Betty Crocker Timeline

- 1856 The company that will evolve into Washburn-Crosby in the 1870s begins as the Minneapolis Milling Company
- 1880 Washburn-Crosby flour brands win medals at a millers' exhibition in Cincinnati, causing them to launch Gold Medal flour brand
- 1921 Betty Crocker invented following a contest in the Saturday Evening Post
- 1924 Betty Crocker Cooking School of the Air debuts on a Minneapolis radio station. It will eventually be carried nationally on NBC Radio.
- 1928 Washburn Crosby merges with other milling companies to form General Mills
- 1929 Betty Crocker coupons introduced inserted in bags of flour; coupons could be used to reduce the cost of flatware. The coupon program will continue until 2006.
- 1936 First portrait of Betty Crocker is unveiled
- 1945 *Fortune* magazine names Betty Crocker the second best-known woman in America, behind only Eleanor Roosevelt. Surveys show 99% of American housewives are familiar with her
- 1947 Betty Crocker cake mixes debut
- 1949-1964 Adelaide Hawley Cumming portrays Betty Crocker on television
- 1950 Betty Crocker Picture Cook Book debuts with initial print run of 950,000
- 1954 General Mills brands the red spoon logo
- 1996 A 75th anniversary portrait of Betty Crocker debuts, partially inspired by a "computerized composite" of 75 women of diverse backgrounds and ages
- 2016 Twelfth edition of the *Betty Crocker Cookbook* is published
