I think oftentimes, with our spiritual lives, we can have much the same kind of reactions. 

The ministry of fishing

"Simon replied, 'Master, we've worked hard all night and caught nothing. But because you say so, I'll drop the nets.' So they dropped the nets and their catch was so huge that their nets were splitting. . . . Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid. From now on, you will be fishing for people" (Luke 5:5-6, 10; CEB).

Many within the Church of the Brethren are not afforded the opportunity to regularly experience the church beyond a local congregation or district setting. Without the privilege to worship, meet, and engage with congregations and districts across the country, it is difficult for someone to truly appreciate the richness of what we call the Church of the Brethren. Without those opportunities, one could easily see a denomination unsure of its own identity and miss the forest for the trees.

While we may talk about membership decline and its impact on giving, I would caution against making any direct correlation of that decline with competing notions of identity or a denomination unsure of its identity. A common purpose and identity are essential to the success of any organization, and I won't deny that some have doubts or disagree with the identity articulated by the Mission and Ministry Board and Church of the Brethren staff. However, from my experiences as a pastor and a district executive, I believe membership declines have less to do with any common understanding of a true north "Brethren-ism" and much more to do with cultural and familial shifts, our hesitation to move beyond "the way we've always done things," and pastors and church leadership at all levels struggling to meet the ministry needs of local communities and to live into the great commission.

In many ways, our predicament resembles that of the tired fisherman that Jesus encountered. We have labored in less-than-ideal circumstances, been left wanting for better results, and are weary from difficult, often thankless, work. And yet, Jesus is calling us to cast out the net again—not just to continue our usual work but to do the work of fishing for people.

Despite our challenges, our ministries and missions continue. The Mission and Ministry Board, with the help and support of districts, congregations, and members, is working to fan the positive sparks that are emerging. Continued Page 10

- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One finger nail or toe nail clipper removed from the package
- One bath size bar of soap in the wrapper
- One toothbrush in the package
- Ten standard size Band-aids

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon plastic zipper closure bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each Hygiene Kit just prior to its journey.

Annual Conference Numbers

2,155: Total registration number for the 2019 Annual Conference including 677 delegates and 1,478 nondelegates.

\$50,928.49: Worship offerings. Each evening worship service and the Sunday morning service received an offering dedicated to a particular purpose. This total includes:

- -- \$13,212.01 for Brethren Disaster Ministries work in Puerto Rico
- -- \$11,383.41 for the Church of the Brethren core ministries
- -- \$11,152.16 for church rebuilding in Nigeria in a collaboration between the Church of the Brethren's Global Mission and EYN
- -- \$8,171.35 for child care and age activities expenses at Annual Conference
- -- \$7,009.56 for Calling the Called workshops in the Church of the Brethren districts, sponsored by the Office of Ministry
- --\$2,360: The online donations and offerings received via www.brethren.org related to the 2019 Annual Conference. The 30 online gifts included \$900 in general donations for Annual Conference, \$940 to support webcasts of the Conference, \$150 for the Nigeria Crisis Response, \$150 for Brethren Disaster Ministries work in Puerto Rico, \$200 for Church of the Brethren core ministries, \$100 for the work of Global Mission and Service, and \$70 for the work of the Office of Peacebuilding and Policy in Washington, D.C.
- --\$7, 595: Amount raised for hunger relief by the Association for the Arts Quilt Auction.
- --\$1,312: Amount received in an offering for ministers' assistance during the pre-Conference Minister's Association event.

At least 132 people participated in the event led by Dr. David Olson on the theme, "Saying No to Say Yes: Everyday Boundaries and Pastoral Excellence."

August 10th—Yup, that's a Saturday! Big changes, I know!



Action Alert

Inhumane Conditions at Detention Centers

OF SEACEBUILDING. People all over the U.S. have been disturbed by recent reports about the humanitarian crisis in detention centers along the border, in which children are being held in horrible conditions. This inhumane treatment of people seeking a



The 1982 Statement on Undocumented Persons and Refugees in the United States still rings true today: "The primary truth of faith as we consider immigrants and refugees today is that Christ has made another appearance among us, as Himself an immigrant and refugee in the person of political dissidents, the economically deprived, and foreigners on the run. We are to join them as pilgrims in search of that city yet to come, with foundations of love and justice whose architect and builder is God."

The statement also asserts that "[w]e oppose any enforcement method likely to increase discrimination against undocumented people because of ethnic or racial characteristics." There is a distinct racial component to the abuses occurring to people who are migrating across the Southern border—we must ask ourselves why our society is quick to dismiss the abuse of black and brown bodies and why these same consequences aren't enforced on European immigrants.

Action Alert

Contacting your representatives in Congress is an important way to combine our voices to change the conditions for migrant communities. This particular situation is complex, but here's the breakdown of a few key pieces:

Congress just passed a Supplemental Funding Bill in order to allocate \$4.59 billion to address the crisis at the border. However, these funds are going to a wide range of government departments for work on the border, including the military and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), which includes Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP). This bill essentially bails out the institutions that are responsible for human rights abuses, and we need oversight to ensure that funds will be used for clean and safe facilities.

Tell your representatives to prioritize the standards of care in detention facilities and call Congress to use the FY2020 Homeland Security appropriations process to eliminate the ability for the Department of Homeland Security to give funds from agencies like Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to ICE for immigration enforcement.

The double Brethren Disaster Ministries project in Lumberton, North Carolina has split. One unit will remain working in North and South Carolina. The new site is Jacksonville, FL. Our district is supposed to provide fifteen volunteers for the Florida site September 8-14. I presently have one volunteer and another with interest. Will you join them?

I don't understand the difficulty in recruiting volunteers. I realize FEMA and church disaster response agencies are being overwhelmed by the number and size of the disasters hitting our hemisphere. Yet we are buffered from the immensity of the problem. Other continents are facing much more dire consequences. Our natural response is to shy away from involvement because we have no answers or ability to make much difference. We are too busy to go now.

I have found in my efforts with BDM and Christian Peacemaker Teams that even taking one small step in response to problems opens new avenues of possibility and is a reliance on the ways God enters the equation in miraculous ways.

You are needed. Could you invite a co-worker, neighbor or friend to join you in Jacksonville? Is it time for a working retreat with your congregation? Contact me within three weeks or I will need to turn those spaces over to another district.

We are also on for the week of December 1-7 when we need seven volunteers, again in Jacksonville. That Florida site is in response to Hurricane Irma and we will be working in four counties, staying at a converted camp grounds with good facilities.

Keep in mind the need for volunteers with Children's Disaster Services, money gifts to support travel for our district volunteers, the ongoing need for volunteers for two week stints in Puerto Rico and disaster cleanup kits for projects everywhere.
