Rally Day is September 11 and then at 4:30 that day we will install Rev. Laura Wind as the Lutheran Campus Pastor at Duke University.


So, I've been thinking a lot about School in different ways in the last few days. First and foremost, I have been lamenting the lack of attendance in Sunday school. This summer, Sharon Schulze has held an adult session on studying the lectionary texts. This has been well attended and very uplifting. So for Adults, we will continue this during the fall as well as our normal Sunday school offerings. A list will be out soon. We hope to do some study on race and reconciliation, talk of what is going on within the ELCA (working for more unity with the Roman Catholic Church, conversation around how to manage a shrinking church, and conversation related to LGBTQ issues).

I suppose I was lamenting the lack of congregation participation with Duke Lutherans, another school topic. We do some fine things with them, but it would be nice if more people would become relational with the students, participate in meals and help support Pastor Laura.

I also had someone from another congregation come and ask if I would help teach their child

confirmation. That's another long story and one that I hope works out in God's favor.

But, it made me want to remind us of the promises that were made for us in baptism and that were affirmed at the time of our confirmation.





That we intend to continue in the covenant with God made at baptism:

To live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper (more than once a month would be nice), to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

This means we promised God to be participants. I know there are seasons of life that make it difficult for some, but most of us have some time we could devote to prayer, study, and service.

Please ponder this, and I encourage you to pray the prayer that ends the confirmation service:

Stir up in us the gift of your Holy Spirit: the

spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence, both now and forever.

choir anthems, soloists, speakers, concerts, and other musical activities that will be taking place at the church starting in September. Although we're taking a little break from the Schubert Sunday worship setting, we will return to it in Lent 2017. I think this setting is

more appropriate for that time of year, considering its pace and mood. In the meantime, we will stick with the more joyful Setting Three through Christmas and Epiphany.

The Joyful Noise Concert Series is starting up this month of September! Get ready for a number of wonderful concerts and events. Here are a few dates to mark on your calendars:

Sunday, Sept 18th at 3:00 pm - Raleigh Camerata

This is a fabulous early music group that will join us again in the Spring. This concert program will feature Dutch composers and music published in Amsterdam prior to 1800.

Sunday, Oct 16th at 4:00 pm - Michael Burkhardt Hymn Festival

Michael Burkhardt returns to St. Paul's Lutheran! The theme of this festival is "Living Voices of the Gospel," inspired by Luther's belief that music is a living voice of the Gospel, and in light of the upcoming celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. This hymn festival will highlight the hymns of Martin Luther, paired with hymns of a variety of times and places.

Sunday, Nov 6th at 3:00 pm — Bull City Baroque

This is a new Early Music group including Allison Willet on violin, Robbie Link on gamba, and Jacqueline Nappi on harpsichord. This concert will feature dance music for violin and gamba, as well as a beautiful violin sonata by French composer Elisabeth Jacquet de la Guerre.

Saturday, Nov 12 at 6:30 pm – Lutherans Got Talent

Hooray for our annual Lutherans Got Talent Show, back for its fourth year! Performers of all ages and skill levels are welcome, as are talents of all types. There is a sign-up sheet in the atrium or speak with Amanda Anderson. All acts are welcome. This is a fun event for the whole family. We begin at 6:30 pm with a potluck dessert and fellowship time, and the Talent show begins at 7:00 pm – all in Trinity Hall. Plan to be here! Bring your visual arts for show as well!

Date TBA in Late December – St. Paul's Lessons & Carols Choir Concert

Last year in December the choir sang a beautiful concert of Advent music. This year, we will put together another choir concert, but with a Lessons and Carols theme. There will be a few hymns for audience participation. Come out and support the St. Paul's Choir and get in the Christmas Spirit!

In September or October, Brian Schmidt, fellow Lutheran and conductor of the Duke Vespers Ensemble, will be giving a series of lectures on J. S. Bach's theology in our Adult Sunday School. He will focus on Bach's cantatas and the specific message they were intended to give, along with Luther's musical heritage and how he impacted not only the music of J. S. Bach, but of the whole Lutheran musical tradition leading up to our present day. Be on the look out for these Adult Sunday School dates.

If you are looking for sacred music concerts and experiences outside of St. Paul's, Duke Chapel is holding a Bach Cantata Series led and conducted by Brian Schmidt. These concerts will be free of charge on specific Sundays each month at 5:15 pm. You can read more about the series on the Duke Chapel website under Concerts: "These cantatas were specifically designed to be theologically rich, educational, and inspirational for one purpose – to glorify God and refresh the human soul. In the same way, this series provides a modern connection with this great music of the past, exploring both the theological underpinning of the pieces, as well as their sheet musical brilliance. Each month will feature a Bach cantata with other meditative sacred and instrumental music. The Bach series will offer time of reflection, sanctuary, and peace, regardless of one's religious background."

