DEATH REMOVES VALUED CITIZEN

Mrs. Sarah E. Parham Long a Widely Known Leader in the Apostolic Faith Circles

Death at 1:45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon claimed Mrs. Sarah Eleanor Parham, aged 60 years, 1 month and 3 days, widow of the late Rev. Charles F. Parham, noted evangelist and founder of the Apostolic Faith movement in the United States and abroad.

A heart attack, coming after a week's illness with influenza and complications, brought the end just as members of her family had thought her condition was showing signs of improvement. Mrs. Parham had been failing for the last year and had worried much over what she feared was approaching blindness.

Death came at her home, 726 East avenue, where previous to her brief illness, plans had been going steadily forward for the opening of the winter term of Bethel Bible school, an institution re-established last year in the spacious Parham parsonage by Mrs. Parham, her son, the Rev. Robert L. Parham, and other members of the Apostolic Faith.

The funeral, which is expected to be attended by members of her religious faith throughout this part of the United States, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the Bethel Community church at Twenty-first and Military, the largest of the local Apostolic edifices. The remains will be laid to rest in Baxter Springs cemetery beside those of her evangelist husband.

The remains today lie in state at Harvey's mortuary, but will be removed to the family home tomorrow morning.

The deceased was widely known through her efforts, both before and after the death of her husband in 1929, in behalf of the religious movement they fostered. When Reverend Parham died, his widow bravely did her best to carry on in his footsteps. She continued to edit the official magazine of the faith, she traveled widely in contacting churches and church peo-

ple, she had her part in promoting Bethel Bible school, and she lectured, preached, and did the work of an evangelist and pastor as the years wore on.

With her passing the cross she bore is expected to be picked up by her three pastor sons: Claude W., Wilfred C. and Robert L. Parham, who have chosen to follow the course charted by their parents, as well as by others who were first influenced by the elder Parhams.

Born November 29, 1877, in Medina, New York, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Thistlewaite, she came with them to Kan- of that town and in Emporia high

school she received her early education.

She first met Mr. Parham when he went to Tonganoxie to conduct a series of evangelistic meetings. The friendship ripened into courtship and they were married in Tonganoxie December 29, 1895. Since her husband was then beginning to earn fame as an evangelist, Mrs. Parham's lot was to become a member of his party and join in his hundreds of campaigns and his almost limitless travels. sas while she was yet a young girl, the family homesteading a farm near Tonganoxie. Eventually, about thirty-four years ago, they came to Baxter Springs and established this city as headquarters for the Apostolic movement. Here, too, their family of five was reared: Mrs. Esther Rardin, now of rural Baxter Springs; the Rev. Claude W. Parham, Phillip A. Parham, and the Rev. Robert L. Parham, all of Baxter; and the Rev. Wilfred C. Parham, now of Santa Ana, Calif. To these survivors are added the names of one sister, Miss Lillian Thistlewaite of Baxter Springs; two brothers, David Thistlewaite of Tonganoxie, and Alfred Thistlewaite of Visalia, California; one grandson, Charles E. Rardin of rural Baxter, and three granddaughters: Bonnie June Parham of Santa Ana, Roberta Marie Rardin of rural Baxter, and Roberta June Parham of Baxter Springs.

Whether or not one subscribed to the faith of Mrs. Parham, it could not be denied that she was a splendid, devout, industrious Christian woman, zealous in the cause of her sect, charitable toward those who felt otherwise, intensely loyal to her God. 1,000 ATTEND PARHAM RITES

Friends From All Over the United States Pay Respects to Widow of Noted Evangelist

Approximately 1,000 persons attended the final rites for Mrs. Sarah E. Parham, widow of the late Charles F. Parham, noted evangelist, who died at her home here Tuesday afternoon. They were held at the Bethel Community church at Twenty-first and Military, yesterday afternoon. Friends and relatives from all over the United States attended the services, which were conducted by the Rev. Lou Love of Galena, with the assistance of other ministers and students at the Bethel Bible school.

