St. John's in Juneau & Horicon and Salem in Lowell have been in merger discussions since December of 2018. In April 2019 both church councils began meeting together in order to better understand each other. Our goal is to do kingdom work and to love our brothers and sister in the faith by working together to proclaim Christ and Him Crucified.

Here is the proposed timeline for June:

June 2 – Joint Worship Service at 8:30 AM at St. John's – Juneau Campus. Salem will not have a worship service that Sunday so that everyone can be in attendance for Vicar Timothy Walsh's installation service.

June 5 – Joint Council Meeting at Salem (The purpose of this meeting is to present a complete picture of what a merger will look like for all three campuses.)

June 12 – Salem and St. John's will each have separate council meetings at their own churches. The purpose of these meetings will be to vote on whether or not to continue with the merger and bring it before the members of each congregation for further discussion in open forums.

June 16 – Salem is going to have a call meeting to call another ¼ time retired pastor. If we go through with the merger, we will need pastoral help. Since adding another full-time pastor is not an option at this time. St. John's encouragement to Salem was to call another ¼ time retired pastor. Salem agreed and that is why this call meeting is scheduled. (Pastor Mark Rieke was only called for 3 months. His time with Salem is scheduled to conclude on July 28. Salem may be able to call him again but currently we don't know if that is so.)

There will be open forums scheduled at each congregation in July and God-willing the historic vote will take place at each congregations July Voter's meetings.

New Beginnings enables a single mother to live away from cultural influences and nurture her baby in a positive environment. We provide a unique opportunity for generationally poor mothers to break the cycle of dependency.

Currently, our program provides opportunities to advance education, learn fundamental parenting and financial skills, participate in counseling sessions, and acquire an objective baseline for responsible living through a structured faith-based program. Ultimately, our vision is to equip each mother with the skills and education needed to earn self-sustaining wages, without an indeterminate need for government assistance.





News from Malawi

The heavy rains that have hit Malawi over the past weeks including Cyclone Idai have largely affected the southern part of Malawi. About two weeks ago a storm system which later became the cyclone caused three days of heavy rains in Malawi. Those rains caused widespread flooding mainly in the Southern Region which has the bulk of our LCCA congregations. Hundreds of thousands have been affected, many have lost their homes and their maize crops. Emergency



aid organizations were mobilized to rescue survivors and provide shelter, food and water. Last week the WELS Committee for Aid and Relief provided food and supplies to LCCA members in the affected area. Kingdom Workers Facebook page have a good summary of relief efforts.

When Cyclone Idai returned the outer bands of rain and winds affected the the lower Shire valley of Malawi but did not cause significantly more damage. However there is still heavy rain which if it continues, will cause more flooding. Hardest hit were the Mozambique coastal city of Beira, with destruction extending into Zimbabwe.

Here in the Lilongwe, about 2 weeks ago we had 3 days of heavy rain . For the Lutheran Mobile Clinic, we have not missed any days of clinic, but there were some adventures when our vehicle slid off the dirt roads and got stuck in heavy wet mud. In Malawi there are always people willing to help out and we were able to get moving again in about an hour. There was a power cut for two to three days because debris from the rains blocked the intakes to the Hydro-Electric power stations. Otherwise we have been largely unaffected.



Please pray for the people of Southern Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe. These people have little and their countries do not have the resources for a quick recovery from this devastation. Many crops have been lost and hunger is a real possibility.



Email UPDATE FROM CURRENT BEFRIENDED MISSIONARIES PAUL & SUSAN NITZ MALAWI

April is almost here and the sun it out today. It has been a long rainy season here in Malawi. The heavy rains have caused extensive flood damage this year



Our family in Malawi at the moment consists of Paul, myself, son Joel (17) and daughter Frances (14). We also have a married son(Henry) in Madison WI, a daughter in Milwaukee (Erin) who has recently graduated from WLC, and two sons (Reuben and James) at MLC in the pastor track. Reuben will graduate this May.

Joel and Frances keep busy with the demanding school schedule of their IB International School here in Lilongwe. Both of them also enjoy sports, they recently played in a tri-school tournament where Frances's girls team came first in both basketball and rugby, and Joel's boys team also came first in the rugby. We enjoyed traveling to the city of Blantyre (a 5 hour drive to the South) to watch the weekend tournament.

I, Susan, teach literacy and English to the wives of the students here at the Lutheran Bible Institute several mornings a week. In addition, I also teach private music lessons - eaching clarinet and piano as well as working with some students on ensemble work. We will have our recital coming up on April 7 to allow all my students to perform. Frances studies piano and will accompany several ensemble pieces with accompanying flute, clarinet, violin and cello.

There are not many opportunities for doing Western style music in Malawi (it's mostly among the expat community) so we do enjoy finding time to make music together. I also usually play keyboard for the English church services on Sunday mornings at our local church here at the Bible school.

