We've Been Down this Road Before

Smoke Risers – by now, you've likely experienced the inconvenience of traveling down Rosser Road between the Gwinnett County border and Hugh Howell Road. Contractors

are doing a complete reclamation and resurfacing project. They should be wrapping up sometime in November; however, we can expect to see construction crews working on roads throughout Tucker for a while longer. For sure, this is a temporary nuisance, but hopefully, worth it in the long run.

Contractors officially kicked off the 2021 City of Tucker's road resurfacing campaign in late March, starting on Smithsonia Drive. The \$4 million project continues through the fall and will address 62 of the City's most poorly conditioned roads.

The majority of the resurfacing project in the City of Tucker is being funded through a Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (or SPLOST). More than \$2.1 million will be generated by the penny tax, which was approved overwhelmingly by DeKalb County voters in 2017. The tax will remain in effect through 2024. An additional \$360,000 for the road resurfacings will come from the Georgia Department of Transportation, while the Mayor and City Council allocated \$1 million in general fund money. The first of the city of Tucker's road resurfacing projects, funded by SPLOST, began in August 2018. At least 65% of SPLOST funds will address roads and drainage issues. Other SPLOST funding is designated for sidewalks, pathways, bikeways, fire facilities, safety equipment, and capital outlay projects for parks and recreation as well as public facilities.



Rosser Road

Anyone who regularly drives Rosser Road is now well aware that there is some major work happening! At the beginning of construction, Tucker City Engineer Ken Hildebrandt provided me with details around the project. Due to "an inordinate amount of potholes" after Rosser's last major repair, and because of the sinking of the granite curb over the years, the road is undergoing a total makeover this fall.

The area between Rosser Place and Oxbow Road has it the worst. According to Ken, "Due to the inadequate base of the road under the asphalt, simply resurfacing is not a long-term solution." The long-term solution, he says, is considered "Full Depth Reclamation... In this section we'll grind up the underlying base, add a soil cement material, and pave on top of it." The rest of the road (to the Gwinnett County line in one direction, and to Hugh Howell Road in the other) will receive a "heavy mill and resurfacing." The sinking granite curb will be reinstalled and/or replaced where needed. The whole project, coming in at just under one million dollars, is scheduled to be completed in mid-November. Though Rosser Road was not expected to completely close during the project, it is often inaccessible via Hugh Howell Road. Rosser will definitely be down to one lane at times, and that one lane might be extremely rough, uneven, and dusty, so expect traffic and/or find an alternate route. Hang in there neighbors, we'll soon be enjoying these big improvements! – by Rachel Caines

It has been my honor, and a responsibility I have embraced wholeheartedly, to serve as Tucker's Mayor since the city was first incorporated in March 2016. Since then, I have kept my promise to do locally the things we can do best locally, and to cooperate with DeKalb County on the things we can do better together.

I am proud of the way we've governed, sticking to the mandate given us to improve



quality of life for everyone, through smarter zoning and development, adding and improving parks all around town, passing and enforcing local ordinances that benefit everyone, and improving roads, sidewalks, trails, and other infrastructure in every corner of the city. Plans: Early on, we completed Master Plans for the City of Tucker. Tucker Together, our Comprehensive Plan, was followed by plans for Transportation, Parks, Trails, Downtown and more. These plans were completed with lots of public input. These plans guide our priorities, because they are your priorities, and they are the basis for all we do. All these plans are due for updates in the next four years. It's important to have the right leader guiding the city through that effort.

Projects: We have a number of transformative projects in progress, including Northlake, Fitzgerald Field, and two large new greenspace projects in downtown Tucker. All were begun under my watch, and I want to see them through, achieving all the potential we saw when they began.

Dear Neighbors,

First, thank you for the love and kindness that you have extended my family. A story ran in the Smoke Signal some time ago about how a family tragedy necessitated me adopting my half-brothers- then 7 and 11, and relocating them with me in Smoke Rise. They've adjusted famously well, and we appreciate the grace you have shown. I've taught them the importance of getting involved and giving back, so my bid for Mayor is an extension of that.

This is a nonpartisan election, however in full transparency just as our incumbent Mayor was Chairman of the DeKalb GOP before becoming Mayor of Tucker, I've held offices within the Democratic Party. I want to

assure you that my ten years as an Army Ranger in the 75th Ranger Regiment gave me a keen ability to work with people from all political spectrums and walks of life to get things done.

