PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE:

There is a place in Princeton that I truly miss this time of year. I used to walk my dog there on a daily basis. The trail began by crossing a revolutionary battlefield, to a roadway of Fall colors. The massive, ancient trees there turned amazingly glorious colors this time of year, one walked under a canopy of yellow on a path of fallen golden leaves. It was magical; it was breath-taking. The road took one to a wooded area that leads in a circle around lake of the Institute for Advance Studies; my dog would swim there. I loved the serenity of the place. It was quiet and holy.

Along the way, one encountered the old Stony Creek Quaker church and its cemetery. Dating back to 1726 (but still active for Sunday worship today), the stone structure and rough-hewn pews invited one to rest and contemplate. There is a Friend's school there, where sometimes I could hear the children play. I often walked among the stone slab tombstones of the cemetery there, where saints, governors and signers of the Declaration of Independence were buried. I studied their names and marveled at their memories. I reflected on the ways that they had created the beautiful world in which I was walking a dog in utter bliss, peace, and joy.

Whenever October comes around, I long for that place, and yes, for that old cemetery and for that feeling. All Saint's Day is coming, and it is an invitation to reflect on the history and people that have made us what we are. This being our 150th year, I have learned so much about the people who have made this church who we are – I have sat in our chapel and contemplated the changes that have happened over the years. It is a rich inheritance. When I came here, that history became my history, that heritage became my heritage.

But nothing has impacted me as much as the funerals I have performed since coming here. Early this year, there were 19 funerals between Christmas and March, the vast majority of them were for individuals who were close to 90, but not all. This was very significant to me. I have been here long enough to have experienced attachment and loss. I have also been here long enough to feel pride and inspiration in each life and to reflect on the ways they shaped my world. I have become attached to names of people I never knew, who passed away years before I got here; they are now part of my sense of meaning and purpose because I know what they meant to many of you.

The last day of October is All Saints Day, and on the first Sunday of November we will ruminate and celebrate the impact of those who have passed. We will call out the names in reverence at the table of the

Lord, and it is my hope that in so doing, we can evoke the awe and gratitude that I used to feel in that old Quaker cemetery. It has been hard to see a generation pass into eternity, no matter how much such passings are part of the normal life cycle. But it has not been hard to feel joy about rich lives lived, gratitude for lives of support and service, and inspiration from stories of bravery, purpose, and humor. It makes me feel rich in the kind of wealth that really matters. Those who have passed never really go away. They are part of us now.

And the promise of God is still true – their lives will continue to take on meaning as we grow on the foundation they laid for us. Thanks be to God for the generations of First Presbyterian until we join them at the great table of God's Kingdom.

"A Word with Wanona" - I have the pleasure to introduce you to Mary & Keith Magnusson.

Mary was born and raised, along with three older brothers on a small farm in Holton, Kansas, a small town of about 3,000 people and graduated from Holton High School. Her first job, when she was a high school sophomore, was a clerk in the local drug store, which at one time had an old soda fountain. Sadly, the fountain had been taken out by the time she was old enough to work, so it was no longer the boy/girl hangout it had once been, and she found working there as just a boring job to satisfy her parents. Mary's favorite job was a bank teller. During her second year of college at Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas she was working at a bank in the drive-up branch. It was there when a cute guy drove up to her window to

make a bank deposit for the law firm where he clerked. He mentioned he was attending Washburn Law School and suggested they meet at the student union for a coke. That led to several movie dates and about a year and half later, the special date at the United Methodist Church in Holton where Keith and Mary were married March 10, 1973.

For the last 50 years Mary has been thankful for marrying a small town (Presbyterian) boy from ND, raising a beautiful daughter with him, and going on a wonderful life journey together. During this journey, she fulfilled the goals of getting her undergraduate degree in accounting from Jacksonville State University when Keith and Mary lived in Alabama, and later when they lived in Bismarck, getting an MBA from UND through the interactive video program. Mary has worked in business administration as director of the ND Coalition for Homeless People, Resource Development Director for the



Baptist Home, and Director of the Bismarck Senior Center and Burleigh County Senior Adults Program



from which she retired following breast cancer treatment. Mary is thankful for all the support from their church family during treatment! As a member of First Presbyterian, Mary, also is thankful for the experiences of teaching Sunday School, serving in Presbyterian Women, and being an Elder and Deacon, all of which have been a vital part of her faith journey.

