Yard waste and leaves must be containerized, bagged or tied into bundles that do not exceed four feet in length and four inches in diameter with limbs and branches.

Yard waste pick up will reopen for two weeks only, January 4-15, for Christmas trees.

Plowing the roads in Painesville is a full time job. During the winter months, the City works around the clock with two shifts every day. When the snow is heavy, those shifts become 12 hours to keep up with Mother Nature.

• In all, the City of Painesville has seven snow plow trucks in commission, all with salt spreaders. Roads are plowed in order of importance - starting with emergency routes, busy roads, hills and bridges. Once those roads are cleared, the secondary streets are plowed.

• There is an automatic parking ban when two inches of snow falls within 24 hours.

• Keep your snow on your own property! Plowing into the street is dangerous for other drivers and doubles our plow drivers' workload when they are trying to keep the streets safe.

City of Painesville Announces the Resignation of City Manager Monica Irelan

announced that she has accepted the position of City Manager Westerville, Ohio and will in resigning her Painesville be post effective December 11, 2020. Painesville City Council appointed Irelan to City Manager in December 2016.

"Westerville is а great opportunity for the next step in my career but it was a very difficult decision to leave Painesville," said Irelan. "This community is so unique and charming in many ways and I really found a home

City Manager Monica Irelan here. With Painesville City staff, we have accomplished so much in a short period of time and I know their hard work and dedication to this community will continue, no matter who is in the City Manager's chair."

Since Irelan took over as City Manager four years ago, the City has seen measurable growth, especially in City Council's Strategic Plan focus of customer service, areas community investment, improved infrastructure and safety.

Under City Council and Irelan's direction, communication and customer service became a priority through the implementation of new modern software in utilities, code enforcement, recreation, human resources and finance departments. full-time communications А position was established to direct day-to-day communications and engagement with the community, which significantly improved relationships with

residents, business owners and the workforce.

Recently, Painesville has also seen an increase in population and growth in housing options. According to Crain's Cleveland, Painesville's median household income jumped an estimated 45% over the last three years. New investment in Victoria Place, the former Chase Bank building and the new Signature Heath Painesville Medical Center are significant indicators of growth in community and economic investment.

Aging infrastructure has long been an issue in Painesville. Under City Council's direction, Irelan and staff put together a rolling 5-year road plan that included water, sewer and street improvements. The plan utilized the road levy and more than doubled the funds for road projects with regional and state grants. The new water intake project was also constructed and completed under her tenure.

for Administration, with residents approving a 5-year Police levy in 2019 to hire additional officers and install a new intersection camera system to deter crime. Irelan had the opportunity to appoint two new chiefs: Chief Dan Waterman in Police and Chief Tom Hummel in Fire. City safety forces also saw equipment and vehicle upgrades under their new leadership.

Painesville City Council is currently working on a transition plan while they search for the next Painesville City Manager. After December 11, an interim manager will be appointed until the position is filled.

Westerville, Ohio is а northeastern suburb of Columbus with roughly 37,000 residents and is home to Otterbein University. Similar to Painesville, Westerville operates its own public utilities.





Keep, Change, or Update Your Marketplace Plan

Time is running out for those with 2020 ACA Marketplace health insurance to renew, change, or update their plans for 2021. The Marketplace Open Enrollment Period ends Tuesday, December 15, 2020.

If you have a Marketplace plan, you should have already received two letters: one from your current insurance company and one from the Marketplace. Together they explain:

- Your 2021 coverage status





Audubon Seeks Counters for Christmas Bird Census

invites everyone to add to a century of science during the 121st annual Christmas Bird Count Saturday, December 26.

Blackbrook encourages anyone interested in birding to join the CBC in one of two ways: in the field or from the comfort of your own home. Everyone will bird safely following the current Covid-19 guidelines.

The object of the CBC is to count all the bird species and number of birds in a 15-mile diameter circle in one 24-hour period between December 14 and January 5. Anyone living within the circle can also report birds at their feeder.

Blackbrook's CBC circle covers from Lost Nation Airport to Western Perry, Lake Erie down to Holden Arboretum and Big Creek Park in Geauga County.

Blackbrook Audubon's territory covers Ashtabula, Geauga and Lake counties. The Ashtabula CBC circle is centered east of Kingsville. Marc Hanneman compiles that count, which will be Saturday, January 2, 2021. Contact Marc at marchanneman(\hat{a}) embarqmail.com to help with that count.

The CBC circle for Geauga County is centered west of Burton. Their count will also be January 2 and is compiled by Linda Gilbert, a naturalist with Geauga Park District. She can be reached at lgilbert@geaugaparkdistrict.org.

Circles for the count stretch from Arctic Bay, Baffin Island in Canada to a NOAA research vessel in the Drake Passage at the southern-most tip of South America; as far west as Guam in the Pacific to the eastern tip of Brazil. Census takers in the NEO

circles share the same mission and may count on the same day as birders in some of these far-off places.

To me, it is like seeing a wild animal in a television documentary that loses its life innocently or driving by the remains of a dog that has been run over. It is not a part of my personal world yet it touches my heart with a very heavy sadness. We are conditioned as humans to associate the end of relationships and life as negative. I think it is partly because people fear change. When a situation changes the future appears uncertain; but the future is always uncertain. It is our illusion that it is not.

The real question is if there is really any difference between the beginning or the end other than one's perspective. Every beginning is the end of something and every end is the beginning of something. So which one is divorce? It's whatever the person going through it decides. So why does it matter what we think? It hurts. I'm angry. I hate. I'm alone. I'm afraid. I didn't do anything. It's not fair. He's evil. She's a He's a drunk. She won't stop using drugs. I hate my (fill in the blank) life. What is the GD point. The point is when do you want to KNOW peace. Know as in "feel" as in "not to be in a constant state of turmoil and suffering." That is the whole point of this periodic 24 hour trek down the road of existence.

People do things that hurt other people. This is a fact of life. In this regard, if you believe in Karma things will work out. If you believe in justice they won't. If you believe that the system or the court will fix it-you will be disappointed. That is why negotiation and compromise between the divorcing parties is ALWAYS the best and least expensive way to resolve these situations. That is the process of dissolution and we will talk about that in another article. If you believe in revenge- you and your children will be hurt seriously. This is a guarantee. Your anguish will not be felt or considered by the object of your anger. That is a metaphysical reality. He or she is not thinking about you or the kids when their with the new squeeze in Aruba. They are not wallowing in remorse. Not then anyway. Trust me on this one.

Good and bad are equally useless concepts when it comes to evaluation of a person, place, situation or thing. I got the job (the girl, the guy, the promotion, the last one, the only one- fill in the blank.) You didn't. It is a "good" day for me. It is a "bad" day for you. The mouse ate the spider who ate the fly. Their all hungry. They all want to survive. Which one is good? Which one is bad? It's the same with people. All reality is based upon perception.

I practice family law because I believe that divorce is the beginning of freedom AND the end of pain. To get to the point of seeking divorce either one or both people are usually in substantial pain.
