"What shall I render unto the Lord for all His benefits toward me?" Psalm 116:12.

"Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits: who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies, who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that they youth is renewed like the eagles." Psalm 103: 2-5. Our life in service to our master is what we have to render. He has given us so many benefits we can never repay Him in a life of service. 

Christ's Perfect Sacrifice

"Christ being come an high priest of good things to come, by a greater and more perfect tabernacle, not made with hands, that is to say, not of this building; neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by His own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us. How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God? And for this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance." Hebrews 9:11, 14, 15.

Christ's perfect sacrifice is the theme of our message. Christ being come an high priest of better things to come. We are living in the age of better things, Better living, better homes and better methods of doing things.

In the time of Moses the people lived under the dispensation of the Law. Paul said, Christ is a high priest of better things. We are privileged to live in the dispensation of this high priest who is calling men and women out of darkness to this

better way.

We are not asked to come and bring an heifer or a goat or a bull, not asked to bring such sacrifices, for Christ shed His own blood and entered once into the Holy place obtaining eternal redemption for us. Jesus Christ came one time to offer Himself a propitiation for sin; not entering in year after year as did the priests under the Law, but He entered in once and offered Himself before God for your sins and mine. The blood of Jesus Christ, the standard of Christianity, is the type of better things. During the time of Moses, if a man disobeyed the Law he was taken out and stoned to death. We have the privilege of accepting Him and His blood for our portion and the privilege of coming to God through His blood. Works are good but will not save us, we must come through the blood of Him who made the perfect sacrifice.

He was not offered as a sacrifice by Pilate, he was not offered as a sacrifice by the High Priest, he offered HIMSELF before God. Through the blood of Him who hath redeemed us, we can have redemption from sin, unrighteousness and ungodliness, we can be a new creature through Jesus Christ our Lord and our Saviour and our soon

coming King.

Attending church will not make you a christian. Because your parents took you to church all of your life will not make a christian out of you. Going to church on Sunday and living like the devil through out the week bespeaks the fact that the church will not save you. If you are saved it is because you honored the blood of Jesus Christ as the only atonement for sin. No other way is salvation given. We are offered programs, church membership, lodges, etc., but only in Jesus Christ is there redemption. Some feel because their parents are christians that they are just automatically a christian. I was brought up in church, my father was a minister and taught me to fear God and I appreciaated it, but my father's religion nor my grandfather's religion were not sufficient for me. One night the message of Jesus touched my heart and I knelt before Him and found peace with God. If you are lost and away from God you too must honor this Christ and His blood, the Christ of calvary who loves you. He loved us enough to freely give His life for us. Thank God for the old time salvation that goes below the collar bone way down deep into the heart. No matter how great a sinner you are nor how little a sinner, nor how righteous, it makes no difference, we all must come through the blood.

Some think because they are brought up under the shadow of the church and in a christian home they are a christian. Now if we would build the finest garage in the world and place in there a fine Palomino horse and also put in a barrell of gasoline, then go out there the next morning that horse would still be there. Some might say, that horse would turn to a new green Cadillac because the gasoline was there and that was where a car belonged. You can go to church all your life and the church will not make a christian out of you. You must come under the blood of Jesus. Jesus offered Himself without spot that we might have these better things.

"For if the blood of bulls and of goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifieth to the purifying of the flesh: how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal spirit offered Himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?" Hebrews 9:13-14.

In the time of Moses the blood of the bull and of the goat and the ashes of an heifer were received by God as an offering for sin. Under grace we are purified and cleansed if we honor the atonement of Christ, and it will purge our conscience from dead works to serve a living God. May God help us to lift higher His standard and live up to it. The devil is bidding high for the souls of men, many are answering the call and finding only heartache and tragedy. The devil cannot heal your broken heart nor your broken body. Don't go too far, friend, turn to Jesus who hung on Calvary's tree for you. As Jesus hung there for you, the heavens turned black and the earth trembled at that scene as God looked

Thankful Fanny

Boys and girls, I am going to tell you a story of a little girl who was born over one hundred years ago. Perhaps when she was born she was not unlike any other little boy and girl who might have been born in those days.

But at the age of six weeks a terrible thing happened to her. She became blind! It seems to us that to be blind is about the worst thing that could happen to anyone, but as this little girl grew older she made up her mind that she was going to be happy and thankful anyway.

As I have told you in the title of this story, this little girl's name was Fanny. If you would wish to know her last name you could find it in most any hymn book at church, for Fanny Crosby wrote over 7000 hymns or songs! Many of them are the favorite songs we sing today.

When Fanny was only eight years old she wrote her first poem:

"Oh what a happy soul am I! Although I cannot see, I am resolved that in this world Contented I will be.

"How many blessings I enjoy
That other people don't.
To weep and sigh because I'm
blind

I cannot and I won't."

There are many interesting things about Fanny's childhood. One of these was that she had a little pet, and what do you suppose it was. A little lamb. We could say "Fanny's little lamb," instead of "Mary's little lamb." These little friends were

seen many times side by side climbing the hills, and through the fields, or down by the brook. Often they fell asleep together under an old oak tree.

There were other "bright spots" in Fanny's life. One of these was her very dear grandmother. Fanny's grandmother told her about all the things she could not see; the rainbow and its colors, the birds, the stars, the clouds, the sunrise and the sunset.

While gathering leaves Fanny learned the names of the trees. As she enjoyed the perfume and handled the flowers, her grandmother described the roses, the scarlet poppy, the pansy and the sweet peas.

But Fanny's grandmother did not leave out the best and most important stories of all. Yes, she told her the wonderful stories of the Bible. She taught Fanny to kneel in prayer, and taught her many verses from the Bible. At a young age she could say great parts of the Bible by heart. I imagine it was at an early age that she accepted the Savior as her own.

When Fanny was fifteen years old she went to a blind school. There she learned to do many things. Most of all she wrote poems. After many years had passed by Fanny began to write hymns. Then Fanny was the happiest person in the world, for she had then found the work God had for her to do. Then and now Fanny's songs are sung all over the world, and many of them have been printed in other languages. Thousands of

people have come to know Christ as their Savior through her songs.

There is another very interesting thing I want to tell about Fanny Crosby. The children loved her and always called her Aunt Fanny. And as you may guess these children begged 'Aunt Fanny' to tell them a story. What do you suppose the story was that she told them? From her purse she brought out a little book with colored pages, and—yes—sightless Fanny told the children the story of the wordless book. Many of you children have heard this same story, which tells of the way of salvation through the death of the Lord Jesus.

Fanny Crosby lived to be 94 years old. During all this time she served the Lord with joy and thanksgiving. She often said, "I trust in the Lord Jesus, and my heart is always full of thanksgiving."

Funeral services were held in Center Point with Rev. Paul Clanton officiating and Rev. Jake Regier assisting.