The concerns I hear most often from fellow Smoke Rise neighbors are A) crime, B) traffic and speeding, and C) failing storm drains. Crime doesn't just endanger our families - it also has a direct impact on



our home values. We've had a rash of crime in Smoke Rise, even home invasions - mostly originating from across US Highway 78. I'd like to work with our neighborhoods and the DeKalb Police Department to implement neighborhood watch programs, along with stepped up and continued police patrols. Regarding speeding and traffic - I'd advocate to procure and locate more radar-controlled signage in areas with known speeding issues, and advocate for commissioning feasibility studies to explore traffic circles. As far as storm drains are concerned - I am already hard at work holding feet to the fire to get these repaired. My goal is for DeKalb County to repair these before the city of Tucker gets stuck holding the bill.

In closing, I served in the military for ten years, and I've been a businessman for twenty. I love Tucker and find it's an amazing place to raise my kids. Like any parent though, I want my family to be safe. My broad set of experience, community service, and service to country can help increase the quality of life here in Tucker. The Covid 19 Booster Shot

So in the "Time of COVID", it is that time to start thinking about booster shots. Hopefully most of you have received the vaccine, having made this decision after reviewing the scientific information, talking to trusted healthcare providers, as well as having heard horrific stories about the terrible effects of the disease. By now, most of us know someone who has died from Covid 19, and we're daily discovering more permanent effects this disease has on survivors. Fortunately, we are also daily discovering new information on how to effectively combat Covid 19. One of the most powerful weapons in the fight against Covid 19 patients. This is a terrible drain on our healthcare system and its workers. And, this has also caused a critical shortage of ICU beds for non-Covid patients with life threatening illness.

If you received the Covid 19 vaccine, you are protecting yourself, as well protecting others. This vaccine, like other vaccines, stimulates the production of the body's natural antibodies. These antibodies fight the Covid 19 virus, either preventing the disease or making it less severe.

The story behind development of Covid 19 vaccines is a dramatic story- a race against time during an accelerated race for more information. Once the genetic makeup of this unique virus was identified, laboratories all over the world rushed to find an effective vaccine against it, as well as effective methods to treat it. The vaccine labs were in private industry, as well as in government and academic labs. As you know, the vaccines that came out first were mRNA from Pfizer and Moderna, Janssen followed soon after with a DNA adenovirus vector vaccine. All labs looked at the effectiveness of the vaccine in producing antibodies, as well as gauging the amount of protection the antibodies provided. The initial data on all three vaccines looked good, and indicated that they did effectively provide protection. Protection ranged from 66% to 95% depending on the population studied. By comparison, the flu shot in any given year is only 20% to 60% effective! As people all over the world were dying from Covid 19, emergency vaccine approval was given by the FDA to combat this deadly virus. While studies did show the vaccines worked, we didn't have the final data as to how long the protection would last. This information is now becoming available.

We know that immunity from both mRNA vaccines starts to decline after 6 months. So, what are the booster guidelines? That's a very simple question with a convoluted answer.

The United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced a plan to offer booster shots in the fall. This was subject to independent evaluation of the safety and efficacy of a third shot for Pfizer and Moderna, the two mRNA vaccines. The CDC was to develop guidelines, then HHS was to prepare to offer booster shots by September 20, 2021. Booster shots were to be scheduled for eight months after the second dose. As of this writing, it has been announced that the Pfizer vaccine will be offered, but there will be a delay in the Moderna. Boosters are the same dose as the first two vaccines. Currently it is recommended that you get the same Pfizer or Moderna type that you received for the first two vaccines. However, some studies suggest an advantage to mixing vaccines.

My husband and I have both received our third mRNA vaccine, after getting our first two vaccines in February. The vaccine is now offered to persons who may have their immune systems compromised. Those qualified are generally over the age of 65, or having some chronic disease affecting immunity or are taking an immunosuppressive drug. When you ask for your Covid 19 booster shot, you will likely be offered a flu shot as well. In my opinion, this may not be a good idea because if you have a side effect, you will not know which vaccine caused it. Get them both, but not on the same day! The United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced a plan to offer booster shots in the fall. This was subject to independent evaluation of the safety and efficacy of a third shot for Pfizer and Moderna, the two mRNA vaccines. The CDC was to develop guidelines, then HHS was to prepare to offer booster shots by September 20, 2021. Booster shots were to be scheduled for eight months after the second dose. Guidelines regarding everything Covid 19 change as new information comes in. Your best protection is to seek out a booster and get it as soon as possible.

