LEIVAN CLINCHES CANNON CREEK ENDURO

September 8, 1996 Collins, MO

Steve Leivan was the Overall winner of the Cannon Creek Enduro, round 8 of the Black Jack Enduro Circuit, held on the 1000 acre Eagle Gun & Sports Ranch in Collins, MO. The night before the event, a light shower covered the course which settled the dust and made conditions perfect for the majority of the race. The trail consisted of rocky single track, power-line sections, rocky creeks, and fire roads. Many speed changes and resets were incorporated into the lay out, which saw short course riders go 47 route sheet miles, B riders rode 70, and the AA and A riders went 75.

Check two was the first check that took points from all riders with Leivan and his Yamaha leading the way with a 1:14. Steve Travis, on a Honda was next fastest with a 1:23, ahead of Rusty Reynaud carding a 1:27. Check three would prove to be the downfall for Travis as he suffered a two point penalty for burning the check. The first section of loop two was run at 18 mph and the riders were checked at the end of it with a tie-breaker. Again, Leivan was tops, with a :32, while Travis and Reynaud checked in on the early side of a perfect 30 with a :23 and :25, respectivley.

The final two checks were run at 24 mph and Leivan, Reynaud, and Travis recorded identical 3's at check nine and 6's at check ten. When the scores were tallied, Surdyke Racing/Answer/Scott/Dunlop/Sprocket Specialists/RK Chain/Mikes Machine/Fredette Racing/Motorcycle Stuff/Pro Action/NGK backed Leivan had secured the win on his WR 250, with a score of 10;46 ahead of KTM 360 mounted Reynaud who finished with a 10:62. Travis would claim third with 12:60.

Allen Haynes took another win in the 250 A class, dropping 12 points and finishing fourth Overall. Jamie Jennings rode his Honda to second in class with a 16 point ride and Jim Ingram finished third on his Suzuki with a 17. Steve Underwood was the victor in the Open A class ahead of Jac Richmond and Jim Brawner. The Overall B rider on the day was 250 B competitor, James Eliff with an eight point ride. He finished ahead of Slade Morlang and David Gerbes who carded 10's.

Overall short course rider, Drew Chandler, out of the 250 C class, took the trophy on tiebreakers ahead of Sportsman A winner, Randy Presthus. In the 200 C class, Matt Glenn was tops, ahead of close finishers Robert Stuckert, Tyler Steele, and Adam Bieschke, who were seperated by only five seconds.



David Dillingham was the winner of the Open division, ahead of fellow big-bore KTM riders Dave Haworth and J.R. Hansen. In the Vet class, John Newberry took the win follwed by Dave Jeffery and Bart Williams. Williams may have had the comeback of the day after completing lap one in 17th position due to a locking-up steering damper. After pitting to remove the device, Williams, made up almost three minutes and twenty seconds in the remaining five laps to finish third, 59 seconds behind winner Newberry.
