issues, sponsored a workshop on suicide prevention, explored ways to help provide support for families in need, and often used donations to the group to help stranded interstate travelers, local families in need of food or living expenses, or any other need that arose. Because pastors in the group tend to move on, the 501c3 non-profit designation became dormant, and we have worked for two years to get all the paperwork the state requires to get us back in good standing as a non-profit group.

The past few months we have worked on updating our mission statement followed by the actions needed to fulfill the mission. The mission statement we arrived at says: West Branch Area Religious Council is to foster interfaith connections in order to address needs as they arise in our communities.

Our action statements include:

- Leaders of congregations meet monthly September through May, and as needed.
- We communicate the work of WBARC with our congregations.
- We coordinate with our schools, law enforcement, and other agencies.
- We organize community events.
- We address emergency needs.
- We maintain a checking account to meet these needs as they arise.

So the next time you hear someone mention WBARC, you'll hopefully have a better understanding of the group and the good work we are trying to do! Blessings, Pastor Sue

Favorite Meeting Recipes Peanut Butter Cookies

Ingredients: 1 Cup Butter

- 1 Cup Peanut Butter 1 Cup Sugar
- l Cup Brown Sugar
- 2 eggs
- l t. vanilla
- $2\frac{1}{2}$ C. flour
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ t. soda
- $\frac{1}{2}$ t. salt

Cream butter, peanut butter, sugars, eggs and vanilla. Add dry ingredients and shape into one-inch balls and roll in granulated sugar. Place 2 inches apart on a cookie sheet and press crisscross with fork times.

Bake at 375 degrees for 10-12 minutes; cool slightly and remove from pan.

<u>A fun way to upgrade</u>: Leave the cookies in ball shapes, bake at 375 for 8 minutes; remove from the oven and press a chocolate star or Hershey's kiss in the middle of the cookie until the sides crack. Bake for 2-5 minutes longer and let cool and remove.

A Message from Iowa Yearly Meeting Superintendent Tom Showalter:

"As I ponder responses both personally and professionally, I would like to challenge you to remember who and Whose you are. In a time when people seem to be scared and unsure, we want to be part of the solution and not part of the problem. Personally, with my daughter Grace's autoimmune health concerns, we will need to be extra cautious to assure that she does not get sick. Therefore, I am going to need to limit my travels so that I do not carry something home.

When we adopted our mission statement a couple years ago, it was to be a point of reference for all that we do: "The Body of IAYM exists to exalt Jesus Christ by becoming fruitful disciple-makers and expressing God's love by serving all people (John 15:1-17)." Pastors, continue to look for creative ways to make disciples and to serve the communities where you serve! Let's look for ways to be light in dark places (and dark times). I believe these are rare opportunities for the local church to show care for those in their communities. As I have often said during difficult times, God is still on His throne today!...

The Church is more than the gathering on Sunday mornings. Now is the time for us to consider new ways to serve. By doing so, we "exalt Jesus by becoming fruitful disciple makers" and we "express God's love by serving all people."

Maybe you can open the building for people to come pray; call someone who is older or who has been ill and see if they have needs that you can meet; some are talking about online opportunities; or you can possibly contact people in your church to see how they are doing. Maybe you could set up your own Zoom account to do worship or prayer (only \$15.00 a month or a free account that is limited to a forty minute meeting), or Bible studies.

Be creative and allow this time to be a time of re-purposing in your local setting.

Basket making was one economic focus of the Turkana Mission in the 1970s.



Do you Pray?
