New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

WHAT ARE YOU WAITING FOR?

I once watched an episode of the show Dumbest Daredevils or Partiers. It was about two girlfriends atop a bungalow. Their idea of fun was to jump off the roof, sail over a 15 - 20 feet long concrete yard, and make it into this alluring



swimming pool below. The first girl backed up, sped off and sailed into the air. She cleared the yard and splashed into the welcoming pool. Her friend backed up, half-heartedly ran forward and braked just in time before she could sail off. Her courageous friend cheered her on, reassuring her

of how easy it was and instructing her on what to do. This scene was repeated over and over again. Finally, she backed off, a serious look of determination on her face. She ran forward and just when the viewers thought she was going for it, she hesitated. It was too late. She was already half way in the air. The crash was painfully disastrous to me who was watching. She was rushed to the hospital with multiple fractures.

I look around and I see so much indecision in and around us all and in society. And it seems to be growing more and more each day. Last Sunday's readings touched on how we use our intelligence when it comes to worldly things and how we must utilize the same intelligence in the more important area of our relationship with God, and in things that concern our future life (eternal life). I think we generally tend to be also very decisive when it comes to worldly things and then we dilly-dally in spiritual and moral things. Like the girl on the roof, we back up, ready to make the leap (change or whatever), only to break off, sometimes at the very last moment or even a little into the task. And it is not that we don't know what is required of us.

The scriptures say:

"For this commandment which I command you today, it is not too mysterious for you, nor is it far off. It is not in heaven, that you should say, 'Who will ascend into heaven for us and bring it to us, that we may hear it and do it?' Nor is it beyond the sea, that you should say, 'Who will go over to the sea for us and bring it to us, that we may hear it and do it?' But the word is very near you, in your mouth and in your heart, that you may do it" (Deuteronomy 30:11-14).

So, we do know what is required of us, just like the girl knew what is required of her. And we do have people (friends, family members, co-workers, pastors, authority voices, even enemies, etc.) that remind us of what is required of us. Yet we dilly-dally. We hesitate. We grow cold feet or rather frozen feet.

But we're not alone. In the Gospel today (Luke 16:19-31) we have a very familiar story: the story of the rich man (or dives, as they were called in those days) and the poor man, Lazarus. I invite us to focus on the request of the rich man, now suffering in the flames of the netherworld. "Then I beg you, father, send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, so that he may warn them, lest they too come to this place of torment."

Abraham responded:

"They have Moses and the prophets. Let them listen to them."

Notice how he protested further, filled with filial concern:

"Oh no, father Abraham, but if someone from the dead goes to them, they will repent."

Abraham's final response is very pragmatic and shows a reality that we very often overlook.

"If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead."

Sadly, Abraham was very right then. And he's still right today. You and I know what is required of us in worldly things and more so, in spiritual and moral things. Why do we very often hesitate like the girl on the roof; or worse still, why do we ignore them like the dives in the gospel, even when what is required of us stares us in the face. Are we waiting for someone from hell to come and warn us of what is waiting for us if we continue to ignore God's injunctions?

We pray for the grace to do what is good always.


THE HOMEBOUND: St. Bartholomew's Parish wishes to show our love and care for our members who for reasons of health or infirmity cannot be with us as we gather for Mass each week. Our aim is for all parishioners who are homebound, permanently or temporarily, to be visited by a Priest and/or an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion on a regular basis.

Often we will hear of someone who is homebound and has not been receiving the Eucharist for a long time, although this individual may have been, during healthier times, a very devout Catholic. Often we will hear that the person didn't want to "bother anyone" or "put anyone out." Often these individuals become our "hidden Catholics" and we sometimes don't learn of them until years later when we celebrate their funeral liturgy.

We want our sick and homebound to know they are valued members of our parish and we want to bring Jesus to them. **However, we need your help.** These individuals are often hidden in our community and only a neighbor knows of their presence. Please help by personally contacting those homebound Catholics whom you know of and telling them of our availability and deep desire to bring the Eucharist to them. We are flexible and very willing to work around their personal needs and schedules. If you know of a homebound Catholic who would like to receive the Eucharist please contact Cheryl Duda at 476-6676 or the Rectory at 965-0566.

From time to time, we receive calls inquiring about "companions and aides" for the elders in our community. If you are or someone you know is qualified and can help "seniors", please contact the Parish Office.