"Once a Week go Greek," is precisely what the food dudes did. After taking a month off, we wanted to hit one of Tucker's staples. In full disclosure, we do not go Greek once a week, but that may change. This down-to-earth, family-owned, authentic small Greek restaurant chain started with the first store opening in Hapeville in 1982. There are seven of these gems across Atlanta, with Tucker being home to the second location opening nearly 15 years ago. This place has got quite a bit of history.

We are guessing that many native Tuckerites (if that is actually a thing) have passed this locale hundreds of times thinking "Hey, we really need to try this place." Let us break this down for you. A great authentic Gyro is hard to come by, and we're not talking about the mall food court type, but the real deal. So, Nick Koulouris desired to bring the authentic flavors and freshness of Greek cooking to a quick serve setting in our town.


Now you know the back story, so on to the food. We kept it simple. To start, we ordered the Dolmades, also known as stuffed grape leaves. Then we moved on to a Gyro Wrap, Souvlaki Wrap and Grecian Potatoes. We left our desert options open for the time being. Our Mediterranean culinary adventure began with the Dolmades. They are green pods of "awesome," filled with a flavor-packed mixture of seasoned rice and are served with a side of Nick's famous secret sauces. "Often replicated but never duplicated", we were told. Our Gyro wrap, a blend of seasoned lamb and beef, and the pork Souvlaki wrap were seasoned to perfection and partnered with red onions, tomatoes, more secret sauce, and were all tucked nicely into a wonderfully grilled, soft, thick wrap of pocket-less Pita bread. We also ordered a side of Grecian Potatoes. These crispy, super savory and herby wedges with Grecian seasonings were delicious all the way. While we were eating, we were already eyeballing a selection of dishes for our next visit, commencing with the Spanakopita and concluding with Baklava! Thank you, Grecian Gyro, for an excellent quick and uncomplicated dinner! Don't take our word for it, but you really should, it's a great choice for a fast and delicious, meal.

The Birds of Smoke Rise: Part Two by Kathy Rhinehart

The Ruby Throated Hummingbird is fascinating to watch. This jewel has a bright red throat, black chin and a mask that extends behind the eyes. The top of its head and back is an iridescent green. Its underparts are pale gray with a green wash on the sides of the belly. Females are much duller than males. The chin and throat are white with pale green streaks.

American Robins seem to always be on the lookout for a worm or a bug, as they are ground feeders. This beautiful thrush features a rusty brick red breast and a dark head and back. Both female and male are similar except the female appears paler.

The American Goldfinch is a ray of sunshine on a cloudy day. In the summer, males are a vivid yellow with a black cap and black wings. Females are a duller yellow and lack the black cap. In winter, both look the same and turn a pale brown/olive color.

House Sparrow males have gray crowns, black beards, white cheeks, and chestnut on either side of their faces and necks. Their backs are predominately brown with black streaks. Females are a gold brown color with streaks of black on their backs. House sparrows prefer feeding on the ground or on feeders that can accommodate both of their feet such as hopper feeders and tray feeders. They will feed from feeders with perches as well but do prefer a flat feeding space.

Mourning Doves are known for their low drawn-out calls sounding like someone in mourning, thus, the name. These spots on their backs. They pretty much hang out in pairs as they waddle under elevated bird feeders to swallow seeds and small gravel to help digest hard seeds. They are comfortable foraging on ground that is covered with shrubs.

Brown Thrashers are large birds, ten to twelve inches in length with long, curved bills and very long tails. They have two prominent white wing bars, rich brown color on its top side and creamy-white breasts heavily streaked with brown. Their faces are gray with yellow eyes. If you see a Brown Thrasher, it is a symbolic representation of stability, balance, and harmony. This bird reigns as Georgia's state bird.

Carolina Wrens are a common species residing in the eastern half of the United States. This shy bird can be hard to see, but it delivers an amazing number of decibels for its size. Follow its "tea kettletea kettle" or "Germany-Germany" and other piercing exclamations throughout your backyard. It has reddish brown upper parts with buffy underparts with a white throat and long white eyebrows. The wings and tails have bold darker barring, and the bill is long and thin.

House wrens are among the birds most likely to nest in a front door wreath. If a temporary wreath resident would not be welcome on your front door, be sure to relocate the wreath to a less conspicuous location before spring. This very small songbird is notable for its lack of field marks. The warm brown upper parts and tail are matched by a grayish breast. Males tails up when perched. The thin, slightly curved bill is ideal for capturing and eating insect prey.

