### FROM THE PASTOR

After King Herod died, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt. "Get up," the angel said, "and take the child and its mother and go to the land of Israel. Those who were trying to kill the child are dead. Joseph got up, took the child and his mother and went to the land of Israel. But, when he heard that Archelaus ruled over Judea in place of his father, Herod, Joseph was afraid to go there. Having been warned in a dream, he went to Galilee. He settled in city called Nazareth, so that what was speaking through the prophets might be fulfilled: he will be called a Nazarene.

Matthew 2:19-23 NRSV



Did you ever wonder how Jospeh, Mary and Jesus ended up in Nazareth? That town didn't appear in any of their genealogies. They had no acquaintances there, let alone relatives. And, in those days, you didn't just up and move. Your life was carefully planned. You didn't deviate from it. You spent most of your life in the same general area, where your family was. Unless, of course, you were raising the Son of God and directed by angels. Then, life took on a whole new meaning and purpose.

Can you even begin to imagine how Joseph felt? This whirlwind had descended on him. All because he loved a girl named Mary, and believed her when she said she would bear the Son of God. Because of his belief in her and his faith in

God, Joseph became the earthly father of Jesus. He was guided by angels. He moved around at their direction. He taught the basics of faith to the boy who would become the man on the cross. He was used by God.

This is a new year. It has to be better than the last year. But, didn't we say that about 2021? I suppose we did. The truth is, we don't know what 2022 will bring. But, we know what it will NOT bring: anything that can separate us from God. When we read of Joseph, Mary and Jesus moving around, we wonder: who was their support? Who did Mary talk to? Who did Joseph confide in? The answer to that question is the same for both of them: God. We don't know about the human side of those conversations, except Mary's Magnificat. We do know about God's side, as related to both of them through angelic messages. And, those messages, combined with their faith in the One who sent them, was enough to get them through: through Jesus' birth, through the flight to Egypt to escape Herod's wrath, through the return to Nazareth, through Jesus' childhood and adulthood, his ministry, his crucifixion and his resurrection.

We aren't all the recipients of angelic messages. But, we would certainly be open to them if God decided to send one! But, we are the recipients of God's grace, which is enough to see us through whatever 2022 might throw at us.

I do pray for all of you, that 2022 will be a year filled with good things. If it is that for you, God is there. If it isn't for you, God is there. God will always be there.

# Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the church will be Sunday, January 30, 2022. We will review 2021 church records, approve the 2022 budget, elect members to various committees and elect the council moderator for 2022 meetings. The meeting will start shortly after Sunday's worship service and replaces the regular January church council meeting.

We are hosting a Red Cross blood drive in the Fellowship Hall of the church on Monday, February 7 from 2 - 7 p.m.). #### New Roof

UPDATE: The trustees are continuing the work to replace the church roof. They are hard at work finalizing the grant application.

Although the present roof is in no immediate need of repair, it **is** 35-40 years old. A "roof fund" was set up over the summer and we've received some donations for it. We thank all who have contributed to this fund and any additional contributions will be greatly appreciated. The trustees will be applying for a grant in January 2022 to cover some of the cost. Moving ahead with roof replacement next year would be contingent on obtaining a grant. We will continue keep all informed of the results of this grant.

### Worship Services:

We continue to not require the wearing of masks. Depending on each person's comfort level, we even dispense hugs to our fellow congregation members - or accept them! There is no more special pew markings and members and visitors are welcome to sit where they wish. There are masks available should you choose to wear one (and have forgotten yours).

We understand the hesitancy and safety concerns of some folk. Therefore, for those who cannot attend, or who are still not yet comfortable attending public services, we are continuing to tape and post Sunday's service that Sunday afternoon on our Facebook page. However, the tapes are audio only (similar to a podcast) and we are recording only the scripture readings and Pastor Sue's sermon. 
- Sunday, January 2 (11 a.m.): New Year's Celebration Potluck. Join us as we celebrate the start of a fresh new year! All are welcome.


