) usually have acquired such basic skills as skatting, swimming, throwing and catching a ball and are ready for team games such as hockey, bashetball, volleyball, baseball. Although they need and look to adults for help in organizing team games for instruction often they will organize their own games. Since their friends are important at this age, a great deal of leisure time will be spent in group activities.

"At home a basketball hoop, hockey net, ping pong table give them opportunity to perfect their

"Children of this age group en-joy individual sports such as bad-minton; tennis, riding target shoot-ing, skating, golf. Through these they develop concentration and persistence and acquire skills that carry over into adult life.

"Pre-adolescents enjoy carpen-try, painting, sewing, cooking, making mode is of planes and cars. These activities may be carried on with other children or alone. It is important for the child to learn that he can have fun by himself.

have been improved nutritionally. Enriched bread, vitaminized apple jutce and powdered milk are three boons to health.

But, as far as the general public is concerned, resistance to knowledge of nutrition is still strong. "People like to eat," says Miss Garvock, "but they seem to think he pleasure of eatfly will be taken, way if they pay attention to nutrion."

Apparently this is not the first time that either the Mayor or member of the council have been asked to assist traffic offenders. "All such applicants have been, and will continue to be given the same answer - a firm and unequivocal "no", said a council spokesman.

DORVAL Sports on Parade

On October 2nd more than two months ago, we published in this column a motion passed at a Dorval Recreation Association meeting which read so follows: The Dorval Recreation Association will establish a separate committee to form a city-wide winter sports program which will embrace hockey leagues and other winter activities. Funds for the undertaking to be raised by requesting donations from all of our Community Associations and by asking for an operational fee from participating families.

Bill Barkas, Len Dullege, Pete Read, Al Brown and Pete Stefanik are well known hockey organisers, like by everyone who has had dealings with them. All have many years of experience behind them and their previous successis were not lucky ones but due primarily to their knowledge, with some hard work thrown in. Things will run smoothly under their direction.

We also need some luck, weather-wise. Two months of hard work, planning, and organising, plus the best direction possible will not be enough if we don't get hockey weather. We sincerely hope that the weather will cooperate so as to not disappoint anybody, the children especially. Whatever happens due to the weather the Dorval Recreation Association cannot be blamed for it. Their first goal was to organise hockey on a City-wide basis and this they have achieved.

The City council has promised full cooperation in the maintenance of the hockey rinks and to improve lightning system where needed. Additional quarters are to be provided for Riverside Park.

Official Q. M.H.A. registration cards are on their way to the district supervisors and teams will soon be formed, so boyskeep posted on hockey news. It's only a matter of weeks now and you will be able to show what you can do.

The schedules are being drawn up and with the beginning of the season set for Saturday, December the 27th, there inn't much time left. We hope that all rinks will be ready before hand, so that coaches will have achance to make a fair choice of players. They must see the boys in action two or three times before making up their minds, and the many new boys deserve a fair try-out.

The Dorval Recreation Association Hockey Funds campaign is under-way and reports are slowly coming in. A few very generous donations have already reached the D.R.A. headquarters. Everyone is invited to subscribe and helo make this worthwhile campaign a real success.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Use your silver polish to re-move stains on the bottom of your iron. Rub on a small amount, then wipe off with a damp cloth.

Varnish, lacquer, or shellac should not be used to protect linoleum. Wax provides the best protection. Experts rec-ommend a water-base self-polishing wax because it washes off easily.

Split a lemon half-way through lengthwise before cutting it into rounds. It saves time as well as cut fingers when preparing lemon slices for ired tea.

Wrap sprinkled laundry loosely in a plastic sheet or bag. This helps distribute moisture evenly and prevents clothes from drying.

Baking dishes will come clean more easily if they are soaked in hot water and suds while still warm from the oven. Use a stiff brush on

Perhaps the highest use of books is not as sources of information about nations, people, or foreign lands, but as friends. Reading is one of the most effective means of getting away from disturbing and unalterable circumstances. Intimate association with noble works, literary, philophic, artitle, is a promoter of thought, a refuge from almost all the miseries of life.

Books are good for us because they tend to shake us up. Our environment is confusing because it is made up of a tangle of complicated notions, in the midst of which individuals are inclined to sit apthetically, where the limits of the most of the past of th

plicated notions, in the midst of which individuals are inclined to sit aphetically.
What we find in books can make us look again at things we have taken for granted, and question them, it can arouse us to appreciate once more the ideas and ideals that are being stilled under the lava flow of technical marvels. If a book moves us to thought, even to angry thought, the chances are that it is doing us a good turn.

