

Come to me and Learn, for I am meek and humble of heart

To someone approaching it for the first time, Christianity could seem a complicated system of beliefs, regulations and rituals that could distract from the fundamental tenet of our Judeo-Christian faith: "The Lord our God is ONE: Love the Lord God with your whole heart, soul and mind and your neighbour as yourself". At its heart, Christianity is a call to view the world through the eyes of Jesus.

In accordance with the vision of Zechariah in the first reading, Jesus comes among us - not as a warrior king to be feared or venerated, but as a man of peace open to the

presence of God with and in others. Jesus taught by his living, that faith in God should be a life giving force for those who believed but he was equally aware that religion could be presented as a force that oppressed people into a culture of guilt and social distancing, keeping them from realising their worth in the eyes of God. Some of his contemporaries, religious leaders, claimed that observance of countless commandments of the law was the way to life and they called it taking upon oneself the 'yoke of the kingdom of God'.

Jesus' prayer that opens today's Gospel gives us a precious insight into his loving communion with God as Father of all and what we, as human beings, beloved of God should strive for. He gives thanks to God for what is taking place: those weighed down by life's burdens are coming to realise God's love for them through the compassion, interest and friendship of another human being and this is a source of encouragement and joy to them. Jesus offers them a yoke, not of more and more rules, but of a relationship in which his gentle and humble love, companionship and guidance, would accompany them through life's burdens and empower



them to realise their worth as children of a faithful empathetic and loving God.

The second reading of St Paul reminds us that we are enabled to live like Jesus in peaceful communion with God and with one another, because we possess the Spirit of God. "...the Spirit has made his home in you." Enlivened by the Spirit we are able to engage with the world and its peoples, seeing it through God's eyes. May we then, with open hearts, ever be open to opportunities to share the yoke of building a more just, compassionate and peaceful world respecting the gifts, dignity and entitlements of each other and offering welcome and hospitality to those who long for a place to call home.



<u>Together in the Spirit</u> <u>Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday</u>

Each year, the Catholic Church in Australia celebrates Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday in the first week of July, with a range of resources produced by the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) for the occasion.

This year the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday will be celebrated with a theme chosen to respond to the current challenges we face as a community – Together in the Spirit. Australian Catholics and parishes are invited to come 'Together in the Spirit', united by our faith, to celebrate the gifts of Indigenous spirituality and culture in our Church and wider community.

With the COVID-19 pandemic affecting the celebration of Masses across the nation, new ways of marking and celebrating the day have been developed. As such, for the first time, an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday Mass will be live streamed from St Francis Xavier Cathedral, Adelaide on Sunday 5th July at 11.30am.

Bishops Disappointed in Small Minimum Wage Increase

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference says a 1.75 per cent increase in the national minimum wage falls well short of the boost needed, leaving many families vulnerable during a pandemic. The Conference, which has made submissions to the annual review of the minimum wage for decades, argued for a 4 per cent increase – before COVID-19 led to additional financial uncertainty for many low-paid workers and their families.

It is an enormous responsibility and privilege to be asked to undertake this appointment." Prayer gives us nobility; it is able to protect one's relationship with God, who is the true companion along humanity's journey, amidst thousands of hardships in life, good or bad, but always with prayer," he said.
