
Philip Garrity: father of Abbie Sines; pipefitter for 40 years; lived in Quincy most of his life.

Work days begin with morning wake-up at 7:00 a.m., prayer, breakfast and then off to the worksites by 8:30 a.m. The length of time spent at a worksite is contingent upon the work being done there, as well as the weather. The groups usually return to the Homestead by 4:00 p.m.

Evenings are spent in a variety of ways. We generally participate in challenging team building activities, prayer experiences and journaling.

One day during the week is a rest day and a day to experience the beauty of the surrounding area. On Friday we hold a closing campfire and sending service.



The Legislature is in full formal session until the end of July. The Speaker of the House and the House Minority Leader have agreed to hold Saturday sessions in July. As we near the end of June, the July full formal session dates will be released. Even though full formal sessions conclude at the end of day on July 31st, informal sessions will continue. Informal sessions can pass legislation, but it must be unanimous consent and generally only non-controversial legislation is passed.

The House and Senate held another Constitutional Convention in May. The only item on the agenda was House Bill 3933, An Initiative Petition for an Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth to Provide Resources for Education and Transportation through an additional tax on incomes in excess of One Million Dollars. The bill was reported from the Joint Committee on Revenue favorably. This proposal to the Massachusetts Constitution would change the State's flat income tax to a two tiered system, where taxpayers whose income exceeds \$1 million would pay an additional 4% income tax on each dollar over \$1 million. For example, an individual earning \$2 million would be taxed at the current rate of 5.1% for the first million dollars, then every dollar past the first million dollars would be taxed at an additional 4% for a total of 9.1%. This would not affect the law that reduces the state income tax based on economic growth with 5% being the lowest point. This additional tax revenue would be dedicated to public education and transportation infrastructure. Given that this is a citizen's ballot initiative, 25% of the Constitutional Convention is needed to move it forward in the process. The Constitutional Convention approved the amendment by a vote of 135 to 57. The next step is a vote in the next legislative session where at least 25% of the Constitutional Convention votes in favor. The last step is to put the proposal before the voters in the next election cycle. Should the proposal receive enough votes in 2017, then the voters would get to vote on it on the 2018 November ballot.

The House passed legislation, House Bill 4285, An Act Relative to Housing, Operations, Military Service and Enrichment. The legislation would establish the Office of State Veterans' Homes and Housing which will advise the Department of Veterans' Services and provide oversight for the Commonwealth's two soldiers' homes in Chelsea and Holyoke. It creates an Executive Director position to head the new office. The Executive Director will focus on long-term care and will be responsible for the coordinated implementation and enforcement of laws, regulations and policies.

The legislation would also increase access to housing authorities for disabled, elderly and potentially unemployable veterans through two provisions. It updates existing laws so that "Veterans Status" is a clearly protected employment category. Currently, only active duty personnel are covered. The legislation would expand eligibility to all children of Prisoners of War (POW) to receive the Public Service Scholarship, where currently only children of Vietnam Era POW are eligible. To accurately reflect the realities of present-day military training, paid public-service leave would now apply to uniformed service officers under this legislation. It extends a total property tax-exemption to serviceconnected blind veterans who have a 100% disability rating. It would fully abate any property taxes due by a surviving spouse following the death or Missing in Action (MIA) status of a soldier, sailor or member of the National Guard. Lastly, it would extend the Veterans' Longterm Care Commission and rework the Post-Deployment Council, both of which were created through the 2014 VALOR Act and focus on housing and support services for veterans transitioning from active duty to civilian life. The legislation is currently pending in the Senate.

May was Asian American Pacific Islander Month. I was invited to be a speaker at several events, and was in meetings relative to the State's relationship with other countries. I had the honor and privilege of being the keynote speaker at Hanscom Air Force Base. I made a presentation about my life experiences and we discussed Asian Americans contributions to the United States. I was a speaker at the United States Small Business Administration's Asian American Pacific Islander forum, discussing the State's role in small business development. The Asian American Caucus held a screening of the independent film, East of Hollywood, and engaged in a panel discussion with legislators and staff about the portrayals of Asian Americans in the media and entertainment. This year is the tenth

anniversary of the law that established the Massachusetts Asian American Commission. The members of the Asian American Caucus and other legislative leaders held talks with the Chinese Consul General regarding economic development, education and tourism.

We also had the pleasure of hosting Members of Parliament (MP) from the German Bundestag at the State House. The group of MPs we hosted sit on the Bundestag's budget committee. We talked about the differences in our budgetary processes and our legislative procedures.

Play for All Playground is a community based movement lead by Councilor Brad Croall to raise \$30,000 to construct a handicap playground at the Fore River Field. There are very few fully handicap accessible playgrounds in the region and having one in Quincy would benefit many families in Quincy and the South Shore. Councilor Margaret LaForest, Councilor Noel DiBona, myself and many other local officials are supporting this project. The Ward 2 Civic Association has agreed to be the charitable organization collecting funds thereby making donations tax deductible. There is a fundraiser at the Elks Lodge on June 23 from 6:30 to 9:30pm. 

I will be hosting a community meeting on Wednesday, June 15, 2016 at 7:00pm, at the Houghs Neck Maritime Center, 137 Bay View Avenue, to review and discuss a proposal from K&R Auto Body, 1200 Sea Street to increase their hours of operation, increase the number of vehicles allowed and update their business license to include towing, on street loading and offloading to allow for delivery of parts and supplies, and permission to display a sign on the property that is seen from both sides of Sea Street. Located in a Business B zone, an automotive use has operated at this address for decades. The applicant has requested an opportunity to present his proposal to the neighbors before submitting to the License Board for approval. The Business Owner, Brandon Bergstrom, who grew up and lives in Houghs Neck, took over the business from his father Ken and partner Ray Mitchell. He has worked to improve the conditions of the property and wants to bring this successful business to the next level while being respectful of the Residence A zone his business abuts. The City has received complaints regarding work occurring after hours and tow truck parking. Brandon has acknowledged and been responsive to these matters. The community meeting is the first step in the process. This proposal requires approval from the Licensing Board and is scheduled for hearing on Tuesday, June 28, 2016 at 4:00pm

at Old City Hall, 1305 Hancock Street, First Floor Meeting Room. This is a public hearing and anyone can attend to express their support or opposition to the proposal.
