#### Announcement Made at Euthenistic Rally for Suffrage Cause at the Academy.

#### FUNDS FREELY SUBSCRIBED.

If there were any dissenting notes among the workers for the cause they were not audible last night at a great women suffrage mass meeting held at the Kosciuszko Academy of Music under the auspices of the Woman Suffrage party of this borough.

The women were young Brooklyn school girls, who were brandishing "Victory" ribbons, and the balconies as well as the boxes of the opera house were decorated with the yellow woman suffrage banners of the different Assembly district organizations. They carried the letters "W. S. C." and the same of the club. Another banner draped over the stage was that of the "Brooklyn Woman Suffrage Association," of which Mrs. Stephen Lottin is the president.

The overflow meeting outside was addressed by Mrs. Grace Wolfenden of the Elizabeth Assembly district, Miss Bill Cuff, who was one of the "Almost Pioneers," and Miss Elizabeth Freeman, who had the distinction of having been thrown in prison in England for her work in the suffrage cause. There was a good night, but an audience of about a hundred stayed to listen on the steps to the Academy building.