Pileated Woodpeckers demand your attention by their size alone. It's the largest woodpecker in North America, ranging about 16 to 19 inches in length. Its massive excavations sometimes cause smaller trees to break in half. Many years ago, I saw one for the first time. It was destroying our deck. We had to have a lot of wood replaced as it continued showing up to proclaim its territory and attract a mate. We also had one that was roosting in one of our front yard trees about 15 years ago. It was amazing to see how large the cavity was in that tree. It was about the same size as the woodpecker's body. Sadly, that tree was struck

by lightning and had to come down.

Growing up in a small town in southwestern Mississippi with two older sisters was such a blessing. We are still super close and talk daily. When I grew up, I had the nickname 'bird legs'. I remember telling my Daddy that I was so tired of people calling me "bird legs". He said, "Baby Bumpin- one of these days you're going to take that as a compliment." Now I love my long lean bird legs and I also find I love watching



Do you cringe when you see trash on our streets and highways? Are you upset by how wasteful our society is when it comes to packaging the items that we buy? Then, I have something that you can do to help our environment and help individuals who are less fortunate in our community at the same time. It is something simple that all of us can do. You can recycle all those plastic bags you get while out shopping. One of the commitments of the Smoke



Rise Morning Glories Garden Club is to adopt environmentally friendly practices to make our community more aesthetically appealing to our neighbors. Last year our club started collecting plastic bags after hearing about a project called Bags 2 Blankets.

Bags to Blankets began about 5 years ago when a group of volunteers at a church in Saginaw Township, Michigan started collecting plastic grocery bags. The bags were then cut into strips, tied together to make Plarn (plastic yarn) then crocheted into bedding mats for the homeless. It takes about 700-800 bags, 30 hours, and a bit of patience to crochet a mat. During the Covid crises, a local woman, Janis Sims, was challenged by her sister in New Jersey to start a project that would be of help to her community. She happened upon the Bags 2 Blankets video on YouTube and decided that this could be her project.

At her volunteer job with NetWorks in Tucker she shared her idea with one of the directors. The director encouraged her to do it, stating she would love to be able to distribute the mats to some of Network's clients. After hearing about the idea, Tucker First United Methodist Church offered space that could be used for the project. Janis now leads a group who meet at the church the 4th Thursday of the month from 10-12 p.m. where bags are cut and knotted together to make Plarn. Others come with the mats they are crocheting and work on them while there. The completed mats are distributed through NetWorks and the Tucker Precinct Police Department, who often carry a mat in their patrol car to give out as needed. If you are interested in being a part of this project, please join one of Janis' meetings on the 4th Thursday at Tucker First United Methodist Church. If you would just like to collect the bags or make the Plarn, you can drop them off at the church office any time.

The Morning Glories Garden Club has been collecting plastic bags for the past year. Some ladies cut the bags into strips and knot them together to make the Plarn. The Morning Glories held their September meeting in person and participated in a Plarn workshop. Members who had not been involved were able to have hands on instruction. The Morning Glories hope you will do your part and will continue to help to our environment by eliminating landfill by recycling what is so prevalent in our community.



Fall Armyworms: Spodoptera frugiperda

A few weeks ago neighbors began noticing an influx of fall armyworms infiltrating their yards, turning green grassy lawns into dry fields seemingly overnight. Fall armyworm moths migrate to us via Florida every summer and while some years are better than others, this year has been particularly awful. Fall armyworms enjoy wreaking havoc on several common types of grass, such as Bermuda, Fescue,

and Bluegrass; they don't care much for Zoysia. They also feast on fruits and vegetables like lettuce, corn, tomatoes, and blueberries.

The female armyworm moth lavs hundreds and

hundreds of eggs en masse which will hatch to become the larvae, a caterpillar of green, brown, or grey with an inverted "Y" on its head. They are small at first but can grow up to an inch and a half in length as they eat their way through your yard. In the younger stage, they simply eat the leaf tissue of the grass which in turn gives the grass a brown appearance. Since they are only eating the blade and not the root, your grass can recover from an infiltration. However, as the worms mature, their damage becomes more noticeable and severe. The smaller they are when you catch them, the better chance you have at preventing damage.

So how do you spot them? At the first sign of any dulling of your grass, you can do the "soap test" to determine their whereabouts as they tend to hide in the dirt. Simply mix an ounce of dishwashing soap with a gallon of water, soak a recently impacted area, and within a minute or so you'll start to see worms emerge from the ground.

