Thank you for all of your support of our parish. I just wanted to let you know about something. Our HVAC people tell us that the boiler in the social hall is "on borrowed time." It has not failed yet, but is expected to wear out this year some time. We received a quote for over \$28,000 to replace it with a new boiler. Also, we need a better dehumidifier system in the basement of the social hall. This will cost us over \$3,000. I just wanted to let you know that your donations to the parish are necessary, beneficial and being put to good use.

Pro-Life Corner

Think About Life...

"Every child a wanted child." This is a popular slogan in the abortion industry. At first glance, it sounds like a great argument. *Shouldn't every child be loved and wanted?* Of course. But people who make this argument to support abortion are suggesting that children who are *not* loved and *not* wanted should be *killed*. This is not only illogical, it is cruel. And the message is directed at the wrong people.

If a baby in the womb is not loved or wanted, who has the defect – the baby or the rest of us? Obviously, the problem is with those of us who have not learned how to truly love as Christians should. Why should we make it legal to kill babies just because the people who are supposed to be protecting them do not know how to love? When we hear a news story about a child who was harmed by a parent or guardian who did not love or want that child, our first instinct is *not* to say, "Oh, dear... Somebody should really end that child's life so that he doesn't have to be unwanted and unloved." Rather, our hearts break for that child, and we want to take him away and love him ourselves.

When people don't love a child that they conceive, a better solution would be to help them learn how to love, or to place that child with adoptive parents who can provide the love and care that every child deserves. Killing children is certainly not the solution to our inability to love. It's a *symptom* of our inability to love.

Furthermore, many children started out very unwanted by their parents; but then, after birth, their parents had a change of heart and found that they loved and wanted their children very much. People who work at pregnancy resource centers (also called "crisis pregnancy centers") can recount many such stories, and there are numerous women (and men!) who are willing to give testimonies of their change of heart.

Some people claim that abortion can be the most "loving" thing to do for a child. Margaret Sanger, the founder of Planned Parenthood, once said, "The most merciful thing that the large family does to one of its infant members is to kill it."¹ In other words, Sanger suggests that it can be loving to kill your newborn baby if your family is big. This is definitely *not* a Christian view of love.

As Christians, we believe that we should do everything possible to care for every child, even if it means sacrificing ourselves. That's not easy to do, but it's our purpose in life. This is why we were created. God did not make you for yourself. You were made to be a hero to others. We were all made to give ourselves as gifts to others. God made us for *agape*, and when we love others that way, we will find happiness. Some of us will be called to do that in small ways. Others will be called to do it in very big ways.

Do not be afraid of the ways that you will be called to sacrifice for other people – including for unborn children. *Agape* is where we discover all of the things that truly make life worth living.