We are looking forward to our upcoming furlough in June. Paul and I will both be at the LWMS convention. Paul is the mission speaker and I will be on the missionary wife panel answering questions about life in Malawi. If you attend, please come say hello and introduce yourselves to us. We are thankful for your prayers and support of us and all of world missions. May God bless your work.

Lois,

Thank you for reaching out to me. The Lord continues to bless us according to his plans as a church and a family. As a whole, this year has been a blessing due to its relative simplicity. We have had steady growth as a church and not run into any major roadblocks. We have been healthy and happy as a family and continue to grow closer together and to our Lord.

As a church, we've faced the challenge of replacing leaders on our council in both financial positions (treasurer and financial secretary). It is amazing to see how the Lord directs people to be in the right place at the right time. In addition to that, we have continued to see consistent worship attendance numbers, despite those kinds of losses. More than 120 first time worship visitors have joined us in the past calendar year. We have always been challenged to connect with the younger families in our community (many prefer the local churches that offer children's church during the worship service), but the Lord is blessing those efforts too. We've grown to the point where we have added Sunday School classes, which has been a work in progress and has only helped our Sunday morning Bible class attendance grow too. Just this past week, we hosted a team from MLC and distributed just shy of 4,000 flyers in our community, including in some neighborhoods that we've never canvassed before. Goodyear continues to grow and more and more companies (Microsoft, Chewy, UPS, and Ball Canning) are investing in our community.

As far as weather, we actually had snow in the valley for the first time since we moved here. It was nice to see white caps on the surrounding mountain tops, but it's nothing like you've been dealing with this long cold winter.

As a family, we continue to be blessed by our Lord. Our oldest, Fiona, attends one of our local WELS schools and really loves her teacher. The drive for our family is substantial, but we are humbled by the ways we've seen her faith grow. She always comes home excited to tell me about her Bible story for the day. At the end of each story, she asks: "Did you know that, Dad?" It



always brings a smile to my face.

I'm sure there is plenty I am missing, but this should at least provide a glimpse of God's work among and through us.

May the Lord continue to bless and keep you all.

CENTRAL AFRICA MEDICAL MISSION - MALAWI/ZAMBIA

May 2019 Newsletter

Since the beginning of 2019, I have been making monthly trips to our clinic at Mwembezhi, Zambia. That's a bit unusual for the Malawi administrator, but so are the circumstances. Following a field trip to Zambia in the summer of 2018, and in consultation with the Zambian Mission, CAMMC made the decision to hire a Zambian National as Clinic Administrator. In late December 2018, Pastor Dan Sargent who had somehow managed to include Clinic Administrator among all his other duties left Zambia to take a Call back in the United States. With Dan's departure, so went a lot of institutional memory, and the person who would likely train and mentor our new administrator. Hence my trips to Zambia.

The change in administration has not affected patient care. The medical side of clinic operations has been managed very successfully for years by Mr. Jackson Kalekwa. Jackson is a Lutheran Church of Central Africa (LCCA) member who is something of a local icon and as Clinical Officer-in-Charge has led the effort to provide high quality Christian based health care to the villages served by the clinic. The clinic was given a certificate of excellence for its quality assurance program in health care delivery by the Zambian Ministry of Health.

In January 2019, Mr. Alisad Banda was appointed to be our Clinic Administrator. Alisad is a mature Christian and longtime LCCA member who is married with two children. Until joining CAMM, Alisad worked for the LCCA Board of Charities, managing their home-based health care programs. He is very familiar with the operations at Mwembezhi as he has been involved in various issues related to the clinic. He is currently in the process of completing his degree in Public Health.

Alisad's background, experience and qualifications make him a natural fit for the position. Add in a Christian heart and mind, a character that believes in hard work, someone who is respectful of the past but looks for improvement, a desire to learn, a belief in team building and inclusiveness, plus a great sense of humor and you can see that hiring Alisad Banda as our Administrator was an easy decision. Alisad clearly understands that his role as administrator in Zambia is to provide Christian leadership and to ensure that the medical staff at Mwembezhi have the resources and support they need.

As Alisad goes through the orientation process, he is gradually learning the job duties such as reporting, accounting, ordering and delivering supplies, petty cash management, payroll, vehicle and property maintenance, insurance, staff discipline and human resources, licensing, government and institutional relations etc. Alisad is a quick learner and is doing well in his new role. We are blessed and thankful to have him as part of our team.

