## LET US REJOICE!

*(Is. 62:1-5; Ps. 89:4-5, 16-17, 27, 29; Acts 13:16-17, 22-25) (Matt. 1:1-25; Is. 9:1-6; Ps. 96:1-3, 11-13; Titus 2:11-14; Luke 2:1-14) [Is. 52:7-10; Ps. 98: 1-6; Heb. 1:1-6; John 1:1-18]*

“How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings glad tidings, announcing peace, bearings good news...” A Savior is born to us! Surely, “The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone.” Indeed, a light has come to shine upon us who have been hit hard by the tough economic times. His light has come to shine upon those who mourn and are in pain because of the loss of their loved one. “For the Lord comforts His people, He redeems Jerusalem!” He redeems you and me from our slavery to sin. He redeems you and me from fear and anxiety. He lets His light shine upon us and lightens our burden.

At Christmas, God becomes man so that as man He may understand our pains and feel with us. Therefore, come let us adore Him! Surely, times are tough, things are hard, but the Lord exhorts you: “Do not be afraid; for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy...” Rejoice, because you have Jesus as your personal Lord and Savior. Rejoice, for He has come to set you free. Rejoice, because He, the Lord has pitched His tent in you. Rejoice! Jesus, our Christmas is here! Emmanuel, God is indeed with us!

May the birth of Christ this Christmas day replace our nights of anxiety with days of comfort!