Keith was born in Rolla, ND and raised in Rolette, ND along with his younger brother. A fun fact: Judy Lentz's older sister was one of Keith's first babysitters! At the age of five he started working in his father's grocery store in Rolette, a town of about 450 people. Keith graduated from Rolette High School, then he attended the University of North Dakota, and graduated in 1968 in accounting. Having been in ROTC for four years, he was then commissioned in the US Army Signal Corps (communications). He was on active duty for the next two years; the last year was in Vietnam. In 1976, Keith left active duty, but stayed in the Army Reserve, and returned to ND until he started law school at Washburn University in Topeka, KS.

As Mary stated, they met through the motor bank window. This was the most memorable event in his life! Keith is thankful that they are still going strong after 50 years. After they were married in 1973, and Keith graduated from law school, he went back on active duty as an Army lawyer (JAG) for two years, during which time they were stationed at Fort Gordon, GA and Fort McClellan, AL. In 1976, he again left active duty but stayed in the Reserves. They moved to North Dakota and lived in East Grand Forks for a short time, then moved to Lakota for a couple of years before settling in Bismarck. While in the Reserves, Keith was mobilized for Desert Shield/Desert Storm, and served several Reserve assignments, including commanding a Law

Center in Salt Lake City. Keith retired as a Colonel. On the civilian side, he worked as a lawyer in several capacities, including private practice, government relations (both inside and outside of government), association law, and prosecution. The third part of his career was in teaching part time at four colleges and universities. Now that they are both retired, Mary and Keith are making the most of their time split between winters in Florida and summers in ND.

Sock-it-to-me Sunday was a huge success. Thank you to all the young people who caught the flying socks, those who tossed the socks, and those who donated the socks. We collected nearly 400 pairs of socks: 269 pairs of adult socks and 111 pairs of children's socks.

The socks were distributed at Project Service Connect, an annual one-stop shop event sponsored by the Missouri Valley Coalition for Homeless People. This one-day event provides individuals, elderly and families who need services, are homeless or who are at risk of homelessness with information on vital community resources and support. Local agencies and organizations will also provide free products such as socks, hygiene products, immunizations on site, free haircuts, and more. Thank you to all who participated!

HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE - Supporting the AARC

During October, the Hospitality Committee will be collecting personal hygiene products for the Abused Adult Resource Center (AARC). Donations such as soap and shampoo, razors, toothbrushes, tooth paste or feminine hygiene products are welcome. All items can be dropped off at the donation box in the church narthex.

The Abused Adult Resource Center has been helping survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault for more than 40 years. Serving south central North Dakota, they provide emergency support, crisis intervention, temporary shelter, food, counseling, and advocacy to survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

Funding to support the Abused Adult Resource Center is a patchwork of many sources: foundation grants, the United Way, state and federal programs, profits from Seeds of Hope gift store as well as corporate and individual gifts.

The AARC provides all of its services to victims free of charge.



The Child Care Center News:

The FPC Childcare Center staff and the CCC Board members want to pass along a few safety reminders for a safe and fun Halloween!

- If there are Halloween activities offered earlier in the day or week, and if it's possible with your schedule, consider attending these with your child/children. Parents or adults should always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds. Pay close attention and examine ALL treats for any unwrapped or suspicious items! If it's dark when trick or treating, its always a good idea to carry battery working flashlights, and if possible, put reflective tape on costumes and trick or treating bags. Only go to homes with a porch light on. Always use the sidewalks, instead of cutting across yards or alleys.
- Its always a good idea to have your child eat a good meal prior to going to parties, or trick or treating, to help discourage over eating and filling up on Halloween treats! When handing out treats, consider non edible treats, such as glow sticks, pencils, erasers, finger puppets, bookmarks, stickers, stencils, bubbles, bouncy balls. Keep in mind age appropriate items and candy to prevent choking hazards with babies and toddlers!