We have also created a Zambian Lutheran Medical Council. The purpose of the council is to provide guidance and support to the clinic – but not to run it, and to serve as an information conduit to the LCCA and the Zambia Mission. As an example, budgets, changes in pay and clinic conditions are presented to the medical council for their input and advice but are ultimately approved by CAMMC. The Council is comprised of 5 five members: Our Mission Liaison (chair), The Chairman of the LCCA – Zambia, The Chairman of the LCCA-Zambia Board of Charities, The Director of African Mission Operations, and The Malawi Lutheran Mobile Clinic Administrator. Having our African brothers on the team provides a unique perspective when dealing with African issues. The group has only met once, but we are already seeing positive results as we are making progress in dealing with longstanding clinic land and housing issues.

One of CAMM's long term goals is to turn more of the responsibility for running the clinics over to Zambian and Malawi nationals. This is a big step in that direction. We ask that you please pray for God's blessings for the future of the medical mission in Africa, for Alisad and his family and for the Zambian Lutheran Medical Council.

Principal's Message

It's going to get worse before it gets better.

John authored Revelation while exiled on Patmos. It was a dangerous time for Christians. Most faced persecution. Many were imprisoned. Some were being tortured and killed.

John's Spirit-inspired book accurately depicted his world. The Christian Church was under attack. It appeared that evil would soon gain the upper hand. Repeatedly, John urged the saints to be faithful to God during this tribulation.

But, it would get worse before it got better. He cautioned, "Do not be afraid of what you are about to suffer. I tell you, the devil will put some of you in prison to test you, and you will suffer persecution" [Revelation 2:10a]. But, immediately, he exhorted, "Be faithful, even to the point of death, and I will give you life as your victor's crown" [v.10b]. There was hope. Even if death was imminent, the Lord promised the "victor's crown" to all who persevered.

The Lord of the Church would not desert the faithful. Eventually, the institutions seeking to destroy Christianity would themselves end. No longer would the saints be persecuted, and the Church would actually become society's foundation.

Today, Christianity is again under attack. But, unlike John's time, the attack is not necessarily *physical*. Today's attack seeks to undermine the Church through *fear* and *apathy*. We feel alone and isolated because Scripture's views are no longer valued by society. At times, we are lulled into complacency thinking that attacks on Christians are distant, sporadic, and without effect.

In reality, those attacks are drawing closer and intensifying. Christians are identified in politics, the media, and entertainment as intolerant hatemongers. Some view us as the troublers of society for defending Scripture's truths on life, marriage, and sexuality.

We would all do well to read John's words and remind ourselves that we, too, live in a perilous age. At the same time, we can find comfort in God's Word. Even if persecution and death threaten us, God promises, "I will give you life as your victor's crown."

May God give us a strong faith to clings to him for he promises us "the victor's crown."




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MAY SCHOOL NEWS & NOTES:

Starting a new church: Why we do it

The Home Missions Administrator is an advisory, non-voting member of the Board for Home Missions (BHM) and is responsible for executing the decisions of the BHM.

Perhaps you know a family that drives many miles to worship at the nearest WELS church. Growing up, there was a family who drove over 75 miles one way to worship at the church where my father was pastor. Think about an unchurched family or an unbeliever. . . To my knowledge, when growing up or during the many years serving as a parish pastor, I can't recall any unchurched person making a specific effort to travel any great distance to worship with us.

Why do we plant mission churches? We do so in order to have another outreach center; another location from which God's Word can go out to people who need the message of sin and grace and law and gospel. We do so in order that folks blessed with faith in Christ Jesus can invite their neighbors, co-workers, or friends to join them in worship at a convenient spot.

If you're skeptical of church planting or believe the widespread myth that new church plants just "steal sheep" from other flocks, that simply is not the case. Yes, there are going to be people who start attending a new church who were part of a different church. There is no denying that it does happen. Generally speaking though, when a new church plant is engaging its community, is persistent in inviting the folks in their vicinity to worship, and encourages its members to invite their unchurched friends, typically there are going to be people reached who either have no church background or haven't been in a Christian church in years. They're lost in their sins! They need to hear about Jesus Christ; his perfect life, his Good Friday death, and that incredible resurrection on Easter Sunday that was done to save all those lost in their sins.

Yes, established WELS churches engage the unchurched and lost just like mission churches do. Yet, by their very nature, established churches do a lot to serve the already reached—which is vital! There are more hospital visits, more counseling sessions, more meetings. There can be more worship services and Bible classes. A lot of time is spent feeding God's people with the Means of Grace, just like it should be.

By its very nature, a mission church focuses most of its time and energy to reach the unchurched. A mission church looks to share God's truths in Holy Scripture with the lost. The reality is that planting new churches is most often the single greatest way to reach any culture far from God: that is the intent and purpose of the mission church.

When someone tells you, "We already have a lot of churches. . . we don't need to plant another", remind them that we need thriving bodies of gospel-motivated people hearing Jesus' directive who gather and then scatter to very intentionally and assertively fulfill the Great Commission. You can never go wrong supporting and praying for the people who are a part of a church plant. You can never go wrong in giving to WELS Home Missions so that church planting can continue in WELS. New churches make a difference—an everlasting difference. God bless our synod as we keep on planting mission churches.