Duke Lutherans

It has begun! School is back in session, and I've been busy meeting undergraduate students, graduate students, faculty, staff, and my religious life

colleagues. One of my favorite writers, John O'Donahue, priest, poet, and philosopher, has this to say about new beginnings:

Though your destination is not yet clear, You can trust the promise of this opening; Unfurl yourself into the grace of beginning That is at one with your heart's desire.

Awaken your spirit to adventure; Hold nothing back, learn to find ease in risk; Soon you will be home in a new rhythm, For your soul senses the world that awaits you.

Recently, I've been playing in the rhythm section in the Winston Salem Swing Band. I play piano, and I've learned something important about being "in rhythm" especially when playing with the band. The heart of the rhythm section is the drums, followed by the bass, rhythm guitar, and keyboards. Although playing swing/jazz music is new to me, I find myself sinking into the rhythm of the others. When the drummer lays down a beat, the rest of the band can ride that rhythm, and life is very good. When the drummer wavers, or the rest of the rhythm section is out of synch, the music is not as easy nor fun, and sometimes it completely falls apart. However, the moments when it all comes together, the drummer's got a groove, the upright bass is tearing it up, the rhythm guitar and I are on the same page, the saxes come in wailing, and then the trumpet comes in high over the top of the band. It's irresistible. People get up and dance and there is this great interplay between the musicians, the dancers, the music. Then add in our great leader, wailing away on the clarinet on a Benny Goodman chart, that's about as good as it gets. The beauty of it will take your breath away.

It all starts with the drums though, the steady beat. As we prepare a new beginning in the life of Duke Lutherans, that steady beat will be Word and Sacrament, fellowship, breaking bread together. We will continue the rhythm of weekly worship on Sunday evenings with weekly meals and fellowship.

New programming for graduate students; Wine and Word, a time together to share in fellowship and to see what the

Word has to say to us about challenges we face in our daily life; "Breakfast with Pastor Laura" both at the Grace house, and possibly in the dorms as I get to know the students – I will go and cook for Lutheran students and their friends in their dorm kitchens.

Service will also be part of this rhythm – "Touched by Grace," in partnership with Grace Lutheran Church's health fair on September 17, 9 am - 3 pm; also, Social Justice issues and disaster relief (Louisiana and Syria come immediately to mind).

We also have the possibility of traveling with the students from Carolina to Germany for an alternative spring break service/learning trip to celebrate the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation.

Additionally, I have been in conversation with members of the chapel staff and hope that we will have the opportunity to collaborate on some interesting programming – Faith and Film and worship with a global Lutheran focus.

It is a new beginning, and I know over the next weeks we will be finding our rhythm based on those things that sustain us — Word and Communion, prayer, study, service, and community. We will sing, laugh, and dance. There will be times of sadness and loss, but Jesus will be present through it all. And his heart will beat in each one of us.

After six months of helping to take care of the St. Paul's campus, I thought it would be good to reflect on various accomplishments and activities. When first writing in March about organizing an outdoor work group I suggested that this was a chance for members to:

- ▶ Be a good steward of the earth
- ► Build community
- ► Do something with a friend or family member
- ► Take pride in accomplishments
- Get some exercise
- ▶ Have some fun

So, let's reflect a bit on these items:

Be a good steward of the earth

Many groupings of bushes are receiving long overdue pruning and general care. This extended care will lead to stronger/healthier plants. Examples: Early summer pruning of Azaleas around the sanctuary and in the Memorial Garden. Hollies on the west side and rejuvenation pruning of the Indian Hawthorns on the east side. St. Johnswort shrubs on east side will receive rejuvenation pruning this winter. Dwarf Yaupon Hollies have been re-shaped.

Build community

I have been pleasantly surprised by the core group of workers who regularly come on Saturdays or during the week to provide plant care. The greatest delight was having 26 members show up for the Outdoor Work Day in April to spread mulch and topsoil. There are also other folks who come when a call goes out for additional help on a special project. When you tally this up there are about 30 members who have had a hand in helping to maintain the grounds at St. Paul's this spring and summer. Looking at labor-hours worked I've accounted for about 200 labor-hours on just Saturdays and estimated roughly 100 labor-hours by individuals who come during the week.

Do something with a friend or family member

Several family members participated in the Outdoor Workday last April. I don't think anyone has brought a neighbor yet, but it's something to strive for.

Take pride in accomplishments

The following folks take great pride in the areas they meticulously maintain – Nancy Anderson, raised entrance planter and Creation Garden; Kim Hoke, planting area by Cornwallis entrance; Audrey Busch, plantings around main sign at front of church; Tracey Dissel, west

side entryway; Robin Winfree, inside plants; Doug Whitfield, "The Journey" Plaza. Everyone I've worked with on Saturday morning takes pride in their work – they work safely, are thorough and clean-up when completed.