Lastly in this brief tabulation of the value of reading, consider the person who seeks ability in self-expression. The woman who whise to excel in conversations and the man who must make his letters and orders clear; both these need to read wisely.

Reading in technical books, learned journals and trade magarines is necessary according to a man's way of making a living, but this reading should not be the end.
A person who has to fit his life into a groove in his daily work may become a unique individual in his reading. He may have a dual lifer as a business man among scholars and as a scholar among business men.

A skilled artisan, extremely wise in matters of his own art, is cheating himself of the greatness in life that might be his if he reads nothing else but technical books and newspapers.

Search for knowledge

The person who reads wisely and often finds that he has the enormous advantage of knowing more about his subject than others do Knowledge builds self-confidence and self-reliance.

Books will provide us with the material information we can use to answer vital questions. When we are puzzled as to why human beings behave as they do we cannot find the answer in our surroundings but in the loag perspective of history.

A person reading well-selected books becomes a denize no fall nations, a contemporary of all ages. In his books he meets all kinds of people, the wisest, the wittlest and the tenderest.

How are we to go about selecting the books to read? Shall we use the time-honoured formulat chose the books you would like to have with you if you were wrecked on a desert island? Shall we read Sir John Lubbock's hundred best books, or the other hundred selection by his imitators?

Selection of books to read is

highly personal. Whatever the learned may say in praise of a book, it is not for you unless you can get interested in it. And literature suited to desolate islands may not be the thing at all for reading on a bus or train or airplane, or at a lunch counter.

One guide can be stated without aguivocation: If you want to be virailized into the power of thinking real thoughts; if you wish to be qualified to debate the issues of the day; then resolutely leave out whatever is not of the best. To spend time on naughty narratives in a worldthath olds Hugo and Dickens and Toynbee, Shelley and Shakespeare and Ghurchill, its like being told you may have your choice of allthe diamonds in Tiffany's, and then walking out with a bit of broken glass. Or, as Rukin putit: "Will you go and gosip with your housemaid or your stalke boy, when you may talk with queens and kings?"



Assessment In **Dorval Jumps** For 1959

A break down of private dwel-lings showing the middle class nature of the city has been issued by Dorval City Council.

Of the 4,022 residences, 1,521 or 38 per cent are assessed at below \$10,000; 1,860, or 46 per cent, are assessed at between \$10.005, 000; 365, or 9 per cent, at \$15.20, 000, and \$276 (7 per cent) at over \$20,000. In this latter groups there are 76 homes in the \$100,000 and up category. Assessment is based on about \$80 per cent of market value.

Overall residential assessment works out to approximately 47 per cent of the City's 1959 roll. In-dustrial assessment, comprising 31 per cent of the total figure, repre-sents an increase of 17 per cent over the 1958 figure.

Recreation Program Reviewed

The Lakeshore Welfare Service The Lakeshore Welfare Service has completed year-end reports about 1958 playgrounds to Lakeshore cities and towns, reports George Semyk, Director of Recreation. Three part-time and eighteen full-time playlots and playgrounds were operated by the agency, from Baie d'Urice in the west to Dorval in the east, under the guidance of a staff of twenty nine supervisors and playleaders, and thirteen volunteers.

and playleaders, and thirteen volunteers.

Total registration for all activities was 2700 children between the ages of 6 and 14. An attendance of over 100,000 was recorded at planned or supervised activities.

**Seconded was the carval visitor who did not register but came only to relax and enjoy himself by watching, talking or just plain sitting. The registration ranged from 40 for the timest part-time playlor to nearly 300 for the largest play-field, with attendance from 600 at the former to 17,400 for the later. This is considered surprisingly good in view of the fact that poor weather and holidays stopped playground operation for approximately 25% of the time.

An excellent safety record was set up. No serious accidents of any kind were reported to the Director, outside of the usual quota of child-hood scrapes and bruises. The staff threw themselves wholeheartedly into the jobs and gave excellent supervision and leadership. All but seven of them were Lakeshore residents. If any replacements will be needed next summer. The most popular activities were games and sports, and the use of playground apparatus such as swings and sandboxes. Following closely in popularity were atts and crafts, off-playground trips and hikes and special events. The highlights of these were the craft competitions, the British Empire Games, beach trips, and the Red Feather penny fairs. Other programs included story-telling, sing-songs, table games, dancing and dramatics. The learn-to-swim campaign saw almost 240 certificates of different levels of progress given to participants. The wide range of activities offered gave just about every child a chance to take part in some recreation of his own liking.

Recommendations have been made to the various committees in hopesthat more playground service and even better programs will be available to young Lakeshore citizens next year. The Director of Recreation will be contacting and recruiting staff in the near future and making plans for the presummer training session.