Moving forward with the Vietnam opportunity

WELS members have responded overwhelmingly to the opportunity that God has given our synod in Vietnam. Gifts have been received from hundreds of congregations and individuals, totaling half of what is needed to support the building project and ministry training costs for a two-year period.

The Hmong Fellowship Church in Vietnam (HFC), a church body with approximately 100,000 members, has asked WELS to provide theological training for its pastors. Their leaders and several dozen pastors have been receiving instruction from WELS pastors for about three years. They have concluded that we are teaching biblical truth and have embraced the teachings of the Lutheran church. They want to be a Lutheran church body. With the permission—and even encouragement—of the Vietnamese government, the HFC has invited WELS to establish a theological training school where eventually all their pastors will receive thorough instruction and pastoral training.

Due to the generous outpouring of support, the first concrete step in making this plan a reality was taken two weeks ago. I, along with Board for World Missions Administrator Rev. Larry Schlomer and Director of Missions Operations Mr. Sean Young (pictured, center), traveled to Vietnam to sign a memorandum of understanding with Vietnamese religious officials and with the leaders of the Hmong Fellowship Church. This agreement enables our synod to secure the use of a four-acre parcel of land on the outskirts of Hanoi and to begin construction of the planned theological training school. Details are now being worked out, and we hope that construction will begin in the near future. Gifts received so far have enabled us to secure the land and will make it possible to build the school. We pray that additional gifts will provide the means to operate the school with WELS instructors.

We do not know where this effort will eventually lead. What we do know is that we have been given an amazing opportunity that would have been unthinkable only a few years ago. As we begin down this road, we do so realizing the risks, but also with our eyes of faith focused on the grace and promises of God and the opportunity he is giving us to proclaim the saving gospel in a place where it has been rarely heard. To God be the glory!

Pastor Zongchin

Pastor Zongchin is one of 60 Hmong Fellowship Church (HFC) leaders who are receiving theological training in Hanoi, Vietnam, from Rev. Bounkeo Lor, Hmong Asia ministry coordinator, and members of the <u>Pastoral Studies Institute (PSI)</u>. In March 2019, the leaders gathered again for two weeks of training. The first week was a study of the first 400 years of church history in the New Testament era. The second week was a study of the Bible's teachings about Church & Ministry. The intensive courses included 6 hours of class activities during the day and assigned readings in the evenings.

Pastor Zongchin shared his story with PSI Professor Rev. Brad Wordell, with Bounkeo Lor serving as translator:

On coming to faith: I was a businessman, and my business took me to Laos in the 1990's. There I met Pastor Lor's grandfather, who shared the gospel with me. He read to me from Matthew 24, where Jesus is talking with his disciples about the end of the world. Those words stuck with me. After I returned to Vietnam, I realized that I believed in Jesus. I gathered with the few other Christians in my village. I told everyone openly, "I am a Christian."

On ministry: But then the persecution came. I was followed by people and persecuted for 3 years. As I told people about Jesus, 15 families were converted. Because the persecution grew stronger, many of those families fled. I also had to move to the province of Song La. I remember thinking to myself that I was like Abraham, traveling to a new place which was not my home, because of the Lord. While I was there, a pastor from Laos came and taught me more about the Bible and about being a pastor. We studied the parables of Jesus and the meaning of baptism. He gave me practical advice about how to lead a congregation. Because of persecution by local government leaders, all the other Christians left; only I and my family remained. I sent a letter to the government in Hanoi. They sent a representative out to investigate. Then the persecution ceased for the most part. During the next 11 years I told people in my village and other villages about Jesus. In some areas I had to talk to people in the jungle, secretly, at night. Now I oversee 1580 members from 310 families in 14 congregations. Many of those congregations are led by elders, whom I am trying to train. I am a full-time pastor and I oversee many congregations, but I do not get paid as a pastor. In many cases congregations do not even pay for my travel to go serve them. I support myself as a rice farmer. I also grow a kind of grass that is dried and used for making brooms.

On learning: My ministry involves preaching and teaching and the training of elders. I need training so that I can do these things well. I have been learning Lutheran doctrine for almost seven years now. The training I am receiving from WELS is much better than the training I received earlier. Now I know how to interpret and explain the Scriptures. Now I am confident that I am preaching and teaching God's Word correctly.

What WELS members can pray for: I would appreciate it if the members of WELS would pray about my use of time. I want to have a proper balance in my use of time and money. Pray that I continue to gain more knowledge for teaching God's Word to others. Pray that the WELS can continue to train me and the next generation of leaders in our church. In my congregations there are four men who want to be pastors. Two of them are my sons. They keep asking me, "How soon can we begin our training?"
