If you're riding your bike on this trail please be concerned for walker's safety and slower moving traffic stays to the right and if you're passing please make an audible signal and yield to the person in front of you. Bikes on the road must follow all laws that apply to any vehicle. If you ride a bike on this track please at the very least let folks in front of you know that you are behind them or just use the streets for bike riding and at the very least yield to people on foot. Let's just all be kind and respectful of each other.



Cars parked on the street happens. The streets are owned by Harris County but please use common sense when parking on the street as our streets are pretty narrow and when one car is on one side and another on the other side of the street just across from each other the road is really blocked and causes line of site issues.

Coming into Wortham:

We had new work done on Wortham Blvd as you left the subdivision and that work was to repair a ponding situation with water standing and a piece of the road got damaged so a little bit of steel and concrete and voila!

Goings on in the neighborhood and surrounding areas (same as last article):

- More restaurants coming but none announced as of this writing.
- There are 2 new pad sites being developed in that same area.
- A restaurant on the corner of FM1960 and Hwy 290 is on the plans.



Security:

We are looking at many options to further improve our visibility and to help keep our community as responsible as we can. One of the things we're investigating is the use of license plate recognition cameras which will capture cars coming in or out of the neighborhood. When you report a crime, the Sheriff's dept. can review the data based on the time frame that you reported the incident. More details to be explained as we learn more of our options and plans moving forward but we will improve on what we've done so far. We do want to encourage you to call 9-1-1 in any case of an emergency. If you're not sure it is an emergency it probably is an emergency so call 9-1-1. In the event of a non-emergency please call the Harris County Sheriff's Dept. NON-EMERGENCY # 713-221-6000. If you see something – say something. If anything looks suspicious, call it in. We need to have this on record. We do have Sheriff deputies patrolling our streets and even with that it's important for you to make that call to have a record and history of any event. It helps the Sheriff's office and will ultimately help you.

National Night Out:

This had to be cancelled due to COVID-19.

Annual Homeowner's meeting:

By the time you read this it should have already happened but has already been successful in that there's been a lot of traffic on the secured website. Obviously at the time of this writing I have no idea as to what was said but I think it's exciting to have more people involved and using newer technology. We're learning a lot and a lot more is to be learned. This has been a success or so we feel and interested always in your thoughts and comments. We will continue to ask and mine e-mail addresses from our homeowners, NOT to sell or solicit but just for the purpose of informing you of things such as security and notices that you may need to know.

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FALL HOME MAINTENANCE

Feel that nip in the air? Fall has arrived! Here's how to get your home and yard ready for winter before it's too late.

Check for drafts

Heat loss through windows is responsible for 25-30 percent of heating energy use, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. But it doesn't have to be that way, because weatherstripping is simple and probably the most cost-effective way to keep heating costs down.



Fix any cracks in your driveway

When water gets into cracks it freezes, expands, and can make the crack even bigger. Enough small cracks can turn into big cracks, and eventually the concrete can crumble. Plus, you'd probably prefer a driveway without a giant pothole! So, using concrete crack sealer, fill it up and be done with it.

Change your filters

Found: Another thing in your house that might be costing you more money than it should be. If your filters are clogged, it's harder to keep your home at the temperature you want it to be which will increase your heating bills. Clean these filters monthly, not just before the fall, and thank yourself later. FYI: Disposable filters can be vacuumed one time before you replace it, and foam filters can just be vacuumed and not replaced.

Fertilize and aerate your lawn

You know what they say: The best offense is a good defense. If you want to keep your lawn looking great in the spring and summer, you need to prep it for the fall and winter. Roots are still active when the grass isn't growing, so applying fertilizer will prevent winter damage. Doing this will also help your lawn turn green faster in the spring, which is crucial, because who wants to look at a sad lawn once it gets nice out? Aerate your lawn at least once a year, preferably in the fall. Or do it twice or even three times each year if you can. You can rent a lawn aerator at any home and garden equipment rental store.

Check your smoke detectors

Fall is a great time to make sure your smoke and CO detectors are working. Check batteries and expiration dates – smoke detectors are typically good for 10 years, and CO detectors last for about six years.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

Decorating is one of the best ways to get in a holiday mood, but emergency rooms see thousands of injuries involving holiday decorating every season. When decorating follow these tips from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission:

Keep potentially poisonous plants – mistletoe, holly berries, Jerusalem cherry and amaryllis – away from children. If using an artificial tree, check that it is labeled "fire resistant". If using a live tree, cut off about 2 inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption, remember to water it and remove it from your home when it is dry. Place your tree at least 3 feet away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources, making certain not to block doorways.



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COMMON HOME HAZARDS TO AVOID

You have smoke detectors. Your doors have good locks. The bathtub has a slip-free pad. By all accounts, your home is a safe and secure place for your family to live. However, there are some hazards that many homeowners may need reminding of from time to time:



For instance:

1. Blocked eavestroughs. Eavestroughs clogged with leaves and other debris can cause rainwater to overflow next to your foundation and create a leak.
2. Clogged dryer vents. High temperature air combined with lint is an ideal condition for a fire. Check and clear the dryer vent at least once a year.
3. Dirty faucet heads. Kitchen and bath faucets often have built-in screens to spray the water evenly. Unfortunately, dirt and other contaminants can build up on these and possibly affect the quality of the water. Clean faucet heads regularly.
4. Tripping hazards. You could step around a loose section of carpet for years and then one day, in a moment of distraction, trip over it and fall. When you see a potential tripping hazard in your home, don't ignore it. Fix it.

We all have plenty of sharp objects around the home that are necessary but in the hands of small children, they can be lethal. Follow these steps to keep your family safe. Here's some ways to minimize the risk:

- Keep kitchen knives and graters away from children in locked drawers.
- Store sharp knives with shields to cover the blades and take care when washing.
- Keep items such as rakes, saws, and lawn mowers, locked away safely. Follow safety procedures and use caution when using garden tools. Remain vigilant to avoid accidents while gardening such as tripping, stumbling and electrical hazards.

Being diligent about home safety takes a little bit of time. But, if it prevents one injury or illness, it's worth the effort.