Once you confirm an outbreak you'll want to consult with your local lawn care company immediately or attempt to tame them yourself as quickly as you can. The best options are more proactive, like spotting their egg masses earlier in the season, limiting outdoor lighting which attracts the moths, and strategically planting bird and insect-loving plants to help control the population of worms. Neem oil is a great natural option and it helps kill other harmful insects as well, like termites. If an insecticide is your only option, be sure to spray late in the evening when the worms are most active, and be mindful of your neighbors in the wind. But remember, the true key is in catching the outbreak early!

Amen, Let's Eat Figs! by Joyce Ray



Covered Dish or "Potluck" meals are shared by many and give the opportunity for the cooks in your family, church, school, or clubs to share and become famous for their best recipes. No matter where it originated, the dish gets more credibility if it is called "Mama's Red Velvet Cake" or "Miss Louise's Chicken Casserole". I enjoy reading through my growing library of cookbooks generated as fundraisers for churches or schools and see some common versions of recipes and recall the person whose name is attached to it. One that piqued my interest was "Ethel's Funeral Cake." There is probably a story behind that! These recipes are the legacy of wonderful cooks and we are blessed that they shared them in print. Here are some of my favorites:

Using Ritz Cracker crumbs for almost any recipe gives a nice crunch and added buttery flavor. Just add 1/3 cup melted butter to 1 cup cracker crumbs and sprinkle on top of any vegetable casserole. This "secret," along with its competitor, "French fried onions" shows up on casseroles from squash, potato, broccoli to macaroni/cheese.

Miss Helen's Broccoli Casserole

1 head fresh broccoli cut into bite size pieces 10 ³/₄ ounce can cream of mushroom soup 1 cup mayonnaise $\frac{1}{2}$ cup medium chopped onion 2 cups grated cheddar cheese 2 eggs 1 full tube Ritz crackers 1/3 cup melted butter Salt/pepper to taste Parboil or steam broccoli 3-5 minutes until still "crispy". Put

in 9x13 baking dish. Mix mushroom soup, mayonnaise, onion, eggs, cheese, and seasonings and pour over broccoli. Mix cracker crumbs with softened butter. Sprinkle over top and bake at 350° for 40 minutes uncovered. By changing the soup, this sauce and topping can be used for many vegetables such as squash, asparagus, potatoes, green beans, or mixed variety. Add cooked chopped chicken and you have a quick main dish!

This next recipe is very easy to put together and is presented in cookbooks with several names from "Chocolate Éclair Pie" to "Yum Yum Dessert." When you serve it, you get to name it!

Layered Chocolate Pudding Pie

Crust:

- 1 stick melted butter 1 ¹/₂ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup chopped pecans.

Mix butter, flour and pecans thoroughly, press in bottom of 13x9x2" pan and bake for 25 minutes at 350°. Cool in pan.

- 1st layer: 8 oz cream cheese
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
 - 1 cup prepared whipped topping

Mix until smooth and spread on cooled crust.

- 2nd layer: 1 small pkg vanilla instant pudding
 - 1 small pkg chocolate instant pudding 3 cups milk

Add milk to mixes and stir until well blended. Add to top of Cream Cheese layer.

Topping: Spread with remaining whipped topping. Shave chilled Hershey bar into small pieces and sprinkle over top. Chill overnight. Cut in squares to serve.

My mother-in-law was a wonderful cook and her specialty for reunions and church suppers was her recipe for Brunswick Stew. Between my husband and me, we have tried to replicate it and the following comes close. It cooks long and slow but is well worth the wait. I found to be a great recipe for my oversized crock pot but it could be cooked in roasting pan in oven at lower temp. It freezes well.

Ray Family Reunion Brunswick Stew

Cook one 3-4 lb broiler fryer chicken in crock pot on low overnight. Next morning, pull meat from bones and reserve 3 cups chicken for stew (the remainder makes great chicken salad).

Add 3 cups cooked chopped chicken to bottom of crockpot. Brown 1 lb ground beef in skillet and add on top of chicken. Dice one large potato and one medium onion and add on top. Dice 1 cup of smoked sausage (about 1/2 package) for next layer. Pour on 2 (15 oz) cans of creamed corn and 3 (15 oz) cans crushed tomatoes, Add 1 cup barbeque sauce (we use Williams Bros. Original), ¹/₂ cup water, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 ¹/₂ teaspoons black pepper and 1 teaspoon tabasco sauce. When mixture begins to boil - after about 1 hour - stir and continue to cook all day on low, stirring occasionally. It is ready to eat when potatoes are soft.
