

Sunday Reflection: Fifth Sunday of Lent

What is the significance of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead (John 11:1-45)? It is more than a miraculous event. It is a "sign" of God's promise to raise up all who have died in Christ to everlasting life. That is why Jesus asked Martha if she believed in the resurrection from the dead. The Christian creed, which is the profession of our faith in

Readings for Palm Sunday, April 2, 2023

Isaiah 50:4-7 Philippians 2:6-11 Matthew 26:14-27:66

God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and in the saving power of God, culminates in the proclamation of the resurrection of the dead on the last day and in life everlasting. This is our faith and our hope. "If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit which dwells in you" (Romans 8:11).

The name Lazarus means "God is my help." Jesus' parable about the poor man Lazarus, who died and was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom (Luke 16:19-31), ends with a warning: "If they do not hear Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced if someone should rise from the dead." Through Lazarus' sickness and subsequent death, God brought glory through his Son the Lord Jesus, who raised his friend from the dead in anticipation of his own death and resurrection. God gives us the power of his Holy Spirit that we may be made alive in Christ. Even now we can experience the power of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus in our personal lives. The Holy Spirit is ever ready to change and transform us into men and women of faith, hope, and love. Do we believe that the power of Jesus' resurrection is at work in our life today? Let the Holy Spirit strengthen within us the life and joy of God and the hope of heaven.

Saint of the Week ... St. Stephen of Mar Saba

Stephen of Mar Saba was the nephew of Saint John Damascene, who introduced the Stephen as a young boy to monastic life at age 10. Mar Saba is the greatest of the ancient monasteries, located just east of Bethlehem. When he reached age 24, Stephen served the community in a variety of ways, including guest master. After some time he asked permission to live a hermit's life. The answer from the abbot was yes and no: Stephen could follow his preferred lifestyle during the week, but on weekends he was

to offer his skills as a counselor. Stephen placed a note on the door of his cell: "Forgive me, Fathers, in the name of the Lord, but please do not disturb me except on Saturdays and Sundays."

Despite his calling to prayer and quiet, Stephen displayed uncanny skills with people and was a valued spiritual guide. His biographer and disciple wrote about Stephen: "Whatever help, spiritual or material, he was asked to give, he gave. He received and honored all with the same kindness. He possessed nothing and lacked nothing. In total poverty he possessed all things." He died in 794.

Saint Stephen is known for his ability to compromise. What he most wanted was to live in complete and uninterrupted solitude, but he was not granted his wish. Consequently, he gladly chose to accept a lifestyle mixed with both his wishes and those of others.



New Vicar General Named

Bishop Mark E. Brennan has announced the appointment of Monsignor Joseph L. Peterson as vicar general and moderator of the curia of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, effective April 11, 2023. After the bishop, the vicar general is the highest-ranking official in the Diocese.

Monsignor Peterson was ordained a priest for our Diocese in 1975 and served the faithful of West Virginia in many parishes, as well as Vicar Forane for several vicariates, before retiring in 2020.

The outgoing vicar general, Monsignor Eugene S. Ostrowski, is resuming his retirement, having served in his present role since 2019.
