

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

Well, it's time to update you all on what's been happening since our last publication.

At our Aug. meeting one of our own members, <u>Mr. Paul</u> <u>Bunnell</u> spoke to us on Researching in New Brunswick, Canada and all about Loyalists and his Benjamin Bunnell line of loyalists. He donated leaflets, and many lists of information on Canadian research. His use of maps of the areas in relation to his talk made it a very interesting program.

Marge <u>Riley</u> showed Land deeds and a map of the area of Monroe, Maine and explained how to search for these records at our Sept. meeting.

Mrs. MARTHA CLARK, <u>Reference Supvr.</u>; of the MASS STATE ARCHIVES was our speaker at the Oct. 14, 1986 meeting. She really made us all very anxious to get there to do some research. It is a division of the Secretary of State office of Mass. It is responsible for collecting Non-Current Permanent Records; records of the Executive Offices, Government Offices and soon Judicial Records for all but Bristol, Dukes, Plymouth & Nantucket Counties; also that the Archives are the 17th & 18th Century Equivalent of State Government.

Mrs. Clark also showed architects drawings and a floor plan of the Complex type building, explaining that everything is stored in environmentally secure vaults. The staff increased from 8 to 21 when the move was made to Columbia Point in Mar'86. There is a computerized shelf list of what collections are available; a public reading room which seats 40; 16 microfilm/microfiche readers, a couple of which are printer readers; public lockers for personal belongings. This all being on the second floor. The third floor houses the administrative offices. No eating facilities there but cafes are nearby. Plenty of parking. Enclosed is a list of some of the holdings at the Archives.

#### ORGANIC

Charters, treaties and constitutional papers, including records of popular and constitutional conventions.

#### CREATED COLLECTIONS

"Massachusetts Archives" A compilation of state papers to 1799, organized topically, and arranged in volumes. These include original legislative papers, some journals of the General Court and Council to 1784, military records from 1643, town valuations, land grants, official correspondence and treasury and other pecuniary records. Some private records are included.

"Documents Collected in France" Ten volumes of colonial records and maps copied from French archives in the nineteenth century.

"Eastern Lands Papers" Records of the General Court, special commissions and land agents relative to the settlement of the eastern lands in Maine, boundary disputes, and the separation of the State of Maine in 1820. Included in the collection are maps, committee reports, surveyors' records, fiscal material and correspondence.

#### LEGISLATIVE

Journals of the General Court, 1628 to date.

Engrossed Acts and Resolves, from 1686 to present.

Letter books, 1763-1776, including letters to the agent in Great Britain.

Original papers generated in the legislative process, 1775 to date -- bills, petitions, remonstrances, committee reports, and other papers referred to the Legislature by government officials. These include messages from the governor, reports of special commissions and state agencies, claims and correspondence.

Committee files, dating from the 1970's for the following legislative committees: Committee on Taxation; Committee on Public Service; Committee on Commerce and Labor; and the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

#### EXECUTIVE

Executive Letters collection of incoming correspondence to the Governor's Office (1853-1893) and copies of letters from governors (1861-1925). The term of Governor John Andrew (1861-1866) is especially well-documented.

Office records of recent governors, including files of the legislative office, and subject and correspondence files, dating from the mid-1960's.

Journals of the Governor's Council in its advisory and executive capacities from 1628.

Council files from 1780, including records of special commissions appointed by the governor and council, appropriations, and petitions for pardons, parole, respite and commutations.

#### TREASURY

Various records and papers documenting treasury business from 1692-1940's. Records include account books, ledgers, journals, cash books and waste books, and are comprehensive for the colonial and early statehood periods. Also included are sheriffs' returns; records of taxes and loans; and special accounts relating to the disposition of Loyalist estates and the operations of the Troy and Greenfield Railroad Company.

### STATE SECRETARY

Records reflecting the business of the State's chief recording offices including: commissions and qualifications of office holders; acceptances of local option statutes; election returns from 1780; political candidate and state convention returns, 1938-1968; initiative petitions; docket books and statements of lobbyists from 1891; renditions and extraditions; medical examiners' returns for deaths from 1885; state census schedules for 1855 and 1865, and other special censuses; maps and plans from 1636, and records of the state geographical and topographical surveys; tax valuations, 1738-1786; and correspondence and other administrative material.

### MILITARY DEPARTMENTS

Muster rolls from 1710 through the Revolution, and Shays' Rebellion.

State Revolutionary pension records and Maine land grant bounties.

Records of the Board of War, Commissary Department and Quartermaster, for the period of the Revolution and the War of 1812, mainly concerning supplies.

Records of the Adjutant General, primarily for the Civil War, including muster rolls, issue books and correspondence. Most pertain to the agent for state troops (1861-1867).

Claims for state pay from veterans of the Spanish American War, correspondence dating 1898-1901.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCIES

Office files and correspondence from the Executive Offices of Administration and Finance; Educational Affairs; Environmental Affairs and Human Services. Records of administrative departments and commissions, and often their predecessor agencies including: Public Health, Public Welfare, Mental Health, Corrections, Education, Labor and Industries, Harbor and Land Commissioners/Waterways, Arbitration and Conciliation, Rate Setting Commission, Consumers Council, Metropolitan District Commission, and the Massachusetts Bicentennial Commission. Among the papers from the State Board of Charity are lists of alien passengers entering the Port of Boston, 1848-1891. MDC records include approximately 15,000 negatives detailing the construction of the Quabbin Reservoir. Records from state institutions, often containing correspondence, case files and reports of admissions and dismissals, supplement departmental files for several agencies. This expanding collection includes material from the Monson almshouse and primary school; Tewksbury almshouse and hospital; Pondville, Rutland Heights, North Reading and Westfield public health hospitals; Danvers, Belchertown, and other mental institutions; the Lyman and Lancaster schools; and the prisons at Charlestown, Framingham, Concord, Norfolk and Walpole.

### NON-STATE RECORDS

Microfilm copies of local records in Massachusetts filmed by the LDS Church. Does not include any records from Berkshire County. Types of records vary from one municipality to another, but the film usually includes municipal records, church and cemetary records and vital records.

WPA Historical Records Survey, inventories of manuscript collections and county, municipal and church records (1936-1942).

Federal census schedules for Massachusetts, 1840-1880.

Middlesex County Training School records, from 1893.

State returns for births, marriages and deaths, 1841-1890.
