The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness — on them light has shined.







Silence for reflection.



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DONALD V. KLEIN March 31, 1031—June 23,2018




Don Klein, 87, passed away on June 23, 2018. He grew up near Lake Harriet in Minneapolis, Minnesota, the second son of Evelyn and Victor Klein. He was particularly close to his grandmothers, Adeline Holt and Harriet Klein, and to his brother, Dick, his closest lifelong friend. He majored in Art at Saint Olaf College, highlighted by his studies under Arnold Flaten. There he met Anna-Marie Burgess, his "wild Norwegian" whom he adored for the rest of his life. He studied architecture at the University of Minnesota, interrupted by two years in the U.S. Navy serving on the aircraft carrier, USS Leyte. In 1955, Don and Anna-Marie married and lived in Norfolk, Virginia for his final year in the service,

returning to Minnesota to complete his degree. In 1959, they moved to England where Don earned his Master's Degree in Town Planning and Civic Design at the University of Liverpool. They lived in Saint Paul, MN, and then in Kirkland, WA, where they stayed for the rest of their lives. They have four children - John (Maria Pastoor), Andrew (Mary Gabriel), Joanne, and Paul, and two grandchildren - Gabrielle and Hannah.

Don was a planner. He worked for the cities of Minneapolis and Seattle, and for U.S. Housing and Urban Development from the 1970s until his retirement, planning neighborhoods and Indian housing in Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. He designed to respect the landscape, putting parks in flood plains and houses oriented to enjoy views. He prioritized designing homes to work for their families' needs, whether in fishing villages or in suburbs. He particularly loved doing site inspections, which combined his love of travel and his dedication to quality site development. His planning skills informed his church duties. When the church needed an elevator, Don did the same detailed research that he brought to his career; when the church redesigned the sanctuary, he visited dozens of churches to research floorplans, furnishings, and color possibilities.

Don planned for fun. He loved travel - the careful, detailed planning beforehand; the travel itself with its conversations, new foods, and historical



markers; and organization of his pictures afterwards. He took Anna-Marie on her first camping trip, and they took their family camping in the Black Hills with army surplus gear. He took the family on road trips, exploring every route between Washington and Minnesota to see family, to family reunions in Alberta, Canada, and on an epic journey from Seattle to New York City and Washington, D.C. in a station wagon. Later in life, he walked regularly and extensively, carefully tracking his mileage until he had walked around the world. He then applied new mileage for going pole-to-pole, while noting he might not live long enough to make it. Finally, Don loved cars - driving them, drawing them, and studying them. He could identify car models from his childhood just by their front grills, including details on their

design histories. As a child, he wrote to the Pullman Car Company for plans so that he could do detailed drawings of buses and trolleys. He drew cars on his class notes, meeting agendas, and church bulletins. He could look at a drawing later and remember what was said when he drew it.

Don was an artist as well as a planner. His art was a mission of faith. He designed banners for church services, weddings, and ordinations. He created designs for Maritime Ministry events and unique wedding invitations for family and friends. His greatest work was his Christmas cards. From his teen years into his 80s, he created a unique work of art every year to celebrate the Christmas message. Many of these were silk screened in the garage, with cards covering the basement to dry. At its height, the

Christmas card list included over 400 families. Designs could reflect issues facing society, such as the card that portrayed the Holy Family living in a VW bus under the Alaska Way Viaduct and the card celebrating the love of God with flags from every side of global conflicts. He snuck in fun details such a canoe paddling down the living waters (John 7:38), and a hippy dancing for joy to the world. But most importantly, he grounded the card in the love and hope of the Christmas story.

Finally, Don was just Don. He had a photographic memory and could remember how to find his way anywhere he had been before, and the color of the front door. He was a totally linear thinker, balanced by Anna-Marie who was totally non-linear. They made it work for 62 years. He enjoyed going for haircuts with his son, Andy; he could untie knots with one hand; and he had so many near-death experiences from his many adventures that we lost track. Death finally caught him. He lived with a twinkle in his eye and a love for conversation. He will be very much missed by his surviving family, including his children and grandchildren, his brother, Richard, his brothers-in-law, Andrew Burgess (Jan Schuetz) and Joseph Burgess, and by his many cousins, nieces, nephews, and friends.