The services opened with a song, "Just a Little While," sung by the Apostolic Faith ministers, which was followed by a prayer by S. E. Waterbury of Mountainberg, Arkansas. The obituary was read by the Rev. Gail W. Shultz of Selman, Oklahoma, which was followed by another song by the Gospel quartet, composed of Bennie Stansberry and Boyce Tucker, of Katy, Texas, Joe Ferris of Colorado and Allan Broyles of Houston, Texas. The Rev. Walter Michener of Baxter Springs gave a prayer, and the funeral sermon was given by Reverend Love. Following a prayer by A. B. Stansberry of Springfield, Missouri, the service was closed with another song, "Eastern Gate," sung by the George sisters of Peryton, Texas. Leona Wilson was accompanist for the services.

Burial was in the Baxter Springs cemetery, beside the remains of Mrs. Parham's evangelist husband. A short service was held at the cemetery. Two songs, "The Meeting in the Air" and "We'll Meet You in the Morning," were sung by a quartet composed of Mr. and Mrs. Lee S. Drachenberg of Jackson, Mississippi, Tony Drachenberg of Webb City and Bennie Stansberry of Katy, Texas. Following this song, another song, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye," was sung by the congregation of followers of the Apostolic faith. The same piece was sung at the funeral of the late Reverend Parham. The dismissal prayer was by the Rev. E. W. Durbin of Gravette, Arkansas.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Sarah E. Parham, widow of the late Chas. F. Parham, departed this life December 28, 1937, at the age of 60 years, 1 month and 3 days. Her life was a constant channel of blessings to thousands. Her duties were many, as wife and mother, as editor of the Apostolic Faith paper, official magazine of the faith, author of the book, which gave a history of the movement and the life and work of her husband, "The Life of Chas. F. Parham," and as one of the directors of the Bethel Bible school. She traveled widely in contacting churches and church people, she lectured and preached and continued in active service through the years.

Sarah E. Parham was born November 29, 1877, in Medina, New York, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Thistlewaite. She moved with her parents to a farm near Tonganoxie, Kansas. Her early education was obtained in Tonganoxie and Emporia high school.

She first met Mr. Parham when he went to Tonganoxie for revival meetings. The friendship ripened into courtship and they were married in Tonganoxie, December 29, 1895. She traveled with Mr. Parham in his many tours and revivals to almost all parts of the United States and Canada.

About 34 years ago they moved to Baxter Springs, where they established their home. Here their family was reared: one daughter and four sons: Mrs. Esther Rardin, of rural Baxter Springs; Claude W. Parham, Phillip A.

Parham and Robert L. Parham, all of this city, and Wilfred C. Parham, of Santa Ana, California. Other members of the family are one sister, Miss Lillian Thistlewaite of Baxter Springs, two brothers, David Thistlewaite, of Tonganoxie, and Alfred Thistlewaite of Visalia, California. One grandson, Charles E. Rardin, of rural Baxter Springs, and three granddaughters, Bonnie June Parham of Santa Ana, California, Roberta Marie Rardin, of rural Baxter Springs, and Roberta June Parham, of Baxter Springs.

Our Mother Parham was a splendid, devout Christian woman, zealous in the cause of her faith, charitable toward those who felt otherwise, intensely loyal to her God. Few were more diligent students of the Bible. Few have given more of their lives to Christian work. Her memory will long be cherished throughout the broad area of her activity.

To us of the Faith, she was our Mother, her home was our home and our cares were her cares, she loved everyone and gave to them freely from a precious storehouse of blessings, the best. Now she rests from her labours and her works follow her. Mother Parham's departure is another link to bind us to that eternal shore.

OBITUARY

Charles L. Wall, aged 71 years, who had been a resident of this vicinity for many years and is known to many of the old-timers of the Faith, who have been to Baxter Springs to camp meetings in years past, died November 28, 1937, at his home, west of Baxter Springs. He leaves two sons, Will Wall and Frank Wall; one daughter, Mrs. Flossie Jarrett; seven grandchildren and one great grandchild. Mrs. Wall died November 1, 1935. They both were known to many as "Daddy" and "Mother" Wall. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Lou Love.

