

Up, Up, and Away!

Up, up, and away! After Nancy Robinson Master's "Ten Hot Tips for Writers" presented at last month's meeting, AWG members are buckling their seatbelts and preparing to soar. By comparing writing to piloting an aircraft Ms. Masters outlined tips that can enable a writer to become an "ace" – one of the five percent who produce ninetyfive percent of published works. In her down-to-earth language and often humorous examples drawn from a lifetime of writing and flying, her novel approach provided a fresh look at rules for successful writing.

She counseled members to be "pilots in command" of their stories – to prepare as thoroughly as an aviator carries out the preflight routine, to know where the story is going as clearly as a pilot charts his course, and to follow guidelines as religiously as a pilot follows his instruments. She asserted that just as pistons power an aircraft, strong verbs carry a written piece. She reminded us that often writers are too wordy and that usually a story can still be good even if a third is cut in the same way a pilot can continue in flight even if some part of his plane malfunctions.

I urge you to put those tips to work by filing a flight plan to enter the 2021-22 Abilene Writers Guild Annual Contest. Open to anyone over the age of fourteen, the contest will begin on October 1 and will run through the end of November. There are eight different categories including inspirational, memoirs, rhymed and unrhymed poetry, and prose for both children and adults. The flash writing categories challenge you to produce a piece using just forty-five words plus five given word prompts. You may submit as many entries in as many categories as you choose. Full information, guidelines, and deadlines are included in this newsletter and can also be found at *abilenewritersguild.org* under the "Newsletter" tab.

Experienced writers and willing novices looking to develop and improve upon their craft will not go wrong in becoming active members of the Abilene Writers Guild. Merely joining has advantages, but to enjoy the full benefits of membership one must fully participate by attending meetings and workshops and entering the contests. The monthly programs have been dynamic and informative, and this month's presentation on poetry should be no exception. The opportunity for fellowship with like-minded individuals can provide the encouragement and inspiration for you to plan and execute your solo maneuvers.

Grab your gear, chart your course, consult your instruments, and make 2021 the year you fly to new heights as a writer.

ABILENE WRITER'S GUILD ANNUAL CONTEST 2021-2022

General Information:

AbileneWritersGuild.org

- 1. Open to any person age 15 or older.
- 2. Entries must be postmarked between Oct. 1 and Nov. 30, 2021!

3. Categories with fewer than 5 entries are not eligible for prizes but may be critiqued if judges agree.

4. Categories, descriptions, maximum lengths, entry fees: page 2. Do <u>not count the title</u> in your word count.

5. All entries must be your original work, unpublished as of October 1, 2021. Publication on the Internet **is** publication. The work must not have earned a cash award in any previous **AWG** <u>ANNUAL</u> Contest. However, Honorable Mentions from past annual contests may be re-entered and <u>any</u> AWG monthly members-only-contest entry is eligible **if** it fits the category. Use font size 12; Times New Roman preferred. Type on one side of page.

6. <u>Each entry</u> must have a <u>separate</u> cover sheet . Upper left corner: your name, complete address, phone number and email address. Upper right corner: category and number of words or lines. <u>Space down to middle of page and center</u> your title on the cover sheet.

<u>First page, Poetry and Flash Fiction entries, categories 1-4</u>: Upper <u>right corner</u>: category and number of lines or words. Double space down and <u>Center the TITLE of your entry</u>; double space down again and begin. <u>Single space only</u>! <u>DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME ON ANY PAGE OTHER THAN THE COVER SHEET!</u>

First page, Prose Categories 5-8: DOUBLE-SPACE these, with one-inch margins. Upper right corner: type category and number of words. Do not count your title in the number of words. Double space down, center your title, double-space down again and begin manuscript. On all following pages: type entry title and page number in upper right corner. <u>Author's name goes</u> ONLY on the cover sheet.

Mail Entries Only: <u>Staple your cover sheet to your entry</u>. Attach payment with a paper clip to your entry. For multiple entries, be sure your check covers all entries and fill in the registration form or facsimile thereof. If you want your entry/entries returned, please provide a SASE with adequate postage, otherwise your entry will be discarded on or after May 31, 2022. (Hint: 1 stamp per 5 pages in a #10 letter-size envelope.) Our judges, professionals in their fields, are asked to critique each entry, but we cannot guarantee same.

Reminder: As in the majority of writing contests, entries not meeting the guidelines will be disqualified and fees will not be refunded. Please follow the rules carefully. **Decisions of the judges are final**. Winners will be announced at our Annual Awards Workshop to be held in March 2022, and will be published on our Website by April 15, 2022. Prizes will be mailed to winners who cannot attend the Workshop. Please check our website and/or newsletter for location, date, time and other details of the March 2022 Workshop. Entries will be available for pickup immediately following the Workshop.

You may also bring entries to AWG's October and November meetings if you are in the area.
