Procrastination – a Bugaboo

I'd been meaning to vacuum my basement for ages. I kept putting it off. One day I just plugged in the vacuum. Later I came back and vacuumed one section. By evening I'd finished the whole basement! I said,

"Whoopido, look what I did!" to the basement shelves.

Procrastination is a universal struggle, an invisible force that keeps us from achieving our goals and realizing our potential. The solution, however, is often deceptively simple: just start. Taking the first step, no matter how small, can break the cycle of delay and propel us forward.

Why do we procrastinate? Overwhelm

It's common to think of a task as overwhelming; we blow it up in our minds. We feel sure it will take a long time and be very hard (I did this with vacuuming the basement.)

Fear

The root of procrastination is frequently tied to fear—fear of failure, fear of the unknown, or fear of not meeting our own expectations.

Negative self-talk

Negative self-talk is another significant barrier. The voice in our heads tells us we are not good enough.

Perfectionism

Sometimes we procrastinate because we think a job has to be done perfectly. As I grow older, I get more and more willing to do a half-baked

job. Yesterday I mowed the lawn but was too tired to edge. It looks better than it did. Sometimes I send out an email with an error in it. So what?

Overcome procrastination Dip one toe in

Begin with something so small and manageable that it seems almost insignificant. Dip one toe in. This small action can create a sense of accomplishment and momentum. For instance, if writing a lengthy report feels overwhelming, committing to just writing the introduction or even brainstorming ideas can make the task seem less intimidating. Once we've taken one step, the job often shrinks to manageable proportions. By focusing on just starting, we can set aside our fears and worries. The inner critic can be silenced by action.. Life is too short to let perfectionism keep us small.

Let momentum carry you

Once that initial step is taken, momentum can take over. Newton's first law of motion states that an object in motion stays in motion. This principle applies to human endeavors as well. When we start a task, we often find it easier to continue. The sense of progress and achievement fuels further action, creating a positive feedback loop.

In practice, setting aside a specific time to begin a task, free from distractions, can be highly effective. For example, setting a timer for just ten minutes to work on a project can lower the barrier to starting. Often, once those ten minutes are up, we find ourselves willing to continue for longer, having overcome the initial inertia.

Celebrate

It's important to celebrate small victories along the way. Each completed task, no matter how minor, is a step toward the larger goal. Recognizing these achievements can boost our confidence and motivation. I often congratulate myself outloud, as I did when I'd vacuumed the basement!

If you are procrastinating on something, take one of these tips and just start. The rest will follow.

The Fishin' Hole

It has been just very tough this summer if you are an angler. The water has been very low, nearly everywhere. To give you an idea of how hot and dry it has been here this summer, I did the math and the research. Neither of those things is really my area of expertise. Point of fact, most people who know me will happily explain to you that, generally speaking, I do not have an area of expertise. But I digress! I garnered the stats from www.extremeweather.com, although they offer no help with the math. I had to add the individual days myself, in fact, I had to take my shoes off for some of this.

For the entire year as of August 26th, the city of Pittsburgh has gotten 32.8 inches of rain. That is really not unusual at all but how it has come is very odd. As of April 11, Pittsburgh had already gotten 17.58 of those inches. In fact, you will recall we were suffering from massive flooding downtown and the Parkway East was closed for days due to that flooding. As of April 11, Pittsburgh was on a pace, not only to have the wettest

April in recorded history but if the pace would have stayed the same it would have been the wettest year in the recorded weather history of Pittsburgh.

It did not stay the same at all. Since April 11, we have only gotten 15.22 inches of rain. I am hesitant to complain as for many of us it means there has been very little need to cut the grass in the backyard because it is just brown and crispy. However, it is hurting the fishing conditions. Rain not only cools the water down a little but oxygenates it. That oxygen is vital to the fish in terms of their energy levels and metabolism. Energy levels lead to eating, and eating leads to catching.

This is my very long way of saying that you might hear walking into the coffee shop, your place of work, the barbershop or the grocery store these days, "Wow, we could sure use some rain!"

I am no meteorologist, but I predict the rain will come this September, and the water will rebound and fish will be as anxious as we are to get back to normal!

There is a tremendous fishing event coming up September 7, at Moraine State Park. If you and your family are interested in starting to become anglers, this is the place to be. The Family Fishing Program is for families with little or no fishing experience. Participants learn basic fishing skills and will practice those skills while fishing during the program. The

program is open to all ages, including children ages 5 and older. Those under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. The program is free and all equipment is provided.

NOTE: the fishing license requirement is waived during the program for participants age 16 and older.

Registration is on DCNR Calendar of Events webpage at dcnr.pa.gov. The event begins at 9 a.m. Saturday morning at the Bear Run Launch in Portersville, 137 Bear Run Dr., Portersville, 16051.

This a great way to try out fishing for you and your friends or family and see if it is for you without any expense involved. I firmly believe it is for everyone, so I hope you will give it a try! 


