TREASURER'S REPORT - THRU JANUARY 31

The beginning of the year usually sees minimal activity spending-wise, and this year is no different. There were no reserve expenses in January, so the amount in the reserve fund stands at about \$544,313. For total operating expenses, we were about \$5,667 under budget for the month. Our operating cash stands at about \$29,570, which is a decent amount this early in the year.

There were four delinquent accounts at the end of January for a total of \$3,387. Of the two homeowners having the most arrears, the management company taking care of one has been contacted and is in the process of paying off the arrears. The owner of the second home has been sent a 10-day letter and could face more stringent disciplinary action soon if not paid. The other two homeowners each owe about two months back dues and have been contacted by Strong Management.

seed pods came hurling towards the group assembled to see tree removal. We ran like



SUNSHINE COMMITTEE



"TUCK IN" WITH TOM

This article is more of an adventure than a restaurant review. Sometimes it takes a journey to find the best. I've been looking for a superior hamburger bun for years. Now I found it. My journey began when a new restaurant, called Valley Swim Club, was going to open on Arnold where Delicious Dish had been. We decided to visit their original restaurant, Valley Bottle Club, on Sonoma Square and see what they were all about. Valley Bottle Club says:



"Our mission at Valley is to provide simple, delicious food, matched with domestic

and imported wines that we feel passionate about." We went there on a sunny Saturday for lunch. We sat outside in a creative, welldesigned patio that was comfortable, minimal, and clean. You can taste the care they take to provide the best. They are flexible and aim to please; they even iced an unusual tea for me. I had a salad, crisp and fresh, and something unusual for me, a Mortadella sandwich. It's a small menu and this was their sandwich of the day. I watched lots of big, delicious looking salads being placed on tables. My Mortadella

sandwich came on the most beautiful yeast and brioche-like bun. Big and puffy, lighter than air, chewy and substantial enough to not break, bleed through toppings and cause bun failure. The meat was tasty, not oily, and speckled with



lots of pistachios. The dressing on the Mortadella was the star. They chopped Giardiniera and mixed it with mayonnaise, maybe sour cream and pepper. Slathered on that perfect fluffy roll. It was heaven on a plate! I spoke with one of the owners about their new restaurant that was under construction, Valley Swim Club, (now open) on Arnold. She also shared that their secret ingredient was using Giardiniera on the sandwiches. Now I'm on the hunt for where I can buy the world's best hamburger bun.


Special thanks to Debbie Yamato for volunteering to take over the Emergency Preparedness duties of the Committee.
