Dear Catholic Daughters,

The month of February, as we live today, means Valentine's Day, Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. Valentine's Day or St. Valentine's Day is traditionally the day on which "lovers" do something special for each other. Let us do something extra special for Jesus this year!

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is February 26th. It is the day of the imposition of ashes on the forehead of believers; the implication is that there will be a measure of change in our lives when Lent is completed. The old ways will give way to a bright new future; "as you go, proclaim the good news, 'The

kingdom of heaven has come near'" (Mt. 10:7). The ashes received on the forehead is a reminder of our mortal (fallen) condition and the need of Christ in our life. It is God's grace given to us that brings about the change in our condition. "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation; everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new" (2 Cor. 5:17).

As result of the graces received in our Lenten practices, we become a new person in Christ. Our Lord said, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (Jn 10:10b). "By devoting more time to prayer, we enable our hearts to root out our secret lies and forms of self-deception, and then to find the consolation God offers. He is our Father and he wants us to live life well" (*Lenten Message 2018*, Pope Francis). Real change occurs in our hearts and minds as we accomplish the ascetical practices of Lent;

prayer, penance and almsgiving.

The Catholic Daughters of the Americas motto, "Unity and Charity", is an apt reminder of the importance of penance, prayer and almsgiving. My dear sisters,

With the coming of February, we welcome spring to our world again. For those of you CDA sisters not enjoying the sunshine in Southern California, you are more than likely awaiting the warmer temperatures with hopeful anticipation that can come from weeks of grey skies. Yet the promise of my favorite liturgical season creeps ever closer; it is the season of Lent, when we cast aside those things that get in between us and the perfect love of God, our Heavenly Father. With this season comes the question I ask myself every year: What am I giving up for Lent that will make a difference in my faith? What is a worthy sacrifice for the Lord?

One of the young ladies whom I've mentored for years now has a saying: "If the thought of giving up something specific for Lent makes you want to cry, that's the thing you need to fast from." She was referring to her obsession with Netflix. For others, it may be our complaining, shopping, or our penchant for gossip; the things we need to give up should be a challenge; something that leads to our sanctification through redemptive suffering.

Redemptive suffering is intrinsic to our journey as Catholic sisters; this is where we take the suffering we endure through everyday life, whether it's stubbing our toe, or

being annoyed by THAT person, and offering it up for the redemption of the world, a specific person, or for ourselves. Of course, redemptive suffering is also in big things: chemo treatments, kidney stones, the grief we experience after the death of a loved one; we unite our suffering with that of our Lord on the Cross and ask Him to sanctify us, thereby giving our suffering purpose.

My prayer is that each of us dedicate our suffering, whether by the small things we give up for Lent, or by tragedy and triumph, that we let it sanctify us. May we become like Blessed Chiara Badano, who, when she was just sixteen years old was diagnosed with bone cancer, responded by saying, "It's for You, Jesus; if You want it, I want it too."

May we have courage in the face of tragedy, and when suffering arises may we not try to avoid it but ask for the grace and endurance to persevere through it with joy and for Jesus Christ, who suffered and gave all for us.



I pray that each of you have a grace-filled Lenten season and prepare yourselves to venerate His cross on Good Friday and meet the Risen Lord on Easter morning.

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Finding the time to pray is not always easy, but don't make it any harder than it is. Prayer does not need to be elaborate; prayer does not need to be long; prayer does not have a set of rules to follow. Prayer should come from your heart. Prayer can be recited from prewritten prayers; prayer can be a prayer of forgiveness, a prayer of thanks, a prayer for guidance, a prayer for help, and the list can go on and on.

You do not need a particular physical place to pray. It can be a state of mind, a quiet place in your spirit where you can communicate with Jesus, where He can help you keep

the right perspective. As Matthew states in chapter 6 versus 5-8 "When you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, who love to stand and pray in the synagogues and on the street corners so that others may see them. 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Have you heard about the Seven Sisters Apostolate? It is an apostolate that ensures that a Holy Hour is prayed each day of the week for the intention of a specific priest or bishop.

It was started in 2011 by Janette Howe in St Paul, Minnesota. For a year she had been offering a Holy Hour once a week for her pastor and was guided in prayer to invite six other women to do so as well.

The Holy Spirit impressed upon

her two specific directives:

1. Each intercessor's weekly Holy Hour should be only for the priest.
2. Each should ask for the priest's deepening devotion to our Blessed Mother.

When Janette talked to her pastor he directed her to start the Apostolate with 7 parishes - 49 women in total. By June, the first Seven Sisters group made their one year commitments. Just eight years later, the Apostolate has spread to over 800 parishes in the United States and it is continually growing.

A group may begin at any time. The normal commitment extends from June to June, the month of the Sacred Heart. With May as a month of discernment to decide if

another year of commitment is possible. However, a group can begin at any time of the year.

With everything happening in the world our priests need lots of prayers to keep focused, strong and to keep going.

Greetings from your State Secretary,



As a Liturgy Coordinator, I would like to share how flowers contain multiple levels of spiritual symbolism in our parish environment. In fact, flowers are the most commonly used decorations in the sanctuary...we also find them around statues and sacred pictures.

However, one rule and guideline regarding flowers is: during Advent and Lent flowers are not to be used because they are penitential seasons.

Actually flowers are forbidden during the solemn season of Lent, except possibly on Laetare Sunday (4th Sunday of Lent), Solemnities, and Feasts. Flowers are meant to express Joy, and that is why they are restricted during the somber seasons of Advent and Lent.

Flowers serve the purpose of reminding us of God's creation and the beauty of His handwork. In the splendor of their colors, in their fragrance, they are revelations of the beauty and goodness of God, symbols of His benevolence, and images of His first true design.

Flowers also remind us of the spiritual life and the virtues we need to develop within our hearts.



Flowers, by reason of their freshness and beauty which they receive from the sun and which they turn towards it, show the innocence and holiness we derive from Christ, the Sun of Justice, and with which we glorify Him as the Sun of our spiritual life. The flowers on the altar signify that the blossoms of grace, prayer and virtue unfold in the supernatural light and in the heavenly warmth which radiates from the sun of the Eucharistic Sacrifice. 

So, the next time you attend Mass and see flowers adorn the sanctuary, I invite you to recall the multiple levels of symbolism and raise your heart to God as you enter into the celebration of the Eucharist.

“We believe that every unborn child has a right to life and that every pregnant woman has the right to give birth with dignity.” This is the first sentence in the Mission statement of St. Gianna’s Maternity Home in Warsaw, ND.

The second sentence of their mission statement says they are dedicated to providing safe shelter, food, clothing, education, and counseling to these pregnant women.

With that thought in mind, the Catholic Daughters of Harvey, Court Sacred Heart, chose to help St. Gianna’s home with at least part of their mission-to help with clothing and some of the bare necessities these young women need before and after their baby has arrived.

The St. Cecilia’s CDA court (Ct. Sacred Heart #1908) conducted a Baby/Mother shower at St. Cecilia’s Church. The response from the parish was amazing. The Mother/Baby lode consisted of; 644 diapers of all sizes, at least a dozen packages of baby wipes, 8 baby blankets (some homemade), 15 outfits, socks, paper products, diaper bags, lap quilts, a robe and a cardigan for mom, personal care products and \$225 in gift cards.
