JESUS IS OUR HEALER!

Job 7:1-4,6-7; Ps. 147:1-6; 1 Cor. 9:16-19,22-23; Mark 1: 29-39

Today's first reading, taken from the book of Job, belongs to the third group of Old Testament books, called the *Writings*. The Book begins with a prose narrative in which Job, who up until now was upright, God-fearing, and a prosperous family man, is suddenly overcome by calamity, both domestic and economic. In this account, Job is thus led to wrestle with the problem of suffering. In today's passage, he laments of endless suffering and sleepless nights. To fully understand the context of today's reading, you must read chapters one and two of the book of Job.

For a few days now I have been battling with a cold! Last Sunday, some of my parishioners jokingly and lovingly said to me, "You are not allowed to get sick." I wish I had the choice! In fact, no one does, because pain and suffering, both physical and mental, and ultimately death, are going to remain with us. It would be wonderful if we had a genius that could make it possible for our species to no longer need physicians and hospitals, but that dream will never be realized. Misery and pain certainly form an integral part of the human condition. The germane question is: "How do you and I handle this aspect of our human existence?"

In the Old Testament era, as demonstrated in the Book of Deuteronomy, suffering and pains were interpreted as a direct punishment for sin. Even in Jesus' time, any ailment was attributed as a direct consequence of sin. Thus, in John's gospel, Jesus' disciples asked of the man who was born blind: "Master, was he born blind because of a sin of his or of his parents?" Jesus' answer to them tells us that pain and suffering are to be seen and accepted as part and parcel of our human nature. Therefore, He said, "Neither was it for his own sin nor for his parents. He was born blind so that God's power might be shown in him" (John 9: 1-3). Surely, such should be our attitude towards pain and suffering – because if we truly believe without any doubt, God's power is surely going to be shown in us.

Job was a righteous man, who had all along maintained his integrity and was faithful to God, but still he suffered great pain and misery. Job's experience goes to show that a person's righteousness does not give him or her any claim upon God's grace. The suffering and the pain you and I go through each day simply constitute the sign that pain and misery form an integral part of our human existence. Jesus is the only One with power and authority Who can heal us and take away our pain and misery. Thus, the Bible guides us on how we should handle the problem of suffering and misery. Although the Bible does not offer a final solution, it gives all Christians some very consoling insights on how to cope with misery when it strikes us.

The Gospels portray a Christ Who enters the world of the sick and suffering with healing words and touches. Job's reflections on the miseries of human life are meant to provide a background for the healing work of Christ, of which today's gospel speaks. Christ has come to heal us and take away our pain as shown in the act of the healing of Peter's mother in-law and all the sick that were brought to Him. When Job reached the depth of despair, he humbly admitted that he couldn't survive without the power of God. He professed his total dependency on God even for his life. We must learn from Job and know that God has come to heal us in Christ. Thus, you and I must always "Praise the Lord, Who heals the broken hearted."