Mary Catherine Bennett, known by all as "Mother Bennett," was born in Kittyville, Maryland, January 3, 1851. Her Christian life began as a little girl, when she was converted and became a member of the Lutheran church. After moving west she became affiliated with the Methodist church, and remained there until the year 1904, when she became a member of the Apostolic Faith, embracing the full gospel to the end.

She lived in Baxter Springs, Kansas, until January 19, and at the age of 87 years and 16 days the call came from on high, and she went to her eternal home, which was the desire of her heart.

"NEGLECT NOT THE GIFT THAT IS IN THEE"

(Matt. 25: 14-31, I Tim. 4-14)

"For the kingdom of heaven is as a man traveling in a far country who called his servants and delivered unto them his goods—to every man according to his several ability."

First, the man was traveling in a far coun-

try. Jesus today is at the right hand of the throne of God awaiting His kingdom and the word of His Father to return. He is coming again! In the mean time He is saving all that come unto the Father by Him. He is sanctifying believers through faith in His blood that was shed on Calvary. He has received of the Father the Promise and is baptizing men and women with the Holy Ghost and with fire.

Second, He called His servants. Jesus said before He went away: "The works that I do shall ye do also, and greater works than these shall ye do because I go unto my Father." The wireless call comes today to the servants of the Most High. A servant is one who has been called and chosen. They stand at attention! They hear Him say: "The harvest is white; the laborers are few."

Third, He delivers unto them his goods. His "goods" refer to His business affairs; and by delivering them unto His servants we see He committed them into their hands to oversee. He gave them power and authority to labor in His name and for His cause. To some He gave five talents—talent, meaning the Lord's money, refers to a portion of His riches or goods and should not be confused with the literal. The Lord's work is spiritual and must be handled with spiritual power, talents or riches. To others He gave two talents; to still others one talent, to every one according to his several ability. This tells us that the Lord gives to some greater responsibility than others as they are in position to do more work, or have more ability to do certain things. And to whom much is given much is required.

Considering the various gifts which are given by the Spirit, "divided severally as He wills"—the word of wisdom; the word of knowledge; faith; gifts of healing; miracles; divers kinds of tongues; interpretation of tongues; prophecy; discernment of spirits—we know they are to be used for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ 'till all come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the stature of the fulness of the man in Christ.

If we have received the gift of the word of wisdom we must exercise that gift by putting it into practice. Give God a chance. When trials come where we need to know how to answer a man, or how to give a reason for the hope that

lieth within look to the Spirit who gives the word of wisdom. Jesus said one time that His disciples should be delivered into prison, etc. He told them to take no thought for what they should speak for it should be given them at the needed time and that it would not be "ye that speak, but the Holy Ghost."

At that time the Holy Ghost was not given. Jesus was looking forward to the time when the Holy Spirit should come to the believers on the day of Pentecost and thereafter as gifts and graces were given to the Church. He was at that particular time looking forward to the persecution of the Christians and knew that the gift of the word of wisdom would be used in that day.

We have the gift of the word of knowledge. It has been the privilege of many especially the ministers of the gospel to receive this gift of knowledge. Ignorant men—that is, men of no special school or college training—have as they have accepted the Lord and obeyed Him been privileged to listen to the teaching of the Holy Spirit; to store up in their memory words of knowledge. Then as opportunity came the Holy Spirit brought to their remembrance the things He had taught. Peter, on that memorable day of Pentecost after that the Holy Spirit had come, began to speak words of wisdom and knowledge, the Spirit anointing that which he had heard from the Master and of the Master. After that, people marveled that they were ignorant men. (Acts 4: 13). Jesus "spake as never man spake." And when the gifts of wisdom and of knowledge have been given unto men of today the learned men of the world are put to silence as they hear the anointed of the Lord speak with authority and with power.
